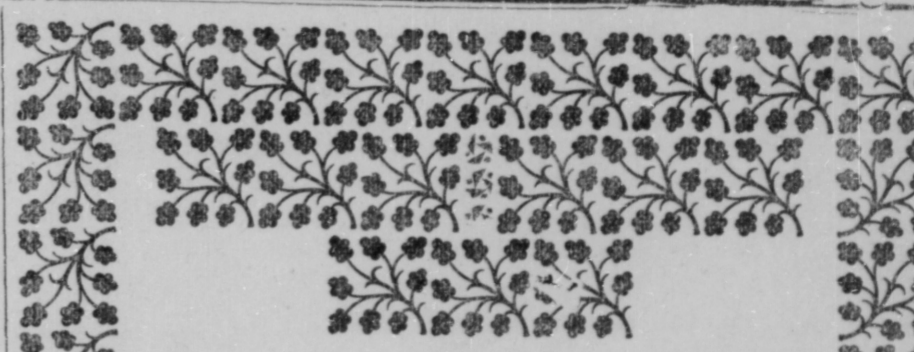

OPEN LETTER NO. FOUR.

To the Hon. Donald Farquharson, the Unsound Premier.

SIR,—It is evident you are wincing and whining through The Patriot hatchery; but it is with your conduct as a public administrator of the affairs of the Province that I have to do. You must admit that the report of the Grand Jury relative to the gross scandals of the Asylum and the other places of confinement is true, and that a man who should conceal such matters is not fit to be trusted with a responsible position. Bad food and molasses and other articles of diet which you would not eat yourself, should not be supplied to the most helpless of God's creatures. The public institutions and their management should be an open book read and known by all men. The financial status of the Province should be known to every tax payer. There should be no covering up; and such items as paying the expenses of Mr. Peters from British Columbia and his sessional pay should not be allowed for the sake of saving the Fort Augustus District to your party. Will you inform the public, what was the cost of that trip? A man who receives \$25.00 a day from the Government and who furnishes indirectly other supplies to the public institutions under the local administration is the last man who should occupy a position as a representative. The expenditure under your administration should be plain and explicit—every item should explain itself. Take for instance the last public accounts and see the following entries under the misleading term of "miscellaneous": "Sundry horse hire \$35.00." Will you kindly explain for whom that expenditure was incurred? "Postage for Supervisors \$17.00." It would be interesting to know how much was apportioned to each and whether they were all equally good watchmen writing weekly information to the head centre. Bushing ice, \$711.21. It would be nice to know how that amount was divided in the respective sections. Prince of Wales College, paid on construction, \$8,378.00, on Hospital for Insane, paid on new annex \$365.00, yet we have no annex, nor no new Prince of Wales College. There are many other items that need explanation. But a man void of the principles of governmental justice is the last man to appeal to. The Hillsboro "Boodie" is not forgotten; and your connection with the affairs of the province for so many years has not revealed that you are rising in the scale of practical administrative ability. As an executive officer there are duties which are incumbent upon you, per force of your situation, and one of the first is to divest yourself of the grovelling spirit shown by you towards your opponents who have equal interests at stake with your party in the affairs of this Province. The greatest benefit, my "unsound" friend which any man can render to his country is to contribute to the diffusion of science and learning—intellectual and civil liberty and general tranquility. There is no person who has it not in his power to promote these in a greater or less degree by his action and example. Your conduct in the Legislature has brought upon yourself a general odium and discredit in all inquiries into the conduct and management of the affairs of the Province. That you have swallowed yourself on the temperance question is now a matter of history, and the waters of the Hillsboro will not purge you or cleanse you. You are now, from the temperance standpoint, doubtly odious and may be considered a temperance leper. You should bear in mind that the vigilant eye of the people is fixed upon your actions and you cannot cover up under the term "miscellaneous" the unexplained items of the public accounts much longer. He is the sincere and wisest friend of his country, who aware of the fallibility of the most experienced administration and of the almost irresistible temptations which are attached to the possession of authority, regards with steadfast attention the conduct of those who manage the affairs of the Government. An inquiry at this time into the affairs of your Government is opportune, and you should be tried by your pre-election speeches and promises. It is notorious that you are hated by your associates some of whom are very estimable men and under different circumstances would shine but their light cannot shine under you as the guiding star of the Province.

"What service to his country can one do in the wild warfare of the present age? Who fights the gladiator without shields, Fights without arms. Why? He was lie and cheat. By false pretences, double and turn a will, Profess whateyer doctrines suit the times, Juggle and trick with words in everything. Be a base counterfeit, and fawn and crouch Upon the level of the baser sort." This manly expression of thought does not open up a fount of inspiration in your soul. I cannot expect that you have the ambition and the genius to scale the dizzy heights of Parnassus and learn from the greatest of poets to tune the lyre and sweep the harp of immortal song to grasp a great and comprehends science as the foundation of an enlightened government. You ought to be master of the jurisprudence of your own country. Wrong and injustice one done cannot be undone, but are eternal in the consequences, are numbered with the irrevocable past. It contains its own retributive penalty as surely and as naturally as the acorn contains the oak. Whether as an individual or as a government, every wrong done to another, whether it affects his person, his property, his happiness or his reputation, is an offence against the law of Justice. Ask yourself the question as to your fitness, and if you have a conscience you must echo its voice that as an "unsound" man you are not fit for the duties imposed upon you. Vox Populi.
