St. Mary's Come From Behind To Take 8-7 Victory Over Moncton

HALIFAX, Jan. 15 (CP)—Tuggle Campbell, a player who came up to senior company with Halifax St. Mary's, tonight led the Saints in an uphill battle to an 8-7 victory over Moncton Hawks in a scheduled Maritime Senior Hockey League tilt.

Campbell scored three goals, one of them coming at 19:43 of the final period to give Saints the win.

Racing Days Over For Your Host

ARCADIA, Calif., Jan. 15 (AP)—Your Host, who broke a leg Saturday in Santa Anita's fourth serious accident in 11 days, will be retired to stud if he mends, his owner, William Goetz, said today.

Veterinarian Dr. L. E. McGee, who is treating the homely little colt with inoculations to prevent infection, said Your Host will never race again.

Goetz plans to keep his four-year-old stakes winner under medical treatment most of this year. Then, in 1952, he'll be sent to the stud farm.

"I only hope," Goetz remarked sadly, "that his sons and daughters can become as good as he is."

Your Host fractured an ulna or elbow—bone in four places as the result of a spill during the \$50,000 San Pasqual Handicap. Only the week before, the colt's regular jockey, Johnny Gilbert, was seriously injured in a two-horse pile-up. Doctors are not sure if Gilbert will ever ride again.

By race track standards, Your Host was a jinx horse. He was born with four white feet, and turfmen call that a bad omen. When still a weanling, Your Host almost broke his neck. That's why his neck was crooked. One eye is lower than the other.

But the ugly duckling won \$384,795 for Goetz, who paid \$20,000 for him, at a Louis B. Mayer dispersal sale.

Dr. McGee said it will take three weeks to determine if the horse can be saved for stud duty.

Joe Louis Begins Training For Bout In Miami Feb. 7

MIAMI Fla., Jan. 15 (AP)—Joe Louis the former heavyweight boxing champion, started daily workouts today for his Feb. 7 match in the Miami Stadium with Cuban heavyweight Omelio Agronome.

Louis was quoted as saying that Agronome's youth—he is 28—and ability to move fast makes up for any lack of experience and he expects "a hard fight."

THE FORUM



A meeting of the Maritime Senior Hockey League executive, plus representatives of the Big Four Clubs held at Moncton on Sunday have brought about a few changes not only in its system of refereeing but also on the number of games in playoff competition. Perhaps in the case of the refereeing "change" is not quite the right word, as it is a revision back to the system earlier in the season rather than an actual change.

From now on it will be two referees and no linesmen, instead of a presiding referee and two linesmen, the latter who had no part in the calling of penalties. Now there will be two men out there who can point the finger and send offenders for a rest in sinners row for a sentence in accordance with the violation. Both systems have been used this year, and apparently league officials feel that the original set-up is the best.

Actually, it is a pretty hard thing to determine between the two systems. It is about six of one and a half-dozen of the other. As concerns calling offside plays, there is no doubt that the one ref and two linesmen is the most efficient method in that department, but on the other hand what about the calling of penalties, which has been a "sore spot" with all four teams this season. In the calling of penalties, there is a lot that one referee misses and although the linesmen may see the infraction, they can't do anything about it. Thus, the two referees system is better in that instance. Although the reason for the final decision is not known, it is likely enough that league officials feel that the penalty angle is a more serious one than the offside, hence the return to that system. The N.H.L. however, like the one and two better. It is apparently just a case of circumstance which confronts the particular league concerned.

The playoffs, however, is something new in this quarter. A best five out of nine game series in both semi-final and final play, instead of the customary four out of seven, could make a lengthy old playoffs if it goes the full route. But of course it will mean more games for the public and hence more gate receipts, plus all of the clubs can gain. That is probably one of the main reasons for the change, while another could be the fact that there is usually quite a period of inactivity between the end of Maritime play and the start of Eastern Canadian playoffs. The starting date scheduled for Eastern Canadian play is not until April 13th, and with the regular schedule of the Big Four slated to wind up on March 1st, these nine game affairs, plus the playoffs with the Cape Breton League for the Maritime title, should bring it out just about right, without anybody having to sit around cooling their heels. The Sounds like a smart idea to us. There is nothing worse than inactivity or the lack of regular competition to take the playing edge off a good club, particularly when they are keyed up to "playoff pitch."

