Talking of expanding, at a time when steel mills are operating far below capacity, may sound out of place. Industry leaders, however, are convinced population growth

NEW YORK (AP)-With only the briefest hesitancy, the stock market last week made a decisive rise to another 25-year peak.

The rise was the third in a row since the market began its recovery drive to erase losses suffered in the late August reaction.

The Associated Press average of 60 stocks gained \$1.90 and stood at \$137.00, the highest position it has attained since Oct. 28, 1929.

By and large, there was no adverse news all week-no selling excuse. Attention seemed to be focused on corporate developments such as earnings, dividends, merger rumors and announcements, and splits. Stocks responded well in all cases.

STABILITY NOTED
The commerce department announced economic activity in July and August held stable with recent months.

Canadian stocks were mixed at the weekend. International Nickel closed 3/4 ahead, McIntyre gained 3/4 and Canadian Pacific was up 3/4 but Dome Mines dropped 3/4 and Hiram Walker slipped 3/4.

On the American stock exchange, the Royalite Oil advanced 1/2 while Lake Shore eased 3/4.

U. S. Steel
CLEVELAND (AP)-The magazine Steel said Sunday, "There's only one way steel demand and production can go-that's up."

Steel ingot production last week edged up half a point to 66 1/2 per cent of rated capacity, after a gain of 2 1/2 points in the preceding week.

Despite the fact the auto industry is making only 50 per cent as many cars and trucks as it made last year at this time, the steel industry is producing only 30 per cent less tonnage than it did a year ago, the weekly trade journal said.

Posing the question of how high steel production will go in the fourth quarter, Steel said, "Some steel company presidents think 70 per cent; some think 80 per cent; others believe it will be midway between 70 and 80."

Shortly after the Second World War the major steel firms began spending millions of dollars building and enlarging. As a result, American mills now are equipped to turn out about 124,000,000 tons of steel each year.

The added capacity-much made available in the last 18 months-isn't being used now. The steel business has been off and production has dropped as low as 65 per cent of capacity some weeks in the last 12 months.

PLANNING NEW GROWTH
But far-sighted steel executives predict the U. S. will be using as much as 145,000,000 tons of steel a year by 1965. If true, the industry needs a minimum addition of 21,000,000 tons capacity.

The magazine Steel said it made a recent survey and found many of the major firms planning departments moving ahead full speed preparing for new growth.

Producers are not anxious to be caught short again like they were at the beginning of the Second World War. As late as 1940, the country's steel production capacity was estimated at 81,000,000 tons annually.

HALIFAX, (CP) - The navy's newest addition to the Atlantic fleet, the minesweeper Resolute, docked here Friday and it didn't take her 40 officers and men long to start showing off their television set.

The set, snug on the mess deck, was donated by Kingston, Ont., where the 39-ton warship was built this year. The navy says the Resolute is probably the first RCN vessel to have a TV set.
