Modernly Designed And Equipped

Located in the former Bergmann Hardware Store. The new co-op presents a fine exterior and interior appearance. It has been especially designed to make full use of the amount of floor space available, not only to permit a complete grocery display but also to allow free movement of customers through self-service.

The idea for a co-op branch in Montague began last year following a survey of the area and a determination of the support which might be advanced to the idea. Several meetings were held under the chairmanship of Mr. R. G. Dennis, Supervisor of Co-ops, who explained in detail the purpose

and aim of the Co-op. With the support received, plans were finalized, and the work begun.

Completely Remodelled

Remodelling of the former store was started last fall with Mr. Dan M. MacDonald as general contractor. The finished interior of the new store is very attractive. The ten-foot block ceiling is painted white, and the donacoona board walls are painted green. The red and cream marbled floor tile supplied by Hilchey and Van-derstine harmonizes with the general color scheme painted by Clarence Landry. Lighting, installed by Gilbert R. Clements, consists of two rows of fluorescents, each row store length, which provides for a well-illuminated interior. The shelving, constructed by Ross Chapman of Amherst, was in-

stalled during the past two weeks, and is of a modern style found in larger city stores. Mr. Robert Machon & Son installed and completed. The hot water heating system throughout the store. Ex-teriorly, the grey front is attractively set off by the new red and black Co-op sign erected above the front store windows.

Store Layout

The new store, 70 by 26 feet, will carry a general line of groceries, fruits, vegetables and meats. Customers will enter the right side entrance door, where nearby, they may pick up the self-service carts. On the right side are displayed fruits, vegetables and groceries, on the left magazines, baby foods, drugs, groceries and dairy display installed by Storey Electric, and in the centre are three display counters of groceries, to the rear are located the meat and fish display counters installed by Palmer Electric, behind which is a large meat cooler and meat cutting room. The manager's office is situated at the rear of the store, while the main office is located upstairs.

The establishing of new businesses in a community bears evidence of present economic status, and augurs well for its future growth and development. The establishing of a modern super-market Co-op at Montague gives recognition that this community is progressing continuously and may well be favored by further expansion in the future.

The charter directors of the new Co-op are: David Knight, James Cain, and Eugene Dunn for three years; Simon Nicholson, Webb Nicholson and Dr. G. S. A. Inman, for 2 years and Doug MacLaren, T. Albert Hicken and Harry Millar for one year.
