LAKE SUCCESS, N.Y., Nov. 12 (AP) — Communist China notified the United Nations Saturday she is accepting a Security Council invitation to present her own case charging the United States with aggression but is rejecting a similar bid by the council to discuss Chinese intervention in Korea.

Transfer Of 11,000 Men Began Over Week-end

OTTAWA, Nov. 12 (CP) — Canada's special army brigade is on the move, part of it bound for Korea.

Their movement officially shrouded in secrecy, thousands of men are converging on Fort Lewis, Wash., in the country's greatest peacetime troop transfer.

The shift of the brigade's three battalions and supporting troops—largest since the days of the Second World War—started from a half-dozen points during the week-end.

Actual departure times were kept secret by the army for "security" reasons, but 22 special trains are leaving at various times in the next few days with about 11,000 men from Valcartier, Que.; Petawawa, Kingston and Camp Borden, in Ontario; Camp Shilo, Man. and Wainwright, Alta.

From Wainwright goes the 2nd Battalion of the Princess Patricia's Canadian Light Infantry, the unit chosen to go directly to Korea after a short staging stop at the big United States army camp at Fort Lewis.

Struck By Car On Malpeque Road

Mr. Ernest Connolly of West Road was taken to the Charlottetown Hospital Friday night suffering from a brain concussion following an accident on the Malpeque Road near St. Dunstan's University. The accident occurred about 6.30.

Mr. Connolly was driving a wagon towards the College and was thrown from the horse-driven vehicle after being struck from the rear by a car. The accident occurred as two cars were meeting one another.

Founders Of Sisters Of Notre Dame Beatified

VATICAN CITY, Nov. 12 (CP) — The Pope was carried shoulder-high into St. Peter's tonight to venerate Marguerite Bourgeoys, the French-born Canadian nun beatified earlier in the day.

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Across the land, in centres big and small, veterans and non-veterans joined in Remembrance Day services.

The national observance took place in the capital, around the big stone and bronze War Memorial which sits on Confederation Square in downtown Ottawa.

The armed forces, the diplomatic corps, government officials and the public took part as the nation mourned its war dead.

There, massed bands played hymns and the National Anthem, Canadian Legion buglers sounded the "Last Post" and "Reveille" and a lone cannon signalled two minutes silence at 11 a.m.

Burglars Get \$1,200 In Jewellery At Kensington Store

A daring robbery occurred sometime on Thursday night or early Friday morning at the drug and jewellery store of Mr. William J. Semple of Kensington and an estimated \$1,200 worth of jewellery was stolen.

The thief or thieves gained entrance to the store through a rear window and apparently left by the same way. Although R.C.M.P. are investigating the case there were no new developments up to late last night.

LEDUC, Alta., Nov. 12 (CP) — Ten persons are dead and 11 in hospital following a mysterious explosion that shattered an hotel in this oil-boom town, 21 miles south of Edmonton Saturday.

PWC Student Drowned In Accident Near Annandale

Edward Clark, fifteen year old son of Mr. and Mrs. John Clark, Charlottetown, was drowned early Saturday morning and Mr. Gordon Hutchison of this City nearly lost his life when the boat in which they were duck hunting near Annandale capsized.

Nominated For Second King's

Mr. Harvey Douglas, Cherry Hill, a younger brother of the late Mr. Lester Douglas, M. P., was nominated on Friday as Liberal candidate to contest the Second District of King's by-election on Dec. 4. The convention, held at Morell, was largely attended, and was presided over by Mr. Wendall Coffin.

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The victims were trapped in the tottering hulk of the two-storey structure as it tumbled into the basement and was destroyed by fire. No occupants escaped injury.

The explosion was believed due to gas seepage into the basement from an undetermined source. It is being investigated by R.C.M.P. officials of the Alberta Government and employees of a gas company which was installing natural gas service to the town.

Dead are: Mrs. Norman Miller of Athabasca, Alta., a waitress in the hotel coffee shop. Crystal Megley, 12, daughter of the hotel owner.

Steve Fennick and Emil Abel, employees in the hotel beverage room. Allan J. Powell, about 30, and Art Mannville, 52, of High River, Alta., employed as drillers in the nearby Leduc oilfield.

Elmer Baird, 36, of Edmonton, employee of Public Works Department. Bill Brohman and Fred Kincaid of Leduc.

An unidentified person in overall. The explosion, breaking the calm of a Remembrance Day holiday, was felt as far as 10 miles distant.

Witnesses said it hurled the roof of the brick and frame structure 20 feet in the air and drove out all the walls. As the roof crashed down, the top floor collapsed on the ground story.

All of the 19 rooms and a five-room suite on the top floor were rented, but police were unable to determine how many persons actually were in the building.

Sixteen injured were released from the twisted wreckage of beams, pipes, bedspreads and other furniture before flames swept the block, driving rescuers back.

Firemen poured water on the molten, steaming mass for more than two hours before the body of the first victim could be recovered.

At dusk Saturday night, only three bodies had been found. Floodlights were rigged and derick-equipment oil trucks were brought into use to haul away the debris.

Directing operations from a pile of smoking rubble in the basement was John Megley, co-owner of the hotel, who had lost one child, his home and business in the blast. Loss was estimated at more than \$100,000.

The temperature dropped to five degrees above zero as bulldozers were brought into use to clear the rubble.

The remaining bodies were recovered today. The body of the tenth victim, was burned beyond recognition. Police took fingerprints in an attempt to trace its identity that way.

