

Personalities Seen Varied In Smokers And Non-Smokers

NEW YORK (AP)—A psychologist studying the personalities of nearly 1,400 cigarette smokers and non-smokers reports:

Smokers among them tended to be more extroverted, outgoing and social.

But the smokers also tended to be more disagreeable, less good-natured, less trusting, less

self-reliant or dependable or persevering, less orderly in personal habits and less mannerly and refined.

These findings, says Dr. Gene M. Smith of Harvard medical school, are based on questionnaires in which smokers and non-smokers gave evaluation of themselves and also were judged by 25 of their close associates or peers on 42 different traits.

\$48 Million Suit Filed

NEW YORK (AP)—Charles Seligson, trustee of the bankrupt brokerage house of Ira Haupt and Co., has filed a \$48,000,000 suit in U.S. federal court against the New York Produce Exchange and others.

The action was an outgrowth of the 1963 bankruptcy of the Allied Crude Vegetable Oil Refining Co. in New Jersey in 1963.

Seligson seeks a return of \$12,000,000 Haupt lost when obligated to make margin payments as oil futures prices declined. He also seeks costs and treble damages of \$36,000,000 for a total of \$48,000,000.

Besides the produce exchange, others named as defendants were the New York Produce Exchange Clearing Association; Faahnestock and Co.; Merrill Lynch, Pierce, Fenner & Smith, Inc.; Bunge Corp.; Continental Grain Company; I. Oskin and Co. and eight individuals connected with them.

Nov. 19, 1963, Allied filed a voluntary petition in bankruptcy and as a result, the \$12,000,000 advanced to the Clearing Association by Haupt was never recovered, the suit says.

The defendants are charged with failing to maintain an orderly market in oil contracts on the exchange; to failing to prevent undesirable speculative activities, and of failing to investigate the financial condition of allied and its affiliated persons and corporations.

The bidding:
South West North East

The problem is easily resolved if East-West are familiar with the trump echo convention. West ruffed the diamond at trick two and later played the two when East took dummy's nine with the ace.

This high-low in trumps is called an echo and shows that its user has three trumps. By the same token if West had ruffed originally with the two and later played the five, he would have denied having a third trump.

East consequently finds it easy to solve the problem that arises at trick six. He returns a diamond, knowing full well that his partner is able to ruff.

South Viet Nam Premiership Held By Six Men Since 1963

SAIGON (AP)—Six different men have been chief of government in South Viet Nam since the military overthrow and slaying of President Ngo Dinh Diem Nov. 1, 1963.

The first was Lt. Gen. Duong Van Minh who took the presidency Nov. 2, 1963. Ousted Jan. 30, 1964, Minh is in exile in Bangkok, Thailand, and not permitted to return to Saigon.

Minh was succeeded by the man who overthrew him, Lt. Gen. Nguyen Khanh, who set himself up as premier and ruled until Aug. 29, 1964.

Under mounting political pressure, Khanh announced he was retiring for reasons of health. A politician, Nguyen Xuan Oanh, was named acting premier.

Oanh remained only until Sept. 5 when Khanh resumed the premiership. But younger military officers were restive, and by Oct. 30 Khanh was out. He was sent later on diplomatic assignments abroad but finally was forbidden to return and is in exile in Madrid.

Mayor Tran Van Huong of Saigon was named by the military as premier Oct. 31, 1964, and continued in office until Jan. 27, 1965.

The Buddhist staged demonstrations against Huong and the military forced him to resign. He returned to teaching in the delta city of My Tho.

Oanh was called back by the military as a caretaker premier and served until Feb. 16, 1965. Then he retired to private life and is a businessman in the resort city of Dalat.

The military installed as premier Phan Huy Quat, a Saigon doctor. Political infighting and religious disputes made Quat's position shaky and in less than four months he threw up the sponge, restoring the military to full power June 12, 1965. Quat went back to practicing medicine and running a medical laboratory in Saigon.

After nine days of manoeuvring, Brig-Gen. Nguyen Cao Ky, the air force commander who was one of the driving forces against Khanh, took over the premiership.
