Have Discovered "Startling" Results In Wood Processing

MONTREAL, (CP)—A pulp and paper expert said Tuesday research in wood processing is leading to such "startling" results that the paper-making business may soon become "only a part of a vast chemical industry" using trees as raw material.

Nell B. Fowler, advertising and sales promotion manager of the Howard-Smith Paper Mills, said scientists in trying to find ways of using waste products in the manufacture of pulp and paper, are discovering methods of producing chemicals for fertilizers and alcohols.

"Research effort to solve a particular problem often leads to an entirely unexpected result and to far more important discoveries than had been sought originally," he told a meeting of the Canadian Progress Club here.

One line of research that had benefited the pulp and paper industry was the development of hardwood trees as a source of supply in the face of fast-decreasing supplies of softwood.

By a new separation process hardwoods and "weed trees" such as maple, birch and beech, could now be used for pulp and paper making at low cost, he said.

Markets

New York Stocks

NEW YORK (AP)—The stock market went back up into new record ground last week after a reaction and recovery lasting a month.

The whole thing was accomplished with comparative ease and with little strain.

The Associated Press average of 90 stocks closed the week at \$135.10. That new 1954 high is 20 cents above the previous mark established Aug. 20 and is the best for the average since Oct. 22, 1929.

There was another notable event last week—the current bull market drive was one year old. A year ago the market hit bottom after a long fall. It was simply sold out.

The rise that followed carried through all obstacles with scarcely a pause until a month ago.

Just as suddenly as it began, the selling dried up, and the recovery started about 2 1/2 weeks ago.

The five most active issues on the New York stock exchange last week were:

Pennsylvania Railroad up 1 1/4 at 17 1/2 on 150,000 shares; U. S. Steel up 1 at 56; Anaconda Copper up 1 1/4 at 42 1/2; Colorado Fuel and Iron up 2 at 18 1/2; and Affiliated Gas Equipment up 1 1/4 at 12 1/2.

Canadian stocks closed the week mostly higher. Dome Mines and McIntyre both gained 1/4 Friday while Canadian Pacific, Hiram Walker and Distillers Seagram each were ahead 3/8. International Nickel was down 3/8.

On the American stock exchange, Royalite Oil gained 3/8 and Lake Shore advanced 1/4.

U. S. Steel

CLEVELAND (AP) American steel mills operated at 66 per cent of rated capacity last week, a jump of 2.5 points, Steel magazine said Sunday.

Noting that it was the highest rate since the end of June, the metalworking journal said business was stimulated by "the approach of winter."

Estimated supplies in each of the four countries with a year earlier figures in brackets were:

United States, 1,201,000,000 bushels (1,087,900,000); Canada, 587,500,000 (569,200,000); Australia, 121,300,000 (61,400,000); and Argentina, 83,600,000 (101,900,000).

The United States 1954 crop, estimated at 977,500,000 bushels, is included in these calculations.

Total exports of wheat and wheat flour from these four countries for the period August, 1953, to July 1954 totalled 639,800,000 bushels, about 25 per cent below the preceding year's 854,200,000.

Exports from Canada decreased to 255,100,000 bushels from 315,500,000, the United States to 280,700,000 bushels from 322,600,000, and Australia to 63,600,000 bushels from 107,000,000.

Argentina's exports rose to 110,300,000 bushels from 38,900,000.

Preliminary estimates place total world exports of wheat and wheat products at some 840,000,000 bushels for the United States from July, 1953, to June, 1954.

For the same period shipments from the four principal exporting countries amounted to about 675,000,000 bushels. In the preceding crop year, world wheat exports

of new models of appliances and automobiles.

"So far, demand from appliance makers has been more noticeable than from automakers," the magazine added.

Biggest jump was at Wheeling where the rates went up 20 points to 90 per cent of capacity. Other increases were at Cleveland, 9.5 points to 77.5 per cent; at St. Louis, 7 points to 66.5 per cent; in the far west, 3 points to 81 per cent; at Detroit, 1.5 points to 65 per cent; at Chicago, 1.5 points to 68.5 per cent; and 0.5 points to 65 per cent at Pittsburgh.

Production dropped 8.5 points to 51.5 per cent at Youngstown and held unchanged at 52 per cent in Cincinnati and 50 per cent in New England.

Additional demand from automakers will come in late October, Steel predicted.

The magazine's composite on finished steel prices held at \$117.77 a net ton and its composite on steelmaking grades of scrap held at \$29.75.

Give Figures On Wheat Exporting Countries Hold

OTTAWA, (CP)—The four major wheat exporting countries had on hand 1,993,400,000 bushels at the end of their crop years on or about Aug. 1, the bureau of statistics said Wednesday.

The supplies for export or carryover were 23 per cent greater than the 1,620,400,000 a year earlier.
