

Death At Georgetown Of Noted Deep Sea Captain

Capt. J. J. Fitzgerald, internationally known retired deep sea captain, who the American Press in 1944 termed "the world's gamest man" passed away suddenly at his home in Georgetown during the early hours of Friday, January 14 in his 81st year.

The late Capt. Fitzgerald had suffered for some time from a heart condition but had been about his home as usual up to the time of his death.

Born in Cape Breton, Nova Scotia, he spent his years of young manhood in Georgetown and returned there in 1945 to enjoy a well earned retirement.

In 1890 he made his first voyage and from that year to 1905 he sailed on ships which were engaged in coastal and West Indies trading. After serving for a time as mate, he became a ship's master in 1910 and sailed out of United States ports. He is the holder of both American and Canadian Master Mariner's Certificates.

RETURNED TO GEORGETOWN

In 1945, recovered from his multiple injuries, he returned to Georgetown, where he commenced his well-earned retirement. Like his brother, it could be said that he is only in partial retirement from the sea for the love of the sea and of ships is so deep within him, that he daily follows "the comings and goings of ships in and out of the great ports of the world, through the newspapers, on the radio and by correspondence with ship's owners and masters, whose lasting friendship he made during his many years at sea.

He was predeceased by his wife, the former Gertrude Gillis of Charlottetown whose death occurred early in 1952 and by his eldest son Capt. Jack Fitzgerald who was lost at sea in February 1952, when the American Tanker "Pendleton" split in two and foundered off Cape Cod. NEW DELHI, (Reuters) — Prime Minister Jawaharlal Nehru declared here Wednesday there is no chance of India going to war with any country, though it has certain "problems" with some.

"He expressed surprise at recent reports that he had said war with Pakistan was not improbable when talking to a meeting of his Congress parliamentary party Dec. 22.

Wednesday's statement was issued to "remove any misapprehension" about remarks made at the meeting. The text of Nehru's remarks, released two days ago, quoted him as saying that, though there was really no danger of India going to war, there were "exceptions"—like Pakistan, Goa and, on an international level, South Africa.
