PROVINCIAL LEGISLATURE

WEDNESDAY May 10.

At the afternoon session, Mr. Shaw continued his remarks. He pointed out that the average deficit from 1880 to 1890 was \$30,063.01. From 1891 to 1898 this government had an average deficit of \$41,114.20. In the face of these figures the Leader will talk for hours about the deficits. In 1894 there was raised in taxes \$41,182 and the deficit was \$20,000. In 1895 the taxes collected amounted to \$48,000 yet there was a deficit of \$32,862. Again in 1896, there was a deficit of \$14,135 in the face of the fact that they collected \$48,450. This was the year before the election when the people were given to understand that arbitration of our claims meant that revenue and expenditure would be made to meet. But the \$14,000 did not represent the full deficit, for vast sums had been carried over. That this was done was evidenced by the fact that in 1897 the deficit was \$38,000, although \$46,785 had been raised in taxes. In the year 1889 they lived up to their reputation, and the deficit was \$35,516 while they received \$46,167 from taxes. It did not make any difference what amount of taxes was collected, a deficit of \$40,000 or \$45,000 had to be maintained.

From 1880 to 1890 the Conservatives paid \$37,183 in interest, or an average of \$3,380 a year. Notwithstanding the large amount the Liberals raised in taxes, they paid for interest \$94,000 an average of \$13,527 a year or \$10,000 more than the Conservatives. Last year they paid \$18,000 for interest, and the estimate for this year is \$18,900. The interest barometer indicates the extent of the debt. The people were, year after year, assured that revenue and expenditure would be made to meet; but as regularly as the years rolled by the deficit was forthcoming.

They intend to issue debentures for \$26,000 for the asylum, and \$25,000 for the Prince of Wales College. These debentures would be an additional charge on the revenue of the province.

The Leader tells us that he expects to receive \$14,000 from a tax on certain classes of traders. From what class is it expected to obtain this amount? Is it the farmers? Is it the intention to raise this amount from the liquor sellers? Is it possible that the Leader who has for years been holding up his hands in holy horror at the liquor trade, and shouting prohibition throughout the length and breadth of the province, is to do this thing? Is it he who is to turn the wheels of temperance back fifty years, and clothe the liquor business with the mantle of respectability?

The debt of the province is \$336,000. Add to this \$25,000 debentures for the annex and \$25,000 for the Prince of Wales College, and it will be seen that the debt is upwards of \$600,000. They have also passed a bill expending \$400,000 for a bridge across the Hillsborough. This will bring the debt up to \$1,000,000. The farmers, upon whose shoulders this burden will mostly fall, find it hard enough to get along now; but when they are compelled to pay interest amounting to \$30,000 per year while the country is going back at the rate of \$45,000 a year, it becomes a serious matter.

On the 27th of April, the Government owed the banks \$53,000. Of this sum there was owing to the Bank of Nova Scotia \$42,000, to the Merchants Bank of Halifax \$10,894.78 and to the Merchants Bank of P. E. Island \$317.64. This is in addition to the statement in the Public Accounts, and the money has been drawn since the 1st of January.

The Leader borrowed \$30,000 from the Credit Foncier, a foreign institution, at the rate of 4½ percent. If the Government can float debentures at 3 percent, why borrow from the Credit Foncier at 4½ percent? In addition to these sums which they borrowed since the 31st of December, they also borrowed \$11,000 by private loans. On the 1st of January they received \$90,000, half the yearly subsidy, and with all these receipts they fell behind to the extent previously pointed out.

With this enormous debt, amounting to upwards of \$1,000,000 if the bills passed through this House are carried into effect, the future of our Island home presents a gloomy future. He had every reason to believe that when an opportunity presented itself the party which has fastened such a burden on the people will be brought to a severe account.

THE ECONOMICAL USE OF FERTILIZERS.

Sir,—In your issue of May 4th, there appeared a communication with the above heading, signed "A Farmer" in which the writer would give advice in the use of fertilizers generally, and those manufactured by the Provincial Chemical Co., in particular.

