Orchestra Scheduled For Centre Wednesday

The Halifax Symphony Orchestra, the Maritimes' only fully professional symphonic group, will appear at Confederation Centre Theatre Wednesday, Nov. 17, as the second attraction in the Autumn Showcase '65 series. It will be the only appearance of the year on Prince Edward Island for the orchestra. Conducted by John Fenwick, recently appointed assistant artistic director of Summer Festival '66, the orchestra is currently on a Maritime tour.

"In fact," said Mr. Fenwick recently, "we are now doing as much playing outside Halifax as we are in the city. It can be said with some justification that we belong to the Atlantic region as a whole."

At Confederation Centre, the orchestra will perform a varied program for adults and will present an entirely different program for young people during an afternoon concert.

The evening program will consist of works by Mendelssohn, Vaughan-Williams, Mascagni, Mozart, Sibelius, and the major items on the program, the Beethoven Symphony No. 1 in C major.

"I like to program more familiar works for our road concerts," said Mr. Fenwick, "and especially works that aren't too far out. We can experiment a little more in Halifax where there are several opportunities for music lovers to hear us each year, but for concerts such as the one at the Centre we simply

The Conference is sponsored by the Canadian Council on 4-H Clubs which is a non-profit organization with headquarters in Ottawa. WINS FLAX CROWN TORONTO (CP)—Harold E. Hansen of Vulcan, Alta., won the world flax championship today for the second consecutive year, with an entry of the raja variety in pre-show judging at the Royal Agricultural Winter Fair.

Results of the operation, launched Wednesday from U.S. 7th Fleet landing craft, remained meagre. A spokesman said two Viet Cong were killed and 18 suspects detained.

Allied forces in other coastal areas told of killing 14 Viet Cong and capturing 17. Strengthening of ties between South Viet Nam and South Korea was described as a necessity in a communique issued in Seoul at the end of an official visit by Premier Nguyen Cao Ky.

Ky and South Korea's premier, Chung Il-Kwon, said closer co-operation is vital to pursuit of the common objectives "of securing peace and prosperity and, above all, of realizing the unification of each country."

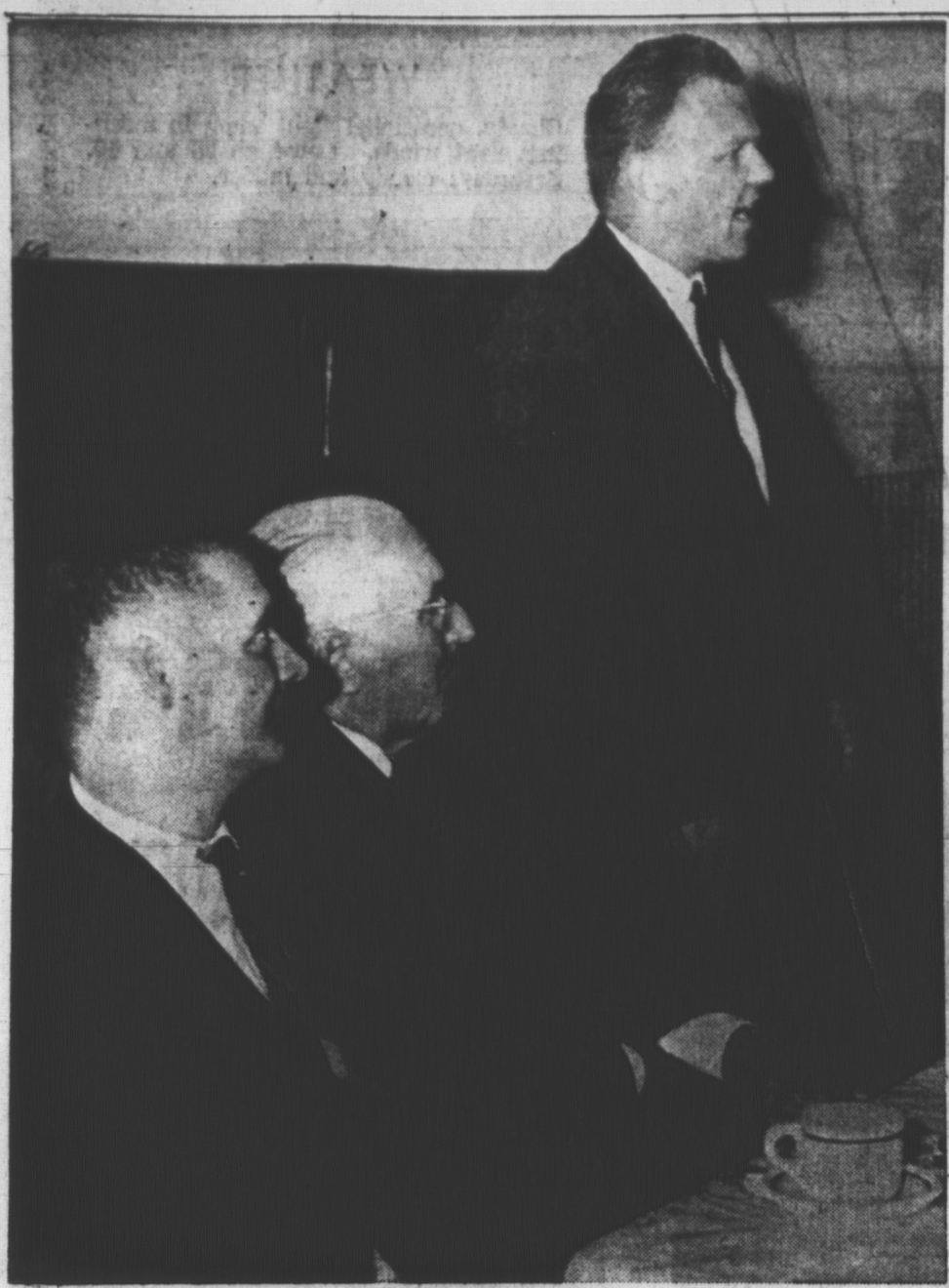
The spokesman said the planes killed 100 of the ambushing detachment and the Vietnamese troops accounted for 30. He had no information about government casualties.

