College Students Erecting Church

RAYMONDVILLE, Tex. (AP)—It will only \$3 a week with room and board, but 10 Texas College students have given up their summer vacations to build a church in this South Texas town.

In addition to building the church, the students conducted revival services in the Raymondville area and lead regular services here as well. They are members of the First Baptist Church and Primera Iglesia Bautista (Spanish for First Baptist Church). It is a new structure for the Spanish church, which they are building.

The students are members of the Baptist Student Union which has 55,000 members on campuses of 68 Texas colleges. "I wouldn't work this hard for money," says Jeff Crossland, 21, a senior history major at North Texas State University.

The students—25 young men and four girls—sleep in bunk beds in one room and the girls share double beds in the rear of the house.

GIRLS DO HOUSEWORK The boys handle most of the work on the church—often working 15 hours a day—while the girls feed the crew and keep work clothes clean.

The digging of 70 feet of ditches for the foundation was the hardest part of the job. A proffer the first hole was filled the last 4,000 concrete blocks, and the students stepped in to lay the final blocks and do the rest of the work.

Rev. Bill McDaniel, pastor of First Baptist Church, is the building foreman. He once was a carpenter.

"I came here 4½ years ago with the idea in mind of building this church, and it has been a dream of mine," he said. "I wouldn't have been possible

Plan First RC Congress For India

BOMBAY (Reuters)—India's 6,500,000 Roman Catholics are looking forward to the first international eucharistic congress ever to be held in India. It opens here Nov. 28. An invitation has gone from the Indian government to Pope Paul to visit India on the occasion and millions of Indians are hoping that he will accept. No answer is expected until nearer the date.

Thousands of pilgrims from India and abroad are expected for this 38th international eucharistic congress. Hotels already are fully booked, seven ships in Bombay Harbor will be turned into floating hotels and more pilgrims will be housed by Bombay residents or in tents.

A eucharistic congress is held every four years in a different city of the world. It is called by Roman Catholics for a reaffirmation of their faith and a study of problems facing the church in the modern world.

The last congress was held in Munich in 1960. The congress will last nine days.

Huge Claim Filed Against Texas Gulf

TORONTO (CP)—Laird Gull Mines Ltd. and Mastodon-Highland Bell Mines Ltd. filed a claim for damages in the Supreme Court of Ontario Tuesday against Texas Gulf Sulphur Co. which lived in cities of 100,000 and over—33 per cent!

The claim alleges that Texas Gulf's holdings near Timmins, Ont., be delivered to them, of that damages of \$450,000 may be paid.

The damage claim is believed to be the largest ever sought in a Canadian court, according to Supreme Court sources.

Satellites May Boost Service To Canadian North

TORONTO (CP)—Satellites may be used in telecommunication between southern Canada and the Far North. Alex. G. Lester, vice president (engineering) of the Bell Telephone Company of Canada, said the study into the project are going ahead now.

The use of satellites may follow establishment of a commercial inter-continental telecommunication network, expected in 1967, he told the Transportation, Communications and Commercial Travellers Day luncheon at the Canadian National Exhibition.

Canada is well-equipped for telecommunication because of its vast east and west coasts with two major microwave systems, Mr. Lester said.

"But Canada extends 2,500 miles south to north as well as 4,500 miles from east to west. It is true that over 80 per cent of our population lives within 100 miles of the U.S. border, but that tremendous treasure trove of oil and minerals which is the Laurentian Shield, is now and will continue to draw people to the north."

Satellite would overcome the difficult operation of attempting to build towers and stations in the north, said Mr. Lester.
