Mr. T. P. O'Connor, gives the following pen portrait of Paderewski: "You can hear Paderewski at several concerts during the season, but it is just once or twice that you can hear him at a private entertainment, and then he has been paid a little cheque for £1,000 for the hour or less that he plays. What a thing it is to be an artist of genius! I was sensible enough to come shortly after half-past ten and I had a good seat. I need say little of Paderewski's playing; everybody has by this time heard him, and his style is known. He is a strange and almost uncanny being, this man with the great shock of pale red hair, pale blue eyes, the small pale red tuft of hair on the small chin; the long, pallid and almost expressionless face. I should think Paderewski is an extremely shy man. When he is applauded he bows, not to the audience, but straight in front, as if it were to the piano; and he seems relieved when he can get away from the platform. He is so impassive, moves so little, seems so absorbed in his piano, so unconscious of all around, that his figure gives you a strange sense of silence and stillness; he looks—with the yellow-see of the hair, the pallor of the cheek, and the frailty of the figure, the light colour and the remote gaze in the eyes, and the absolute absence of all expression— weird and spectral and sphinx-like."

**ST. DUNSTAN'S CATHEDRAL.**—A very large and representative meeting of St. Dunstan's congregation was held last evening in the basement of the cathedral, with a view of taking into consideration the organization of a bazaar, this coming fall, in aid of the cathedral fund. Judge R. Reddin occupied the chair, and Mr. Henry Hughes acted as secretary for the meeting. All assembled were unanimous in the opinion that a bazaar should be organized and the greatest enthusiasm for the success of the project was manifested from all quarters. An energetic and active committee of about one hundred and fifty members—eighty ladies and about seventy gentlemen—was selected to arrange and put into execution all the details connected with the proposed bazaar. Judge Reddin was appointed chairman of the general committee. Dr. Morrison, Treasurer, and J. M. Sullivan, Secretary. Of the ladies section of the committee Mrs. McIntyre of Government House, was elected president; Mrs. James Eder, Mrs. McDonnell and Mrs. F. P. McCarron, 1st, 2nd and 3rd vice presidents respectively, Mrs. Gaban, treasurer and Miss Fennessey, secretary. It was decided to arrange all the details at a future meeting to be held the beginning of next week. The intention is that the bazaar take place in the spacious basement of the new cathedral. Judging from the enthusiasm and earnestness of last night's meeting, we feel assured that the proposed bazaar will be an excellent one.

### Local and Other Items.

**OLD ANCHORS.**—All members of the old Anchors are requested to meet at Large's rooms to night at 8 o'clock for special business.

**THE ELECTRA.**—The Electra arrived on her regular weekly trip last night, bringing the usual full cargo of lobster, cheese, eggs and wool. She sailed at one o'clock with a general cargo of supplies and a quantity of farming machinery.

**DIG THEM UP.**—The jail square which has been used for the past two summers as a dumping ground for all sorts of city refuse and rubbish, is now overgrown with a crop of thistles and other weeds. These should be dug up before they seed and add to the troubles of city gardeners.

**WELL DONE, CANADA.**—Bertram, the Canadian markeman, won the Dominion of Canada challenge trophy in the National Rifle Association meeting, which closed on Saturday. He also won the Gold Cross £20 sterling for the highest grand aggregate in the seven competitions. Bertram also won the challenge trophy for the best 500 yd. aggregate. Blair, of the Canadian team, won the Wingrove Cup for the best long range aggregate score.

**HAY IN NEW ENGLAND.**—The hay crop all through the New England States is going to be short. The most reliable authorities agree that it will be little better than half the average yield. The hay crop throughout New Brunswick and Nova Scotia will it is generally conceded, be fully up to the average. The prospect a few weeks ago was rather discouraging, but the wet weather has wrought a great change. There is no doubt the farmers will have a large amount of hay this fall for export.

**REGATTA AT GEORGETOWN.**—A regatta and tea will take place at Georgetown on Wednesday the 9th of August next, when all the best boats and boatmen in King's County will contend for possession of the beautiful Silver Challenge Cup presented to the Georgetown Boating Club by Mr. Justice Hodgson. Liberal cash prizes are offered for boat, dory and swimming races. On the same day the ladies of St. Mary's Roman Catholic Church will give a tea on the grounds overlooking Georgetown harbor.

**SHIPPING.**—The schooner Sir Louis with a cargo of pressed hay sailed this morning for Sydney, C. B.

The brigantine New Dominion, A. T. Hare, Master which arrived here from Dalhousie, N. B., last Sunday, this morning commenced discharging at the Bee Hive lumber yard the largest cargo of lumber brought to Charlottetown for some time. It consists of palings and spruce and pine boards.

The schooners Welcome and Ella Maud are landing lumber and the schooner Sea Flower a cargo of lime Messrs Poole and Lewis.

The schooner Henry G. Ives is undergoing considerable repairs at Poole and Lewis' wharf.

**SACKVILLE'S CATTLE.**—From the first of January up to and including yesterday 827 head of cattle have been shipped from Sackville. The majority of these have gone to Halifax and St. John. During the month of June over 200 head were shipped. It would take two trains of 19 cars each to transport these cattle. When killed they should dress about 410,000 pounds of beef. Allowing a family two pounds per day this quantity of meat would last them over 560 years. Averaging these cattle at \$40 per head the whole number would be worth \$33,080.—Sackville Post.