Far up the coast, a large task force of U.S. Marines and Vietnamese troops pressed a search-and-destroy mission in rolling country 18 miles north of Chu Lai.

Home And School Executive Hears Conference Report

The regular monthly meeting of the provincial executive of the P.E.I. Federation of Home and School Associations was held in the National Film Board Office with the president, Mrs. Stewart MacDonald, in the chair.

Mr. Charles Campbell gave the meeting a report on the eastern conference of Home and School Associations held in Charlottetown in September, at which were present members of the New Brunswick, Nova Scotia and P.E.I. Federations, as well as the national president of the Canadian Federation of Home and School Associations, A. J. Sands.

Discussion had centered around the Centennial projects embarked upon by home and school — children's reading, the Indian project "Tillicum", and international letter links.

The responsibility for the promotion of the federation's official organ "Quest" was laid squarely on the provincial federations.

The meeting was informed that the 1966 national meeting would be held at the University of New Brunswick, in Fredericton.

The P.E.I. Federation agreed to participate in the international letter links. This programme, in which 60 countries have agreed to participate, is designed to encourage and promote understanding through correspondence between parents and teachers in the various countries of the world. Six letters a year are to be exchanged.

Pre-school child reading was discussed. The purpose of this programme is to encourage parents to read to young children and instill in them, from earliest comprehension, a love of books and reading. Plans were formulated for a series of television programs to be held during the winter months centered around this theme.

The following committee chairmen were appointed: family life, Rev. Henry Tye; library, William Ledwell; audio-visual, John MacDonald, principal of St. Jean Elementary School;

community life, M. F. Hagan. The president informed the meeting that she had attended the formation of a new home and school association at Cornwall on Oct. 27, and had duly installed the slate of officers, with the Rev. Roydon Reynolds as president of the new association.

Mrs. Gordon MacDonald publicity and public relations chairman, recently attended a "Parents' Open House" held at Kensington Regional High School, with the principal chairing the meeting. The purpose of the meeting was to explain the benefits of home and school to teachers and parents, with the possibility of forming an association for the Kensington Regional High School.

The president, Mrs. Stewart MacDonald, will be attending a special meeting in Woodstock, N.B. The meeting is being held in connection with the United Nations International Cooperation Year, and the New Brunswick Home and School Federation and the Parent-Teacher Association of Maine will participate in this joint conference. The theme of the meeting is "Parents in Orbit". This is the first joint conference of this type to be held.
