

Sees Processing Plants As Answer To Vacant Farms

"It would be a good thing if we had a dozen such plants on the island," said George E. Saville (Liberal 5th Kings) in making reference to the new processing plant at Sherwood. Mr. Saville was speaking on the draft address in the Legislature yesterday.

He highly commended the Government for the assistance it had given in getting this plant started and went on to state that Prince Edward Island had vegetables and small fruits that could be surpassed anywhere.

Mr. Saville pictured the extensive growing of fruits and vegetables as the saving factor in the agricultural economy of the province. He believed it would be an important step in preventing the desertion of many farms and would tend to keep the youth at home.

PAY BOOST

The member from 5th Kings felt that the Government did not deserve the criticism it had received for raising the salaries of the members of the House. Mr. Saville said he had made inquiries among his constituents as to whether they thought he was getting too much and not one of them told him that he was.

"I should not get elected in the Fifth District of Kings," he said. "It will not be because they think I am getting too much money."

Mr. Saville expressed the be-

lief that any member who was getting less than the seasonal indemnity was either doing a lot of work for nothing or was doing a poor job in his district.

REFORESTATION

Little need to carry on a reforestation program in the wood lots of the island was the opinion expressed by Mr. Saville. He said many farmers told him they had to burn the areas to prevent

it from growing up in forest. "Our trouble is not in getting trees to grow, it is in keeping our cleared land from becoming overgrown," he said.

Mr. Saville said that great strides had been made in education in the Province over the years. He noted that in 1935 only \$334,200 was spent on education while in 1957 the expenditure in this department was \$1,535,400. In his younger days he recalled that many teachers were not receiving any supplement. In comparing the salaries of other Government employees, Mr. Saville said many teachers were much better paid.

TRANS CANADA

Speaking of the Trans Canada Highway, Mr. Saville said this money came from a Liberal Government and was a tremendous benefit to the Province. He noted however that Kings and Prince Counties did not benefit from the TCH and was under the impression that these two counties would receive special treatment as a result.

Mr. Saville said pavement was needed in several thickly populated areas of his district, including Cambridge, Gaspareaux and Murray Harbour North. He felt that light pavement if given proper care would serve the purpose. He said the people of Dunas and Annapolis were well pleased with the light pavement which they now have.

Progressive Conservatives Hold Meeting In Morell Hall

The Progressive Conservative Party held a meeting last night in Morell Community Hall. Some 250 attended. The chairman was Walter Dingwell.

Those on the platform included John A. MacDonald, the Progressive Conservative candidate for Kings, Walter R. Shaw, the provincial leader, Edwin McDonald, Montague, president of the Young Progressive Conservative Association, Senator J. MacDonald of Cl. for Senator George Dewar, M.L.A. for Second Prince, Dr. J. A. MacMillan of Charlottetown and Leo Rossier, M.L.A. Second Kings. Mr. MacDonald, the candidate discussed Federal legislation at the last session, touching on increases in pensions to the old age group and to veterans. He outlined the housing policy and

national health insurance. Dr. Dewar, a native of New Perth, said he felt very much at home in Kings County. He outlined the great success of the Conservative policy in Prince County.

Mr. Shaw reviewed some of the events in the Provincial Legislature during the present session. He pledged his support to the idea that the provincial ministers should give much more time to their ministerial duties. Mr. MacDonald made a special plea to young people to interest themselves in party politics. Then he outlined reasons why they should align themselves with the Progressive Conservatives.

Senator MacDonald stressed the privilege of voting and outlined the accomplishments of the Diefenbaker Government.

Would Butter Up The Yanks

VANCOUVER (CP) — Senator David Croll said Tuesday the United States can build a higher tariff wall than Canada because "they have more people and more bricks."

He told two Liberal campaign meetings that Liberals want to trade with Britain but not try to divert trade from the U.S.

"If we have a good customer we should try to butter him up and sell him more."

He said the American "Eagle" doesn't like attempts at pulling feathers from its tail. The U.S. had already replied to Conservative government trade moves by cutting oil imports from Canada by 15 per cent.

Senator Croll also said Prime Minister Diefenbaker was saying nothing about higher education because he doesn't want to get in the "black books" of Premier Duplessis of Quebec, who "is opposed to education."

Would Welcome Mr. Shaw To House Says Mr. Douglas

Direct reference to the Provincial Leader of the Progressive Conservative Party was made for the first time in the Legislature this session when Harvey L. Douglas (Liberal, 2nd Kings) told Opposition Leader Bell, "he was sorry that Mr. Bell didn't get a place in the Senate because it would have given the Party leader, W. R. Shaw a chance to get a seat in the House."

