

Hap Emms Confirms Story On Local Hockey Player

Forbes Kennedy, Charlotteville's sole representative in the National Hockey League, will report to San Francisco Seals at St. Thomas, Ont. when training camp starts in September. This was the word last night from Leighton "Hap" Emms, general manager of the Boston Bruins when contacted by The Guardian. Emms stated that Kennedy was left unprotected in the draft last week but went unclaimed. Bruins decided to send him to the Seals for training camp purposes.

However, Emms made it clear that Kennedy still had a good chance of getting back with the parent Bruins. "Those who show us the best possibilities will make the NHL club," stated Hap.

A Montreal paper carried a story last Friday stating that Kennedy was left unprotected and would go to the San Francisco Seals.

There was no mention in stories on the draft last week concerning Kennedy. The Montreal story of last Friday was the first mention of the island's lone player in the big time.

Reports were prevalent last night that yesterday's story in The Evening Patriot was totally in error. However, the boss man of the Bruins, Mr. Emms, could find no fault with it.

Naturally Forbes was disappointed at the word. "This is the first I've heard of it," he said. "Usually the club notifies the player in a case like this, but I haven't heard a word yet."

Forbes played with the Charlotteville minor hockey system right from paperweight ranks through to midget. He was playing with a Charlotteville juvenile team when he was still mid-

get age. While playing with this club, he scored 11 goals one night against Bathurst.

Forbes played junior hockey in Halifax and it was while performing here that Montreal Canadiens spotted him. He was taken to the Montreal camp when he was 17 and pleased scout Sammy Pollock to no end. He played out his junior career with the Habs' organization and was then sold to the Chicago Black Hawks. He performed with the Windy City crew for the entire 1957-58 season and had 8 goals and 13 assists.

He was traded to the Red Wings the following year. Here Forbie and general manager Jack Adams had a few differences but despite this Kennedy managed 11 goals and 16 assists.

In his third season in the NHL the Kennedy-Adams feud intensified and Forbie spent a considerable time warming the bench. He was finally shipped to Edmonton Flyers and from there he went to Spokane Comets before moving up to the Boston Bruins.

Prince Edward Islanders now have no representative in NHL hockey. Kennedy was the lone one and his followers felt he never got a real opportunity because he was used mostly in a penalty-killing role.

US Open Champ Venturi Is Now A Forlorn Figure

ST. LOUIS (AP) — "I'm going to see this thing through," Ken Venturi vowed Monday as he prepared to defend his United States open golf championship with numbed, bloodless fingers

that made him wince with every swing. "Let me tell you—I'll see off, and I'll go all the way if it's physically possible. I'd like to win this one—and then quit, never swing another club."

The defending champion, victim of a circulatory ailment, was a forlorn figure as the great of the game began gathering at the mammoth, 7,191-yard Belle River Country Club course for the 65th U.S. open beginning Thursday.

Everybody was talking about Jack Nicklaus, the blond giant from Ohio who already has the Masters Crown and who is aiming to keep alive his bid for a professional grand slam by winning the U.S. and British opens and the PGA in a single year.

"It's going to be almost impossible to beat Jack," said South Africa's Gary Player.

NICLAUS POWERFUL
"I played with him last weekend. He hit only three fairways yet shot 67. He is so powerful, it is frightening."

While the pros and amateurs were debating how to beat Nicklaus, Venturi gritted his teeth and went about his practice.

"I have been off cortisone for three weeks now," Venturi explained. "My arm and back are punctured with holes so all I get now is pain—but for a change, now I'm holding the club."

The San Francisco stylist was stricken with a circulatory ailment in his right hand—similar to that affecting baseball pitcher Sandy Koufax — shortly after winning the 1964 open. He plans to enter Mayo Clinic for an operation next Monday.

FINGERS BLOODLESS
"When I get up in the morning, my fingers are snow white because they have no blood," Venturi said.

