

Trinity United Reports Progress in Past Year

Reports presented to the annual meeting of Trinity United Church last evening indicated progress had been made during the year in practically every sphere of church work.

In the report of the session, it was noted that the congregation of Mount Herbert and Bunbury had been attached to Trinity as a preaching point during the past year. The session also reported that good attendance and an enthusiastic response had been maintained.

The dinner was presided by Rev. William Simpson, pastor at Morell, who briefly addressed the congregation.

The family succession of the church was discussed, resulting in a large degree of approval of the committee.

Reports from some 36 or 40 families from Trinity and Spring Park were received. One of the largest of these was from a preaching point, newly-formed in 1962.

The treasurer's report from Trinity showed a balance of over \$1,000 on hand. Funds were taken in through three main money-raising projects and contributions in monthly envelopes.

A report from the organist and director of choirs, Royton F. MacNeil, showed that senior choir membership at Trinity had dropped to the lowest enrollment in a number of years.

Other reports included those of various youth groups, among them being scouts and guides; the Irwin Children Fellowship Group; Willing Circle of the Kings' Daughters; Silver Cross Circle; Excelsior Circle; Young Adults' club; and men's clubs.

Received into the church through profession of faith or transfer of membership were 153 persons, bringing the total membership of the congregation, including Spring Park, Mt. Herbert and Bunbury to 2,132.

300 ATTEND MORELL DINNER

Athletics Play Important Role, Sportsmen Are Told

Sports enthusiasts from all walks of life, representing more than a dozen villages and towns from Summerside to Souris, were on hand for last night's second annual Morell Sportsmen's Dinner, held in the spacious gymnasium of Morell's new regional high school.

Approximately 300 persons, including many of the leading sports personalities in the province, attended the function, proceeds of which are earmarked to pay for a community rink now in its first year of operation.

Mr. MacFarlane, director of physical education and athletics at Mount Allison University, Sackville, N.B., the guest speaker for the evening, drew from a long, successful career as a coach at Mount Allison and various schools in the Montreal area to give his large audience an outline of the psychology of coaching; the role of athletics in the present day program; and an insight into the thinking of a young athlete and the lessons he can learn from participation in sports.

PARENTS FIRST Developing the theme that parents are educators, first and foremost, and that they have deep pride in the attainments of their sons in every facet of life, he made it clear that the coach should deal with youth in a manner which they themselves would have done.

"I have no time for coaches who place all their emphasis on winning," he said, pointing out that lessons learned from mistakes are the most essential part of the overall plan. He stressed the fact that athletes must condition their attitudes to sports so that they can enjoy competition, no matter what the outcome of the contest.

Mr. MacFarlane expressed the opinion that today's youth, as he found them, are superior to youth in previous generations and in this regard he stressed the importance of conditioning them to respect their superiors and to respect the necessity of treating them with respect.

LAUDS COMMUNITY He lauded the sportsmen of the community for their untiring efforts on behalf of the young people, and in this regard he was waiting for someone to provide him with a million dollars worth of facilities, you are getting out and doing it for yourselves," he noted.

The guest speaker was introduced by Rev. A. D. Elliott, pastor of the church.

Snow Removal Costs In City Are Light-So Far

City authorities yesterday reported that considerable amount of money saved in snowfall removal this winter, compared to last year.

At the time, Councillor Elmer MacRae, chairman of the city council, warned against complacency as he pointed out that February is traditionally a bad month for snow in Charlottetown.

Mr. MacRae quoted from records of the snow survey, showing that last February blizzards in Charlottetown under 34.7 inches. The average for March is 18.9 inches, but once again last year a jump over this figure to see 22 inches dumped here.

The cost of snow removal this year has not yet been determined, as there has been no breakdown to date in the snow survey. However, last year the city budgeted \$100,000 for this purpose and actually spent \$100,000. The previous year the budget figure was \$90,000 with that being the actual cost.

A provincial park, containing boating facilities, campsite, picnic grounds, will be established in the Mermaid area. Industry and Natural Resources Minister Leo Rossiter said yesterday.

The land, including Mermaid Pond, will be expropriated for the park by the government but has been published in newspapers.

Mr. Rossiter also said that his department hopes to establish a park "on the South Shore," which could be easily accessible to the people of Charlottetown.

"A site of about 20 acres would be suitable," he said.

Commenting on plans for the park, Mr. Rossiter said that by the use of dams, the water level of Mermaid Pond will be raised about six feet to provide boating facilities.
