

Canadian National Vice-President To Retire Soon

MONTREAL.—Stan F. Dingle, Systems Vice-President of Canadian National Railway, retires at the end of this month, following a career which saw him rise from railway clerk to one of the top railway jobs in Canada.

Mr. Dingle grew up in Winnipeg, where he joined railroads and service in June, 1929 with the Grand Trunk Pacific Railway Company, three months before the company became part of the Canadian National Railway system.

Since that time, he has progressively moved forward with Canadian National and for the last 10 years has been Vice-President of Operations and later, System Vice-President—all in a period which has seen

CN take rapid strides forward in the field of both freight and passenger transportation.

Mr. Dingle was educated in Winnipeg and took special courses in mathematics and aeronautics at the University of Manitoba.

A year after joining the company, he was appointed secretary of the assistant chief engineer and later moved to the office of Assistant General Manager, Winnipeg.

Following various appointments in Manitoba, Mr. Dingle served for close to two years as General Superintendent, Alberta District, and in 1946 was appointed Chief of Transportation, Montreal, with system jurisdiction.

More Autonomy For Yukon Suggested By Committee

OTTAWA (CP) — The federal government should consider making firm proposals on increasing the executive responsibility of the Yukon territorial council, a Confins committee that toured the North has reported.

The committee, in a report tabled in the Commons by chairman Hubert Badaac (L-Fort William) discussed demands for more local autonomy in both the Yukon and the Northwest Territories.

It said the Yukon has reached a more advanced stage of community life and government. Local spokesmen felt the time had come for the council to take more executive responsibility.

"In this regard, it is recommended that the government give consideration to advancing firm proposals at the earliest date in consultation with the Yukon people."

The committee made no recommendations on what it called a "growing demand in all parts of the Northwest Territories for a greater degree of self-determination and self-government."

Impact From Hanoi Hannah Slight On American Troops

By KENNETH L. WRITING SAIGON (AP) — Hard-hearted Hanoi Hannah, a radio voice of Communist North Viet Nam, just doesn't have it.

Perhaps she's trying too hard. Even the more sophisticated U.S. soldiers find Hannah's heavy dose of propaganda on the full side. And her music is not tops in pops.

Hanoi Hannah follows in the footsteps of the Second World War's Tokyo Rose and Axis Sally. They also tried to attract listeners a n d win influence among English-speaking troops.

The broadcasting formula seems simple: Get a girl with a sexy voice and a batch of North American records likely to appeal to lonely servicemen, intersperse legitimate news items with subtle propaganda and sit back while grumbling and dissonance spread among the enemy.

Hannah falls on at least two counts. Her voice isn't sexy and the propaganda pitch isn't subtle.

"WIVES UNFAITHFUL" Axis Sally and Tokyo Rose often addressed their dulcet tones to specific enemy units. They told individual soldiers and sailors that their wives were being unfaithful while their men faced death.

Hannah is less specific and more political.

Her half-hour show is broadcast on the shortwave band daily, starting at 9 p.m. on 11940 and 9835 kilocycles.

The show usually ends with Hannah reciting the names, ranks and branches of the service of Americans killed in Viet Nam. These are released by the defence department in Washington.

Her basic pitch to Americans is: "Go home, you are not wanted here."

Hannah has been on the air since the buildup of U.S. troops in Viet Nam started in 1965. Her name is not actually Hannah—this is a tag given her by U.S. troops—but something that sounds phonetically like "Hung Tu."

Linguists in Saigon guess she learned her English in Eastern Europe. It is precise and rather studied, not colloquial.

Hannah is about to get some competition for U.S. soldiers' listeners from a blonde, husky-voiced Hollywood starlet, Chris Noel.

The former baton-twirling champion from Palm Beach, Fla., will make tape recordings to be flown to Viet Nam for broadcast on the U.S. armed forces network.

"It's going to be a gas," she told The Associated Press in Hollywood recently. "I'm picking the records myself and saying just what ever comes into my head."