Premier: "He could never get elected in that district."

Mr. Shaw's name was not used, but it was obvious that he was the person about whom the Kings member was speaking.

Mr. Douglas went on to say that the Government would welcome the Party Leader as a member of the Legislature because of his long experience in Government circles over the years. As a second thought however, he felt that, "perhaps a man who was now receiving a pension from the Government and one who had earned his living so long under the Liberals, might not be inclined to be so hard on the Government as the present Leader of the Opposition."

that over the past years this club had always had representation at the Maritime and Royal fairs and this year Garth Coffin had won the T. Eaton scholarship which entitles him to four years in any agricultural college of his choice in Canada.

The Second Kings member spoke strongly in favour of the artificial insemination program being carried out by the Department of Agriculture and termed it a great step toward improving the dairy and beef herds of the province.

Mr. Douglas devoted the remainder of his speech to criticism

of the present Federal Government. He said the "Diefenbaker Pie" was not only half filled but it had a distinctive political flavour. He disapproved of the method of distributing the Atlantic grants, stating, "if I wanted to give a lot of money to four sons, I wouldn't throw it at them and let the little fellows get it all from the little fellows."

TRADE POLICIES

He said the Diefenbaker Government through its trade policies was making "bad friends" with the United States. He felt this would be a bad thing to do, noting that the U.S.A. is "one of our best customers."

Speaking of fishermen's unemployment insurance, Mr. Douglas said it had been instituted by the Liberals and today was amounting to about a million dollars a year to Island fishermen. "That's about half as much as the Diefenbaker Pie and it's going directly into the pockets of the people," he said.

In regarding municipal grants, Mr. Douglas said there was no doubt that some of the towns and villages needed help but cautioned that such grants could conceivably "get out of hand".

He said it might come to the point where the areas concerned would not budget at all and rely entirely upon the Government. "Anyhow, how are we going to give money to the municipalities when we are not sure we are going to get it ourselves," he said.

Mr. Myers: "Who said you were not going to get it?"

Mr. Douglas: "Who said we were going to get it?"

Liberal Meeting Held Last Night At St. Peter's Bay

The Liberal candidate for Kings Mr. T. J. Kickham, and three other speakers addressed a meeting at Liberal Party meeting last night at St. Peter's Bay Hall. Those speaking with Mr. Kickham included Harvey Douglas, M.L.A. Second Kings, Thomas Cullen, clerk of the Legislative Assembly, and William Acorn, M.L.A. First Kings.

Mr. Douglas spoke of the social services legislation introduced by the former Liberal Government.

He discussed the "failure of the Conservative Government to give parity prices to the farmers as promised."

He was critical of the Conservatives for calling an election without bringing down a budget and without being defeated on the floor of the house and for spending great sums of money by order-in-council and without the consent of Parliament.

Mr. Cullen spoke of the great benefit free trade would be to

the Maritime Provinces. This had been turned down on two occasions by the Conservatives, once in 1911 and again when it was offered by Great Britain last summer.

Mr. Acorn summarized the Liberal platform and pointed out the advantages of the Pearson Plan compared to vague promises.

Mr. Kickham dealt with the three main issues in the present campaign, defence, trade and unemployment.

He mentioned the large amounts of money which had gone to Kings County for public works under the Liberals and said there were no worthwhile amounts in the estimates for the current year.

SCHOOL BUSES

Mr. Douglas said he was pleased with the Government policy of providing half the cost of school busses. He said the regional high school at Morell was much appreciated by the people of the area. It was giving the children of the community an opportunity of receiving a grade XII education with the grants being promised by both federal parties to university students, more could be expected to take advantage of a higher education.

Mr. Douglas congratulated the Minister of Education on his speech of the previous day, terming it "one of the finest that was ever made in the Legislature."

Turning to roads, Mr. Douglas said great progress had been made in the widening of roads in Kings County but many more remained to be done.

Both Souris And Morell Lose Semi-Final Series

Both Souris and Morell lost out in the deciding games in their semi-final series. Morell lost the third game in their series with Sherbrooke, while Souris was defeated by Lot 16. In both rounds, the Eastern teams have to come from behind to knot the series at a game apiece. Morell had lost by one goal, while Souris had been badly defeated.

There can be no excuse for a town the size of Souris for not supporting artificial ice. Now is the time to get working on this project. The talking stage has come and gone. Action is the need now. There is also enough money at this end of the Island to build this plant. What is needed now is a leader. Someone to get the ball rolling. Volunteers, anyone?"
