

Greek King Asks Works Minister To Form Gov't

ATHENS. (Reuters)—King Paul Wednesday asked Public Works Minister Constantine Karamanlis to form a new government following the death of Greece's strong man prime minister, Field Marshal Alexander Papagos.

The king asked Karamanlis to try to solve the Greek government crisis after acting prime minister Stephen Stephanopoulos presented the resignation. Stephanopoulos had been chosen as acting prime minister by Papagos only a few hours before he died.

The 72-year-old military hero died Tuesday night after eight months of illness, leaving his nation faced with an explosive foreign policy issue on the Cyprus dispute and political uncertainty over his successor.

Public services and private businesses closed and flags flew at half-staff.

The prime minister's body was taken on a gun carriage from his home to Athens cathedral, to lie in state till Friday morning, when the funeral will take place with full military honors.

NO GOVERNMENT

Foreign Minister Stephen Stephanopoulos, whom Marshall Papagos nominated a few hours before his death as acting prime minister, said Wednesday "the government does not exist."

Cabinet ministers will, however, remain at their posts to transact current affairs until King Paul, exercising his constitutional powers, settles the governmental question.

No Charge Laid In Big Ben Incident

LONDON (CP)—Police officials today said it is unlikely that any charge will be laid against Lewis Bradford, 41-year-old Canadian ex-lumberjack who Sunday scaled scaffolding to the top of Big Ben.

"I don't think we'll follow it up," said an officer. "He's had his tuppence worth."

Bradford, born in Fort William, Ont., clambered up thin steel repair scaffolding around the 329-foot clock tower at the Houses of Parliament Sunday morning. He was brought down by a squad of agile London policemen and taken to hospital.

British newspapers reported that Bradford made the dangerous climb to gain publicity for "the housing problem."

Conditions In Tampico Serious

MEXICO CITY (AP)—A United States Navy relief mission painted a black picture of ravaged Tampico Wednesday, predicting a mounting death toll and even more serious floods in the wake of hurricane Janet.

"The situation is going to get a lot worse before it gets better," said an officer who flew to Mexico City from the stricken gulf coast oil port of 110,000 population.

Rescue operations are centred on the aircraft carrier Saipan, anchored off Tampico with 14 helicopters, 12 doctors and a large store of food, clothing, and medicine aboard.

Navy reports said hundreds are in "urgent" need of rescue. They told of refugees in trees, on rooftops, on dikes and atop improvised rafts.

"Much of Tampico needs medicine and food and clothing. Our main goal now is rescuing living people," one officer said.

Strikes Plague New Government In Argentina

BUENOS AIRES (AP)—Sudden strikes by meat packers plagued Argentina's new provisional government Wednesday. Army troops surrounded four big plants to prevent disorders flaring from conflict within the giant Confederation of Labor (CGT).

The strikes followed complaints to the government by top CGT leaders that former union chiefs, opponents of deposed dictator Juan D. Peron, were moving to take over CGT-affiliated unions. The CGT, claiming a membership of six million, formed the backbone of Peron's power.

Plants affected are the U.S.-controlled Wilson plant, British-owned Frigorifica Anglo, Argentine-run Smithfield and La Negra, also owned by Argentina interests.