In view of recent events and developments, a lot of people were expecting some "fireworks" at that Sunday meeting of the Big Four. It appears that it didn't quite work out that way although one observer commented that it wasn't exactly "game". It would seem that some Clubs represented were inclined to want to deal in personalities, but others clamped the lid down tight before anything got started — apparently for such a battle of the individual, and the old adage that "a good offensive is the best defensive" proved to be true. That old Boy Scout motto "be prepared" is a wonderful thing, and it doesn't always apply to that particular organization.

It may be noted that one of our fellow sport writers in Moncton took a little bang at Islanders coach-mentor of coach Leo Lamoureux. In his personal column he mentioned that, "If we'd (meaning Moncton Hawks of course) had Mr. Chamberlain to pick a team for us . . ." — he didn't finish the

VANCOUVER, Jan. 15 (CP)—The win label is still plastered over New Westminster Royals.

The Pacific Coast Hockey League leaders aren't showing any signs of letting up on their rough-and-tumble style that's carried them to the top of the six-team professional loop.

The season is more than half over and Royals' form chart goes like this: 26 victories, four ties and 14 defeats in 43 games. It's not bad for a club that went into the tough league with just a 50-50 chance.

Last night Babe Pratt's Royals capped a week's winning streak with a 4-1 victory over the last-place Seattle Ironmen. That victory gave them 54 points — 11 ahead of their nearest rivals.

While Royals were polishing off the opposition, Tacoma Rockets and Victoria Cougars were jockeying for second place. Cougars finally moved into a tie with Rockets last night with a 5-2 win over Portland Eagles.

Royals also took it out on the Eagles. They came up with a 5-0 shellacking last Thursday. Saturday they followed up with an 8-3 win over the fourth-place Vancouver Canucks.

Canucks, meanwhile, were slowly making their way out of the League doldrums. They made it last Tuesday with a 3-0 count over the Eagles.

Eagles are having trouble staying out of the League cellar. They currently are tied with Seattle with 33 points and have lost 10 straight.

Greenberg Has New Slugger For Indians

NEW YORK, Jan. 15 (AP)—Leave it to Hank Greenberg to come up each spring with the top slugger of the minor leagues.

Greenberg one of the American League's greatest sluggers, succeeded Bill Veeck as boss of the Indians at the end of the 1949 season. The Tribe's first spring training drill under Greenberg featured the presence of Big Luke Easter who had pounded Pacific Coast League pitchers the previous summer. Easter proceeded to whack big league chukkers in somewhat similar fashion.

Now comes another minor league fence-buster to the Indians' spring training camp at Tucson, Ariz. He is Harry Simpson, a 26-year-old flycatcher with only two years of minor league experience, who carries the colorful nickname of "sult-case" because of his large feet.

Simpson like Easter, is a left-hand Negro swatter. Like Easter, he makes the jump from San Diego, and like Easter, he carries a "can't miss" tag. The six foot, two-inch 200-pounder had a terrific year with the Padres.

He led the Pacific Coast League in runs batted in with 156 and triples with 19. He was third in the homer derby with 39. His .333 average was good for sixth place. In addition he is fast and is considered a better-than-average fielder.

Greenberg already has awarded one of the three outfield berths to him. It is up to Simpson to hold it.

Another newcomer who may win a regular job in the picket line is Orestes Minofo. Formerly a second baseman, he has switched to the outfield a move that has proved highly successful.

The fleet-footed 27-year-old Cuban batted .339 for the Padres and hit 20 home runs.

One of the 15 new faces at the camp will belong to Lou Klein, veteran National League infielder, drafted from the Pacific Coast League. The former St. Louis Cardinal and Cincinnati Red will attempt to beat out several others for the second base job. He can also play shortstop.
