Leadership Training Centre Planned Here By Red Cross

Montgomery Hall the new girls' residence in connection with Prince of Wales College in Charlottetown will be the scene of the Atlantic Provinces and Quebec High School Junior Red Cross Leadership Training Centre this summer.

In making this announcement Dr. K.A. Parker, chairman of the Junior Red Cross committee for P.E.I. said this will be the first such centre ever to be held in the province as up until now there has been no suitable accommodation available. The Island's high school representatives have been attending training centres in the other Atlantic provinces and Quebec ever since these centres were established in 1953.

Designed to stimulate greater interest and participation in the high school phase of Junior

Red Cross activities, the summer centres have also served to develop numbers of leaders for new branches of the society formed after the resumption of school in the fall.

Approximately 100 students and teachers normally attend for a period of ten days — the dates this year are July 3rd to 13th, inclusive, and it is expected that at least 15 of these will be drawn from all the high schools in the province.

KEY MEMBERS

Provincial Directors of Junior Red Cross and their field organizers will comprise the key members of the staff but the over-all administration will be the responsibility of the centre director, still to be appointed. All the preliminary arrangements for this event are being made by Mrs. W.W. Reid, director of Junior Red Cross for P.E.I. A limited number of senior high school students, who attended previous centres, will serve in the capacity of "attaches", and two special guests have been invited from the United States.

Mrs. W.W. Reid said yesterday night that full information on the 1962 event, including a application forms, have been sent to the high schools in each of the provinces concerned, and must be returned to the respective Red Cross headquarters by May 15, after which the selection of the candidates will be made by the provincial Junior Red Cross committees.

Expenses are defrayed partly by the delegates themselves, partly by the school or community which they represent, and the balance is absorbed by Red Cross funds for the administration of the Junior Red Cross programme.

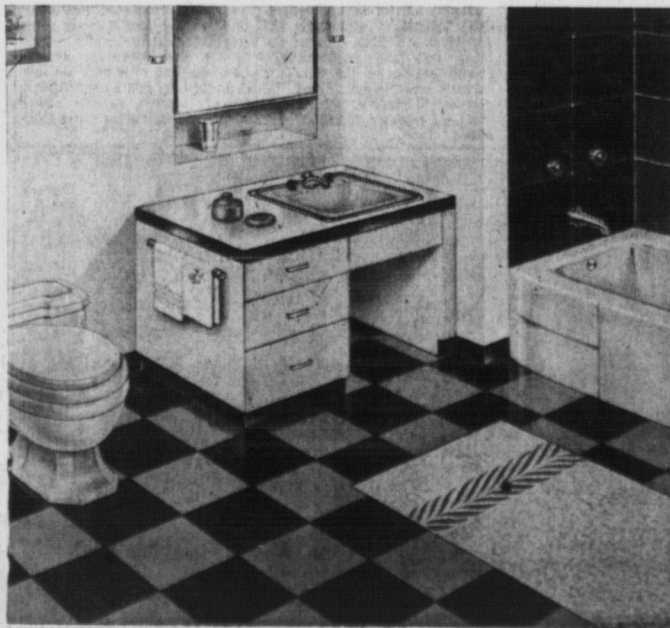
