PROVINCIAL LEGISLATURE.

Budget Debate Still in Progress.

HON. MR. GORDON'S ARRAIGN-
MENT OF THE GOVERNMENT.

Many Interesting Questions Asked
by the Opposition.

MONDAY, May 28.

House met at 5.10.
Hon. Mr. Gordon, Mr. Shaw, Mr. Camp-
bell and others complained that certain
information asked for by them some days
ago had not been tabled.

Mr. A. A. McLean asked the Commis-
sioner of Public Works if it is the inten-
tion of the Government to open a new
road from the Main Post Road at Mount
Buchanan (west end) to the north shore
of Point Prim.

Hon. Mr. McLean said the matter was
under consideration. If deemed in the
public interest the road would be built.

Hon. Mr. Gordon asked the Commis-
sioner of Public Works to table the con-
tract relative to the ferry at Boughton Is-
land, the name of the contractor, and the
certificate of performance of said contract
for the season of 1899.

Hon. Mr. McLean said the information
asked for would be tabled.

Mr. A. A. McLean asked the Commis-
sioner of Public Works whether it is the
intention of the Government to open a
new road from Georgetown Road (at
Alexandria) to Crown Point, Lot 49.

Hon. Mr. McLean said the matter was
not quite settled. He hoped that it would
be settled during recess.

Mr. A. A. McLean asked the Commis-
sioner of Public Works to table a copy of
the contract entered into by the Govern-
ment of this Province and the Island
Steam Navigation Company for steam
service between Charlottetown, Orwell and
intermediate ports, for the year 1900.

Hon. Mr. McLean said there was no
new contract, that they were running on
the old contract at the old rate.

Mr. A. A. McLean pointed out that the
steamer did not call at China Point now.

Hon. Mr. McLean said the captain of
the steamer reported that there was a low
pier at China Point and the depth of
water was insufficient.

Mr. A. A. McLean said he did not think
this was the case.

Hon. Mr. McLean promised to have the
matter investigated.

Mr. A. A. McLean asked the Commis-
sioner of Public Works to table a state-
ment showing how the item of \$22, shown
by the Public Works Report and charged
to S. G. Corrish for fencing road, Char-
lottetown, has been expended, the nature
and location of the work done, and if
by tender, public sale or otherwise.

Hon. Mr. McLean said the statement
would be tabled.

Mr. Birch asked the Commissioner of
Public Works if he had received a peti-
tion from the inhabitants of Western
Road, Lot 6, praying for a culvert and
drain at or near Jacob Duggan's, and if
it is the intention of the Govern-
ment to grant such prayer.

Hon. Mr. McLean said that instructions
had already been given to have the matter
attended to.

Mr. Brown asked the Commissioner of
Public Works if it is the intention of the
Government to open the new road this
summer from Henry Gordon's, Montross,
to the Campbell Road, Lot 3.

Hon. Mr. McLean said the road would
be opened.

Mr. J. F. Arsenault asked the Leader
of the Government if it is the intention
of the Government to pay Clement Arsen-
ault, of Summerside, the sum of \$50 for
a right-of-way through his farm on Lot 14.

Hon. Mr. McLean said Mr. Arsenault
had refused the \$15 awarded him and no
new offer had been made.

Mr. J. F. Arsenault asked the Commis-
sioner of Public Works to table a state-
ment showing how the sum of \$180.00 for
repairs on South West Bridge, Lot 16,
was expended; also a further sum of
\$34.00.

Hon. Mr. McLean said the statement
would be presented.

Mr. M. McKinnon asked the Leader
of the Government to table a copy of the
Report of the Medical Superintendent of
the Hospital for the Insane for the year
1898 as presented by him to the Trustees.

Hon. Mr. Farquharson said the report
called for was tabled a year ago.

Mr. McKinnon said that all the report
of the Medical Superintendent had not
been tabled. It was the part of the Super-
intendent's report that was not tabled that
he asked for.

Hon. Mr. Farquharson said that certain
portions of the Medical Superintendent's
report had been struck out and he would
not like to say what had become of these.
He thought the Medical Superintendent
had exceeded his duty in attempting to
dictate to the Government in his reports.

Mr. Shaw said he understood the ex-
purgated parts of the report were in the
hands of the Asylum Commissioners.

