said that the Provincial Government was supplying the best services possible to the people here. He cited expenditures in the Departments of Health and Welfare, Public Works, Education and Industry and Natural Resources, and emphasized that more aid was needed from the Federal Government.

Other speakers heard at the convention included Senator George Barbour, Hon. Donald MacKinnon, Minister of Public Works and Highways, Senator T. V. Grant, Hon. Eugene Cullen, George Saville, M.L.A., Thomas Cullen, M.L.A., Brenton St. John, M.L.A., Hon. Keir Clark, M.L.A., William Acorn, M.L.A., Mrs. E. B. Inman, President of the P.E.I. Health Grant For Kings Co. Hospital

A new nurses residence to provide accommodation for 14 nurses and release space in the hospital for additional patients is planned for the King's County Memorial Hospital, Montague. A Federal grant of \$9,500 has been awarded for this purpose.