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The young boy and Mr. Hutchison had their boat anchored to a buoy when the tide changed. The boat, caught broadside in a terrific current, upset and both occupants were thrown overboard.

Mr. Hutchison managed to grasp the side of the boat. He was rescued about twenty minutes later by two men from Annandale who put out in the nearby ferry. A woman, after seeing the accident from her kitchen window, summoned the men who went to the rescue.

The R.C.M.P. have been searching for the body for the past two days and will continue grappling operations today. They surveyed the area by air yesterday while dragging operations were carried out from two to three boats.

Edward Mr. Hutchison and the latter's two sons, Bob, 15 and David 11, left for Annandale about 5 o'clock Saturday morning and the accident occurred about two and one half hours later. The two Hutchison boys were standing on the shore at the time.

Edward was a popular first year student at Prince of Wales College. He is survived by his parents and a brother, David. His mother was the former Dorothy Monkey of Summerside.

The family was very well known in Summerside where they resided before moving to Charlottetown about three years ago.

Reviews Reserve Army Plans For Summer Training

Stating that the small Canadian Active Army were only "housekeepers" until the time came to fight, Lt. Col. J. L. Delamere, GSO 1, Eastern Command, Halifax, added that when that time came "we have to depend on the Reserve Army."

He was speaking at the annual dinner of the Garrison N. C. O.'s Mess held last night at Sandy's. Col. Delamere said that soldiers are the greatest pacifists because of what they know. He added that the world is "in a frightful state at present, and all the wonderful ideas we had at the end of the last war are now in the future."

The guest speaker also referred to the excellent voluntary enlistment record of the island in wartime and remarked that the same thing held true of the Reserve Army in peacetime.

Col. Delamere told of the plans for the Reserve Army summer training schedule next year and revealed that all units, excepting the artillery would train at Maritime points. The P. E. I. Regiment (17th Recce) will train at Sussex and Tracadie, N. B., while the 5th Signals Regiment will go to Aldershot, N. S. The 28th L.A.A. Regiment will continue to receive summer camp training at Ontario army centres.

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One other name was on the ballot, that of Mr. Chester Pratt, of St. Peter's. The balloting resulted in 30 votes for Mr. Douglas and 19 for Mr. Pratt.

Speakers at the convention included Premier J. Walter Jones, Attorney General W. E. Darcy, Hon. A. W. Matheson, Minister of Health and Welfare, Hon. Eugene Cullen, Minister of Industry and Natural Resources, Messrs. T. J. Kiekham, M.P., Russell Clark, M. L. A., and J. B. St. John, M. L. A.

The by-election is being held to fill the vacancy caused by the recent death of Hon. H. H. Cox, Minister of Public Works and Highways.

Catholic Students Form Federation

MONTREAL, Nov. 12 (CP) — Thirty delegates from six Roman Catholic Universities met at the University of Montreal for 13 hours Saturday and founded the Canadian Federation of Catholic University Students.

Purpose of the bilingual body is three-fold: To present the Catholic thought of Canadian students to the governments and the public at large; take part in international activities of Pax Romana; and spread the Catholic thought in regard to the social and professional obligations of students.

Officers elected were: President, Rosaire Beaulieu, University of Montreal; regional vice-presidents, Charles Gorman, St. Dunstan's University, Charlottetown, P. E. I. and Andr. Boudreau, Laval; treasurer, Jean Paul Bazinet, Ottawa University; and general secretary, Ivon Chartier, University of Montreal.

U. S. Woman Physician Arrested In Kidnapping

SANTA FE, N. M., Nov. 12 (AP) — A woman physician who blamed financial worries was held today in the kidnapping of nine-year-old Linda Stamm. The woman, facing maximum penalty of death, is being held in Santa Fe.

Thirty waiting officers seized Dr. Nancy Campbell, 43-year-old obstetrician, Saturday night as she reached for \$20,000 ransom.

Blonde Linda, drowsy from a sedative but otherwise unharmed, was found in the physician's car. It was parked near the Stamm's home in a swanky rural subdivision. She is the daughter of Allen Stamm, well-to-do housing contractor.

The child was abducted Friday. A note threatened death if the ransom demand was not met.

Dr. Campbell, whose short bobbed hair gives her a mannish appearance, told the Federal Bureau of Investigation she planned the kidnapping because of heavy "domestic expenses" and the cost of building a new home.

Dr. Campbell was held without charge in the Santa Fe city jail. Police said she will be charged Monday by the state with kidnaping for ransom. Conviction in New Mexico carries a penalty of five years prison to death.

"I'm only a go-between," Dr. Campbell first shouted. Percy Wyly II, New Mexico F. B. I. chief, said she later orally admitted the kidnapping and drugging.

Counsel for Dr. Campbell raised a sanity issue, saying she was not rational and was reporting a recent head injury.

The arrest was made outside the entrance of the Stamm estate, three miles southeast of Santa Fe.

A package containing the ransom had been placed there as directed in a crudely-lettered note to the parents. It demanded \$20,000 under threats of harm to the child.

Joining to set the trap were agents of the F. B. I., state police and city and county authorities. Men were hidden about the estate entrance.

Officers said Dr. Campbell was treated roughly in the belief she was a man. She wore a man's clothing and carried a .25-calibre pistol. She was caught after dark. Not until after the capture did officers learn they were dealing with a woman.