Mr. Campbell asked the Commissioner
of Public Works if he had received a
petition from certain inhabitants of Trout
River in Lots 21 and 22 in Queen's
County, praying for the alteration of a
road across the farm of
Kenneth Gunn from its present site to the
river side, and continuing it across the
farm of Hugh Fraser to a farm occupied

by Angus Fraser. If such petition has
been received, is it the intention of the
Government to grant the prayer of the
petition?

Hon. Mr. McLean said the matter had
been considered and a road obtained from
Mr. Gunn.

Mr. Campbell asked the Leader of the
Government to table a statement showing
the expenditure from 31st December, 1899,
to May 25th, 1900, in all the various
departments of public service, giving the
expenditure in each department separate-
ly.

Hon. Mr. Farquharson said the state-
ment would be prepared and submitted as
soon as it could be made ready.

Hon. Mr. McLean submitted several
statements asked for by hon. members.
He also presented petitions for wharves,
bridges and sea roads.

Hon. Mr. Farquharson tabled a copy of
the Hillsborough Bridge agreement asked
for by the Opposition.

Upon motion of Hon. Mr. Farquharson
the bill incorporating the Freezers' As-
sociation was re-committed and amended.
Third reading tomorrow.

Hon. Mr. Gordon spoke after Hon. Mr.
Farquharson. He said that in all the
budget speeches that had been delivered in
this House he never heard such a speech
as that given by the present Leader. The
Leader first spoke of the Wise matter and
sought to make it appear that the Opposi-
tion were responsible for what had taken
place. But despite the statement of
the Leader it was a grave
question as to the right of Mr. Wise to
have a seat in the House. The Premier
seemed anxious to show that Mr. Wise
was not entitled to a seat. But that hon.
member's resignation had never been
tabled nor had a writ of election been
issued. It is said that the resignation had
been placed in the hands of the Speaker,
and the inference was that the Lieutenant
Governor had failed in his duty. He
(Mr. Gordon) took the opposite ground.
The Executive had failed in its duty and
the people will hold them responsible.
Let us see what Hon. Joseph Howe, an
excellent authority, has to say on the
point. Here it is:

"To embody and carry out the will of
the majority of the people, this is true
responsible Government."
That the electors of West River have
not been afforded an opportunity to elect a
representative in place of Mr. Wise must
be regarded as a violation of the constitu-
tion, in direct contravention of the
principles of Responsible Government.
The extracts from those speeches that the
Executive was responsible for the acts of
the Governor, and upon them should rest
the responsibility for the non-appearance
of the writ. The Premier went on to show
that the province was in a prosperous
condition. But he (Mr. Gordon) did not
see things in that light; he rather thought
things were in a deplorable condition. He
disputed the statement regarding a sur-
plus and quoted from the public accounts to
prove his statements:—

There is also a large amount carried
over, for which we have not yet had a
statement:—

There is also a sum of money
for debentures sold and
counted as ordinary

Deficit \$ 36,915 03

Besides this there is an amount carried
over, the extent of which is not known.
The people do not relish this, neither do
they relish the large debt that is being
added up. The Leader never referred to
the delegations to Ottawa, although it is
claimed that all the way from one to three
millions is to be obtained from this source
and falling in this, arbitration is to be
brought up. A few years ago the present
Leader of the Government condemned
delegations. He said:—

"He certainly expected some reference
to the delegation to Ottawa a short time
ago. He could not see why the members
of the Executive Council should monopolize
all this information until near the
end of the session. * * * It may be
that the Government have a good reason
for concealing the result of their mission.
Perhaps they have done nothing and are
ashamed of it. It was not safe to send
delegations on important matters without
the permission of the House. The House
did not authorize a delegation to Ottawa
this winter, nevertheless a delegation
went."

These remarks are *apropos* to the
visit of the delegates to Ottawa last
winter.

Mr. Gordon had the floor at 11.30 when
the House adjourned.

TUESDAY, May 29

The House met at 10.30.

Mr. Campbell asked the Commissioner
of Public Works to table a statement show-
ing how the sum of \$4,167.88, charged in
the Public Works Report for 1899
to Victoria Bridge, Lot 29, was ex-
pended whether by public tender or
sale; if by tender a copy of all
tenders received, the name of each person
tendering, the amount of each tender, and
the name of all parties receiving money and
the amount received by each person togeth-
