A Serious Grievance.

Sir,—Will you kindly afford me space to ask the attention of our new City Council to what I am sure all will agree with me in regarding as a serious and unnecessary public grievance—I refer to the old-fashioned method still obtaining at our polling booths at each city election. An elector comes forward to vote, he gives his name and the name of the candidate he wishes to vote for. Should the opposing candidate be perfectly satisfied the vote is a good one, all well, and the elector departs; but should any doubt exist in his mind, the elector is plied with question after question of a close and perhaps objectionable personal nature, his age, occupation, length of sojourn in the city, the tenor by which he holds his property, whether he has paid his city taxes or not, and other no less amazing questions may each or all be asked, and even then the poor victim may be required to swear that the answers he has given are true before he is allowed to exercise his franchise. Surely, sir, in this enlightened day there can be neither necessity nor excuse for perpetuating this relic of past ages. Why not, as in other places, instruct the City Clerk to furnish printed lists under oath of all voters to each returning officer in the several wards of the City, said lists to be compiled from the tax and assessment rolls say one month previous to the Civic Election, the fact of the voter's name appearing on the list being regarded as indisputable evidence of his right to vote. The possibility of a voter being removed by our very limited population and may easily be guarded against by the opposing candidate.

TO RESIST LICENSE.

Decided Stand of the Grand Division.

The meeting of the Grand Division at Little York on the 29th inst., opened at 4.30 p.m. The Grand Officers present were G. W. P. Arbing, G. W. A. Angus, G. S. Burns, G. T. Henderson. There was a large number of representatives from Charlottetown, among whom we noticed Messrs Small, Wadman, Hodgson, Crabbe, Angus, Boer, Kerr, Davison, Sabine, Lawson, Rev. Mr. Gordon, Mr. Young. More than twenty new members were initiated. The hall in which the meeting was held, was filled with representatives and visitors from all parts of the province. The G. W. P. Arbing and G. S. Burns submitted able and interesting reports on the state of the order. On motion the report of the G. W. P. was ordered to be sent to the GUARDIAN for publication.

The following resolution, moved by Mr. S. W. Crabbe, was unanimously passed:—

Resolved, That this Grand Division is of the opinion that a Provincial Temperance Alliance or a branch of the Division Alliance, as may be agreed upon, should be formed for the purpose of resisting the passing of a license law by our local Legislature, and further Resolved, That a committee of five be appointed to carry the views expressed in the above resolution into effect.

Messrs. Crabbe, Small, Angus, and Rev. J. A. Gordon and W. Hamlyn were appointed as a committee to act in connection with other temperance bodies for the purpose of calling a grand temperance meeting to consider the temperance situation caused by the repeal of the Scott Act.

A public meeting was held in the church and also in the hall, one building not being sufficient to hold all the people. Able and stirring speeches were delivered by the Rev. Messrs. Spargo, Arshibald, Gordon and Fisher, and other gentlemen of the laity, after which the meeting was adjourned. The representatives held another session to further discuss matters relating to their work.

Social Gathering of Devonians.

In response to the invitation of Rev. W. Hamlyn, about thirty Devonians met Thursday night in St. Paul's School-room for the purpose of spending a social evening. The proceedings were opened by the reading of letters of apology from several natives of Devonshire who were unable to be present, after which the well known and appropriate song "Should acquaintance be forgot," was sung by Miss Hamlyn, all present being invited to join in the chorus. After some refreshments had been partaken of, "Home, Sweet Home" was sung, and an invitation was given to those present to make any remarks appropriate to the occasion. This was responded to by Mr. W. Heard, Mr. Colwill, and Miss Hamlyn, after which an amusing poem, in the Devonshire dialect was read by the Chairman, Rev. W. Hamlyn, who followed with a brief sketch of the history of Devonshire, commencing with the legend of the landing of Brutus, the founder of the British race, at Totnes, in the eleventh century, B. C., and embracing the reign of King Alfred, the defeat of the Spanish Armada, and the arrival of William, Prince of Orange.

In proposing a vote of thanks to the Chairman, Mr. Heard remarked that during his fifty years residence on the Island, he had never had the privilege of attending a similar gathering before. A very enjoyable evening was spent, and a hearty interest in the proceedings was manifested throughout. The meeting terminated with the singing of the hymn "God be with you till we meet again."

BRADLAUGH DEAD.

After A Protracted Illness.

LONDON, Jan. 30.—Charles Bradlaugh, M. P., died this morning. [Ten years ago Bradlaugh was regarded by the pious folk as the veritable anti-brit, but he departed almost in the odor of sanctity. Mr. Bradlaugh, despite his splendid physique, has been a sickly man for years. His last hours were softened by a knowledge that the House of Commons has ordered expurgated from the books its record of his expiation at the time of the controversy over the test oath. Bitter as the feeling was then, it has changed of late to one of extreme kindness. As they came to know him both sides grew to like and respect Mr. Bradlaugh, and he became a sort of person, hardly distinguishable from the ordinary Nonconformist Liberal member.]
