

New York Times Cites Relationship

NEW YORK (CP) The New York Times has been set back by the Viet Nam War, warmth in Soviet-Canadian relations. Moscow has been forging new links with Ottawa, a capital in the United States that they have received.

Schwartz says two views can be taken of the Soviet drive to make friends and influence people in Canada. The optimistic view is that Canada's potential usefulness in bringing Moscow and Washington closer together has been enhanced. The pessimistic view is that Moscow is interested primarily in weakening the close Ottawa ties with the United States.

CITES EXAMPLE

The Soviet Communist party newspaper Pravda, Schwartz notes, gave great attention to its summation of the recent Canadian visit of Dmitri Polyanski, Soviet first deputy premier to "Canadian irritation at the massive American economic position in Canada."

The Times writer believes it can hardly be doubted that Canadian-U.S. economic tensions play a big role in Moscow's thinking. He says Moscow also probably has taken into account French-Canadian nationalism and the possibilities through intensified nationalism of a further fragmentation through intensified nationalism and provincialism.

"The makers of Soviet foreign policy," writes Schwartz, "are not so naive as to believe they can make quick and major gains at United States expense in Canada, but they have established a political and economic beachhead that they intend to widen."

That fact deserves to be borne in mind by the leaders of United States government and business leaders who have not always in the past paid adequate attention to Canadian aspirations.

Appeal Given Large Response

OTTAWA (CP) About 2,000 would-be immigrants who entered Canada as visitors have responded to an appeal by Immigration Minister Marchand to apply for permanent resident status.

The immigration department said it received 1,933 applications between Mr. Marchand's statement in the Commons July 8 and Tuesday, July 19.

Ontario reported the most applications with 1,260. There were 19 in Quebec, 93 in British Columbia, 52 in the Prairie provinces and 11 in the Atlantic provinces.

By national origin, Greeks were the most numerous with 464 applications. There were 200 by Italians, 217 by Portuguese and 208 by Eastern Europeans.
