Peoples' Party's Platform

"The Provincial executive will be reduced from nine to seven."

"No public money will be expended in excess of legislative appropriations, unless in case of unavoidable necessity, such as caused by flood or sudden disaster."

"Provision will be made for a quarterly publication of revenue and expenditure."

"The office of Commissioner of Public Lands will be abolished and the duties assigned to the Attorney General."

"The present ferry system will be reformed with a view to greater economy of expenditure without diminishing efficiency of accommodation."

"A reform in the administration of the Surrogate and Probate court will be effected."

"A radical change will be made in the administration of the Public Works department, so that the money now wasted can be saved to the Province."

"The present system of taxation will be so changed that it will operate with even-handed justice, and not bear oppressively and unfairly on any class of taxpayers."

"Economy will be practised in every department, and taxation will be kept down to the lowest possible limit."

"The efficiency of the Public Service will be maintained, and revenue and expenditure will be made to square as nearly as possible."

"No further increase of the public debt will be permitted."

"There will be considerable reductions in the expenditure of the public money, and the resources of the Province will be safeguarded and husbanded by every legitimate means that can be devised."

GOVERNMENT'S RECORD.

"They promised to greatly reduce the public expenditure. They have largely increased it."

"In the strongest language they condemned a provincial debt. In five years they have added over a quarter of a million of dollars to our debt."

"They solemnly professed that they could manage our affairs without taxation. In three years they have taken from the people over one hundred and thirty-eight thousand dollars in taxes."

"They protested against the practice of borrowing money at the banks. There has scarcely been a year since they attained power, that the Province has not owed very large amounts to one or more of the banks."

"They pledged themselves not to impose taxation without consulting the people. No sooner was the promise made than it was faithlessly broken by the introduction and passage into law of four separate tax acts."

"They seriously engaged, in 1891, to devote about 15,000 dollars of the money to be raised by debentures to the repair of the Provincial building. This has not been done. The building has received no repairs."

"They loudly proclaimed, in opposition, that there was no necessity for a Commissioner of Public Lands. That official still exists, although they have been in power for over six years."

"They denounced, with one voice, Provincial deficits. There has not been a single year of their administration that there has not been a large deficit,—their deficits aggregate over \$255,000, and if the taxes they collected be added, the astounding result of over \$393,000 will be reached."

LATEST NEWS BY WIRE AND MAIL

KANSAS CITY, Mo., July 15.—The police department of Kansas City began this morning working women prisoners at breaking stone, the same as the male prisoners. The police commissioners adopted this rule upon recommendation of Chief Quarles who argued that women prisoners kept in idleness were not sufficiently punished.

MONTREAL, July 15.—There is a great deal of interest in the law suit taken by friends of the late Mr. Fafard, who was run over and killed by a train at L'Islet last April. The action is against a parish priest who declared in the pulpit that Mr. Fafard's death was a punishment from heaven. The Redemptorist father Sie Heleu's also made the statement, but he made a full apology last Sunday.

LONDON, July 16.—The Post in an editorial on the Sherman despatch says: "Every indication points to the certainty that Great Britain will be compelled to fight for her existence against the United States as soon as an American government believes that war can safely be begun. In such a situation war cannot be averted by justice nor by good will."

NEWS NOTES.

Mr John Shark, Canadian Commissioner in Australia, in a letter to the department of Trade and Commerce, points out that the estimates which have been published by authority of the United States Government, of the wheat crop in Australia, are erroneous and misleading. Five million bushels of wheat, or its equivalent in flour, is needed to carry the population of the island continent through till next harvest. The drought largely continues all over the island and the sheep herds will be reduced from 56,000,000 to about 30,000,000. The first orders for Canadian wood pulp are now being filled and he is sure there is an even better opening for the Canadian paper.

The United States tariff bill is not going through the conference committee of the two houses of Congress with the smoothness or expedition that was hoped for. The representatives have not taken to the senators' mangling of their measure and in spite of the desire of party managers and the anxiety of the public, a somewhat prolonged delay seems likely. There is division among the Republicans themselves as to what is the best to do in regard to some of the duties the senate changed, while the Democrats, who are not anxious that the bill should pass, are liable to prolong the agony for the purpose of injuring their opponents in the eyes of the country. Politics is a curious game everywhere, but in the United States it is more curious than elsewhere, and in it the business interests of the country are the pawns the actors use.

The department of the interior has received applications from a number of persons who desire to lease portions of the Saskatchewan river and dredge for gold in the sand at the bottom. It is understood that the minister after carefully looking into the matter has decided to grant leases under stringent conditions. One of these conditions is that a royalty on all gold brought up be paid to the government. After advertising the Stewart river in the Yukon country as open to tender for dredging for gold, several offers being received the department has decided that it would not be right to hand over the gold in that river except with a proviso that a royalty should be paid to the government, and therefore no contract has been awarded. In the Saskatchewan the gold is very fine and difficult to obtain by washing and therefore gold hunters are not so much after it, so the department has considered it advisable to lease five mile stretches to parties who wish to dredge there.

TEMPERANCE AND SCOTT ACT.