By means of an extract from a testimonial by R. C. Williams, who tried it on a little patch of potatoes (11 rows 150 feet long) and does not say how much he used, he lauds the use of a brand called "Imperial" and by referring to the low value of "Phosphate Powder" as compared with high-grade mixed fertilizers ranging in value from \$25 to \$34 per ton, he would convey the impression that the "Imperial" was high-grade and one of the best obtainable, while a matter of fact is the same test be applied to both brands it will be found that the "Imperial" is of even less value than the phosphate powder. He says the phosphate powder was largely sold in New Brunswick at \$25 per ton (2,240 lbs) and quotes Fertilizer Bulletin No. 56, issued by the Dominion Government in 1898, as giving it a value of \$14.50 per ton of 2,000 lbs. (equal to \$16.24 per ton of 2,240 lbs.) which means that according to the value put upon it by the Inland Revenue Department, the phosphate powder was sold at about 55 per cent more than it was worth. The price of "Imperial" in Charlottetown in 1898 was, as I understand, still is \$35 per ton of 2,000 lbs., and in this same Bulletin No. 56, issued by the Dominion Government in 1898, I find Imperial superphosphate manufactured by the Provincial Chemical Fertilizer Co., of St. John, N. B., for four samples submitted is given an average value of \$19.58 per ton of 2,000 lbs., or very little more than half the price at which it is being sold. So that while a farmer would complain, and with good reason, of phosphate powder being sold at 55 per cent more than it was worth, his own pet brand "Imperial" was selling at 80 per cent more than the value placed upon it by the Dominion Government.

Now the value of all fertilizers consists in the amount of nitrogen phosphoric acid and potash they contain, and before buying any brand of mixed fertilizer let us figure, from the analysis, what they contain of these ingredients and then consider what we are asked for them as compared with what these ingredients can be purchased for in the very best and most readily available form,—the very ingredients the manufacturer of fertilizers must use if he would produce a fertilizer up to the standard of the Inland Revenue Department. We will take this "Imperial" brand as an example (and if up to the standard it would be about as good as the average brand of mixed fertilizer.) The manufacturer guarantees it to contain of nitrogen 2½ to 3 per cent, of phosphoric acid 10 to 12 per cent and of potash ½ to 2 per cent, therefore if as good as they claim it to be (Bulletin No. 56 says it is not) a ton would contain of nitrogen 55 lbs., of phosphoric acid 270 lbs., and of potash 35 lbs. In English manure, as sold in Charlottetown, this 55 lbs. of nitrogen can be bought in nitrate of soda for \$8.80, the 220 lbs. phosphoric acid in superphosphate for \$17.5 and the 35 lbs. Potash in Muriate of Potash for \$1.61,—making it possible to obtain for \$27.46 the same amount of plant food as should be obtained in the Imperial costing \$35 per ton and probably in a much more readily available form.

These ingredients are sold separately, and may be respiced or can be mixed as preferred by anyone without cost and very little labor the "blending" referred to by a farmer" being simply a question of thoroughly mixing the ingredients so as to have them evenly distributed, and is something no farmer can afford to pay a manufacturer \$8 or \$10 per ton for doing for him. The farmers of England have stopped this years ago, and the "Manufacturer" of Mixed Fertilizers has lost his occupation in that country.

The movement of oats, potatoes and pork is not very extensive. The buyers are paying 34 c for oats, from 32 c to 40 c for potatoes, and from 4½ to 5 c for pork by the carcass. There is no change to note regarding the market for live hogs; 4 c being the prevailing price. There are a great many eggs coming in for which the buyers are paying 9 c.

Hodgson Bro's. Liverpool circuit, state that cheese is only meeting with moderate enquiry, and quotes prices as follows: Finest Canadian, September, October, white and colored, 5½ to 5¾; August, 4½ to 5½. A further decline in all grades of butter is also reported. Finest Canadian creamery, butter, is quoted at 88½ to 92½.