"When I start, the fingers are numb, ice cold and I can't bend them. I can't clench my fist. I have to massage them for a couple of hours and then my wife, Conni massages my back to get the circulation going."

After a half hour under a hot shower, "I am able to cinch my fist enough to hold a club."

"When I swing, I don't know when I've met the ball. There is no feel there at all. But using a light woman-type driver, I'm getting better distance—about 15 yards farther than before but still very short."

"I have to paint my palms and fingers with tincture of benzoin to hold the club. When I bring the club back on the backswing, a sharp pain goes through my wrist."

"I can stand the pain. What I can't stand is the numbness, the feeling that I don't have the club in my hands at all. But I intend to play, and I haven't given up yet."

Doug Bentley To Coach At Knoxville

KNOXVILLE, Tenn. (AP) — Doug Bentley, former star of Chicago Black Hawks of the National Hockey League, was named coach of the Knoxville Knights of the Eastern Hockey League Saturday.

For several years, Bentley starred with Chicago as part of one of the greatest brother combinations in hockey history. He was a left wing and brother Max a centre. Max was traded to Toronto Maple Leafs in 1947 at the peak of his career.

Doug Bentley played pro hockey until 1958, finishing his NHL career with New York Rangers. He won the NHL scoring title in 1943 and was a four-time member of the NHL all-star team.

Bentley accepted the Knoxville post at a meeting Saturday night with Knights officials.

"We are tremendously impressed with Bentley," said president-general manager R. O. Deaderick. "The man not only talks like a winner, but also looks like one."

Bentley coached an amateur team last season near his home in Saskatoon.

Pirate Roberto Clemente Keeping Pitchers Awake

NEW YORK (AP) — Roberto Clemente, who says he has trouble sleeping, is keeping opposing pitchers awake at night with an eye-opening performance that has thrust him into the thick of the National League batting race.

"When I was in the hospital with malaria they gave me sleeping pills, but I am awake anyway all the time," the Pittsburgh outfielder said recently.

"When I get better, I can't get to sleep because the team is losing. Even now, it's not easy."

Clemente is the defending league batting title-holder. So his .235 average May 20 was not a true reflection of his ability. He had been weakened by a malaria attack, plus other assorted ills, and his condition was

one of the major reasons the Pirates were in last place with a 9-24 record.

Since then Clemente has hit at a .419 pace, with 39 hits in 93 times at bat. That covers 23 games, of which Pittsburgh has won 20 to climb into fifth place.

IN SIXTH SPOT
Clemente has six safely in his last nine games and the latest figures through Sunday's games place him in sixth place in the batting competition with a .324 mark. He is only one point behind San Francisco's Willie Mays, who is fifth, and five behind the No. 4 batsman, Richie Allen of Philadelphia.

Goedie Coleman of Cincinnati, the leader, fell 21 points to .354 in last week's games, managing only three hits in 15 tries. Joe Torre of Milwaukee rushed

up to tie team-mate Hank Aaron for second place at .335. Torre gained six points with four hits in nine trips while Aaron slumped three points with a 9-for-28 performance.

—Vic Davallillo of Cleveland Indians wrestled the American League lead from Detroit's Willie Horton. Davallillo picked up 13 points to .365 with 15 hits in 15 at-bats last week, a .433 pace. Horton dropped into a second-place deadlock with Boston's Dalton Jones at .353.

Mantilla continues to pace the circuit in runs batted in with 49. Horton slammed two homers and took over sole possession of the lead with 13.

Mays maintained his National League home-run lead, hitting three for a total of 20.

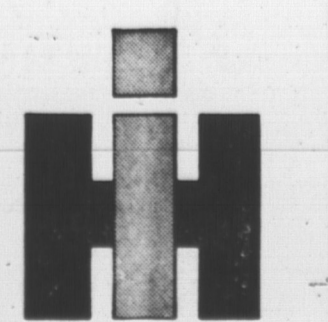