Sir,—I have frequently been asked privately, by temperance people, why I did not join some temperance lobby to show I was a true Christian man. I have given these individuals my answer and some of them said they were satisfied, but they have at the same time expressed doubts whether I could be considered a true Christian man except I came out more publicly. Some of these have lately asked me to give my views to the public through some of the city papers on temperance and also on the Scott Act. I have agreed to do so, rather reluctantly; in case what I have to say may be misrepresented. In the first place allow me to say I am a strict abstainer, as I understand it, I never taste liquor of any kind from the beginning of one year to the end, unless as a medicine; but I know there are young men who belong to temperance organizations who do not hesitate to drink whiskey or any other liquor and seek to induce others to go with them to have a drink. The proof I offer is, I have met them myself. If I put to them the question: "Do you not belong to a Temperance Lodge," they will give me some such answer as follows: "Yes, I belong to such a Lodge and as it is a wet or cold night I think I would be the better of some tonight, and the Lodge does not know of this; but if they should I will own up to my fault and be reinstated again. I could not go and pledge myself to any Lodge to abstain from intoxicating liquors and then go and break that pledge; far less would I try to induce others to go and drink with me. Now if belonging to a Lodge will make me a better Christian man than being a voluntary temperance I do not wish to be considered a Christian simply because I am a member of a Lodge and can break my pledge when I like."

As to the Scott Act I have little to say. I cannot shut my eyes to the fact, however, that it cannot be enforced without perjury to a large extent coming to its aid. Several witnesses are brought into court and on oath swear that they were on the defendants premises on a certain evening and drank beer which was not intoxicating; others swear on the same occasion that they were served with the same beer and it was intoxicating. The Magistrate decides the case either by fine or acquittal in accordance with the nature of the evidence before him. It has also been known that men who have been out of work for some time have actually gone and given testimony on oath falsely, expecting to receive a reward from the temperance body. Whether or not a reward would be given them is not question at issue. They believe a reward would be given them if by perjury they secured a conviction against an offender of the Act. Another objection: The rich people can have any quantity of intoxicating liquors stowed away in their cellars, when the poor cannot get it except they break the law. I observe Dr. McLeod says, the rich do not want to drink. They may not, it is true, want to get drunk, but they want to have it to use at any time they feel inclined to use it. This is a direct infringement on the liberties of the people. Again, if proper places for the sale of intoxicating liquors were in the city, a young man could go in, take his glass and come away. But as matters are under the Scott Act, he takes his friends with him, and instead of taking only one glass they drink four or five glasses each, as they do not wish to be seen going often into such a place. Besides this, instead of getting good liquor to drink, they get a poison manufactured from certain chemical substances which puts them in a state of frenzy entirely different from what would be produced by liquor.

I have yet to learn that taking the pledge will make me a better Christian man. I hold that the gospel of our Lord and Saviour Jesus Christ can alone cleanse and purify the soul if the system is impure. Do not try to purify it by hedging it in by "Scott Act." Get the fountain clean and the stream will be clear; or in other words get the heart right and the life will be right. "Not by might or by power but by My Spirit saith the Lord." Let ministers of the Gospel preach more of the Gospel of our Lord and Saviour Jesus Christ. Let Christian men and women show by their work and conversation that they are true to Christ and his cause and we will very soon need no "Scott Act" to regulate our conduct. Allow me here to tell an anecdote which I read lately in a Scotch paper: "A certain minister in Scotland had for several Sabbaths been preaching deep and learned sermons on Theology. His congregation whilst they admired his sermons they concluded that their souls were not benefited by such preaching and several of them met to consider the matter. One of their number said the minister was preaching temperance. An elder of the church said we want more temperance in all our churches an old working man got up and said let him preach the Gospel and we will soon have temperance. Another person wrote these words on a slip of paper and put it on the pulpit Bible. "Sir we would see Jesus." The minister read it and was convinced and changed his preaching and within one year they had more temperance workers in them was known for 12 years previously. One word now in regard to the coming election should the Scott Act be sustained by a good majority, then it was hoped that citizens would do all in their power for the better enforcement of it than it is at present, and on the other hand should the Act be defeated then let citizens endeavour to frame such laws as would be best to govern the sale of intoxicants. I trust whatever the result will be that citizens will act harmoniously for the general good. I fear I have extended this letter to greater length at first intended and thanking you for space.

To the People of P. E. Island:

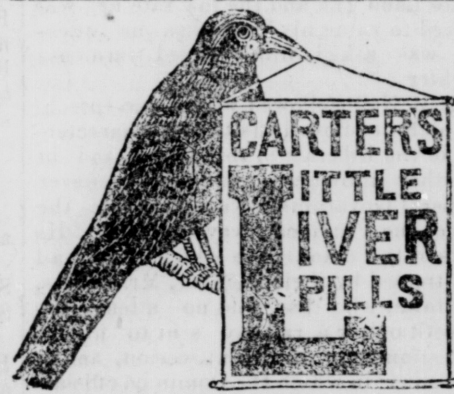
WHAT will you have, Scott Act or Free Rum? We will have one or the other after election day.
