

Huge Crowd Attends 75th Anniversary Of St. Marys

Hundreds of people yesterday gathered at Souris by the Sea to observe the 75th anniversary of the historic St. Mary's Convent which through the years has stood on the hill overlooking the town, a sentinel of the Faith and a reminder to both young and old of the great part it has played in the education and culture of the community. The Convent is presided over by the Sisters of the Congregation of Notre Dame.

Included in the large number of visitors who came to join in the celebration was Most Rev. L. Nelligan, D. D. of Windsor, Ontario, a native of Tignish, Prince Edward Island. Many of the convent's alumni from all parts of Canada and the United States were present for the occasion.

The celebrations started at 10 a.m. with Pontifical High Mass celebrated in St. Mary's Church by Most Rev. Malcolm A. MacEachern, Bishop of Charlottetown, assisted by Rt. Rev. J. A. Murphy, D. P.

His honor was very much pleased to see the Rev. Fr. Bennett MacDonald and Rev. Finley Mullally, Deacon of the Mass with Rev. Pius Murnaghan and Rev. Edwin Steele as sub-

deacon. Master of Ceremonies was Very Rev. P. F. MacDonald. Rev. Joseph Mullally was assistant Master of Ceremonies.

REVIEW HISTORY

The 75 years of the convent's history were reviewed in the sermon delivered by Rev. George MacDonald, St. Margarets, Bishop MacEachern gave a very interesting and enlightening talk on the history of the Congregation of Notre Dame. Bishop Nelligan also addressed the large congregation present.

At 12 noon a banquet was held in St. Mary's Parish Hall with Monsignor J. A. Murphy presiding. Toasts to His Holiness the Pope and to Her Majesty the Queen were proposed by Monsignor Murphy. This was followed by an address of welcome by Miss Helen McIsaac, president of St. Mary's Alumnae.

His Worship, Mayor B. L. Stewart, on behalf of the people of Souris welcomed the visitors to the observances. The toast to Our Country was proposed by Miss Mary J. Dickie, a member of the Alumnae. Dr. A. A. MacDonald, a toast to our graduates proposed by J. J. MacDonald, a member of the

School Board, was responded to by J. K. MacDonald, P. H. O. A toast to Our Alma Mater was proposed by Miss Mary MacIsaac, the N. and responded to by Mrs. N. MacPhee.

SOLEMN BENEDICTION

Solemn Benediction was said at 1:00 p.m. and the blessing of a statue erected to St. Mary on the convent grounds took place at 4:00 p.m. with Bishop MacEachern presiding.

At 5:00 p.m. an afternoon tea was served at the Convent and at 7:30 an Alumnae reunion was held at the Parish Hall. Miss Helen F. McIsaac gave the main address. An interesting feature of the alumnae gathering was a resume of their experiences as student of the convent given by three ladies each representing one of the 25 year periods of the Convent's life.

The first 25 year period was recalled by Mrs. Adrian MacIsaac who has passed her four score and ten years. The second period was recalled by Mrs. Adrian MacIsaac and the third period by Miss Marie Paquet, R. N. A. tribute to the senior members of the Alumnae was given by Miss Catherine Mooney.

Second Schooner On Marine Railway Slip At Georgetown

The 50-ton auxiliary schooner George and Beulah of Murray Harbor, under command of Capt. Milton J. White, is scheduled to be launched from the Georgetown marine railway slip at 8 o'clock this morning. The vessel was hauled on the slip at 8 a.m. Tuesday.

Repairs included caulking and work on the iron work on the rudder.

Both Capt. Wally White, whose schooner was the first one hauled on the slip on Aug. 14, and Capt. Milton J. White are enthusiastic about the slip and the advantages it offers to owners of schooners and dragners in this Province. Work can be done more cheaply

and the long run to Pictou is eliminated.

Mr. Lemuel MacCormack of Georgetown is the dock master and is responsible for the ships on the slip and supervises the operation of the cradle during haulouts and launches.

Mr. Frank Parker, also of Georgetown, operates the machinery that hauls and launches the ships. In conversation with Mr. MacCormack, it was learned that a finger pier will be constructed alongside the slip and that a storehouse is being erected to store staving, blocking and other equipment and also that a well will be drilled on the premises.

Hear Court Cases At Georgetown

At Magistrate's court at Georgetown yesterday, before Stipendiary Magistrate Gilbert Gaudet, Dennis Mossman, charged under the Criminal Code with escaping jail, pleaded guilty and was sentenced to two years in Dorchester Penitentiary.

Mr. A. Dickie, charged with breaking, entering and stealing also pleaded guilty and was sentenced to two years in Dorchester Penitentiary.

Four persons were charged under the Highway Traffic Act. One from Georgetown and one from Pictou were each fined \$5.00 and costs for driving a vehicle without an operator's licence. A man from New Perth was fined \$5.00 and costs for driving a vehicle without brakes and a man from Georgetown, who was in a collision, was fined \$5.00 and costs for failing to stop at the scene of an accident.

Four persons were also charged under the Temperance Act. One from Summersville and another from Peters Road were each fined \$25.00 and costs or thirty days in the Kings County Jail for possession of liquor not purchased at the vendors. A man from Murray Harbor North was fined \$20.00 and costs or thirty days for possession of liquor in other than his residence, and a man from Launching was fined \$20.00 and costs or thirty days for being intoxicated in a public place.

Under the Montague Town Act, a man from Murray Harbor North accused of horn blowing was fined \$3.00 and costs or five days. The same man was also charged under the Highway Traffic Act, and was fined \$2.00 and costs for having more than three persons in the cab of a truck.

A resident of Gaspareaux, who did not appear, had a warrant issued for his arrest.

Mr. J. P. Nicholson, Crown prosecutor for Kings represented the Crown in all cases.

Fish, Game Topics Discussed At Murray Harbor No. Meeting

A very enthusiastic meeting of the Southern Kings Fish and Game Association was held in the Murray Harbor North Hall Tuesday night with 45 men and three ladies in attendance. Routine business was attended to.

The pheasant release was one of the main topics of discussion. Mr. Harvey Moore, one of the members of the bird committee gave a report of the birds released. Several of them have been sighted and appear to be doing very well.

The gravel washing subject once again was discussed, and the members failed to see why this matter cannot be corrected immediately by the authorities.

Mr. John White, provincial game warden gave a report on the work done by the association at the Provincial Exhibition. In his report he stressed that every member of the association is a warden, and should report any irregularities or lay charges; and

that the support of all members would go a long way in protecting wild life.

License regulations were discussed, and Mr. White said he would have Mr. Jenkins clarify the matter in his column, The Hunter's Corner.

It was moved that the parent body of the association be asked to have ponds in Southern Kings investigated re the stocking of rainbow trout. Ponds mentioned were, Graham's Pond, and Leitch's Pond.

Mr. Harvey Moore gave a very detailed report on the duck situation, saying that the duck population never looked better at this time of year, and that ducks surviving per female run between six and eleven.

Films procured from the National Film Board were shown by the president of the Southern Kings Fish and Game Association, Mr. Gilbert Clements, and were thoroughly enjoyed.

Magistrate's Court Held At Souris

Before Magistrate Gilbert Gaudet in Souris yesterday a resident of Moril for operating a motor vehicle not properly equipped, was fined \$5.00 and costs or five days.
