It will go entirely to rehabilitate flood victims and supply necessities not covered by other agencies. All contributions are deductible for income tax purposes. The urgency of the need speaks eloquently for itself.

Three Dakota aircraft left the airport at the R. C. A. F. Station, Summerside Saturday at noon on a mercy mission in connection with the flood situation at Winnipeg. They were to take on loads of stretchers at Halifax and proceed at once to the flood stricken area. The flight plan called for a refueling stop at North Bay, Ont. and it was expected that the trip would take about eleven flying hours.
It is not known whether they will be retained at Winnipeg for service there or will be sent back to their home base.
The Summerside station is committed to keep four planes ready at all times for service in this emergency.—S.

Coroner Dr. W. A. Shea viewed the body and decided that no inquest was necessary.—S.

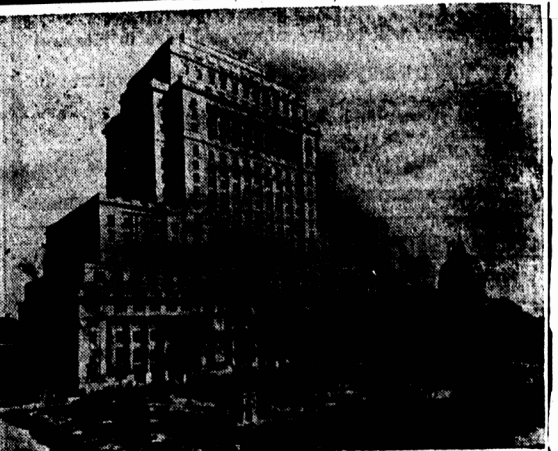
