The well known business man and sportsman, Bill Michael, was a visitor at Skowhegan, Maine, race fair last week. It has been going over a hundred years and is the top fair of the Potato State. Harness racing big call there and the track record in the 2:02 1/2 made by Ray Henley in 1937 and equalled by Little Pat in 1939. The trotting record is 2:04 3/4 made by Arch Hanover in 1935.

Promises to be a fast trotter and she will be a game one as she is by Kalmuck and his get are renowned for possessing that quality. Many will remember her dam, McBurn's Magic, that was brought here by David S. MacLeod, who was the breeder of Winnifred, and we are sure that when he saw the summary he would be very pleased indeed as he was a strong believer in her future greatness. Miss Worthy Dale (Stead) was 2-8, Robert Lee (MacGregor) 7-2. Both dashes in the Class A Trot were won by the 3-year-old Clean Up 2:09 1/5, owned by Donald Rankin, Balls Creek, C. B. Clean Up was sold at Harburg the fall of 1932 and purchased by Heber Sweeney, who afterwards sold him to Mr. Rankin. His all time winnings are over \$10,000. A very close second in both dashes was Sir Francis Drake, driven by George Sobey. Time, 2:14 4/5, 2:15. The class BB Pace was split up with Captain Morgan, owned and driven by Marne Kennedy, O'Leary, 1-4 and the 3-year-old Bruce's Sister, owned by George Brookings and driven by Don MacNeill, 8-1, Janet Clegg (Sobey) 3-2, Miss Commando (Collins) 2-3. Time, 2:18 2/5, 2:13 4/5. Bruce's Sister and Janet Clegg are three-year-olds and the latter holds the record for 2-year-old Maritime bred pacers. Bruce's Sister is a full sister of Robert Bruce 2:09 2/5 and she looks like a coming star. They are by Abner T. Clegg 2:04 1/2 and out of Nakomis by Calumet Budlong.

"The 2-year-old pacers have raced three times in this state and the three in the Akerman stable of Skowhegan seem to be much the best. The June Morning colt by Morris Hanover is a nice big colt that won at Bangor in 2:19 1/5, but he is not up to beating those three that were all bred by Clarence Black, formerly of Woodstock, and sired by his two young untitled stallions. The best 3-year-old, Maine is McGee Volo of Volo H. dam, Ann Royal 2:09 4/5 by Abner T. Clegg, dam, Janet Bud by Calumet Budlong. Ann Royal was bred by George A. Calbeck, Sumner, Maine. McGee Volo took a mark of 1:08 easily early in the season and he went that fast at Presque Isle when third in the free-for-all Sep Hanover in 2:07 4/5.

"Mr. McGee 2:08 2/5 and his full sister, Marcia Clegg, both bred in your province, are racing well. Mr. McGee won at Skowhegan in 2:17 for 1 1/16 miles. The mile was in 2:09. The 4-year-old Marcia Clegg won in 2:12. Martimers will also be interested to learn that the get of Watchm 2:06 were racing well at Skowhegan. Frank Adams won the CC Trot from a good field in 2:13 1/5. Watchm's Angel won the Free For All Trot, purse \$1200, from the best two trotters here in 2:07. I was the owner of Clarinda Grattan 2:12 for five years and only got two foals from her, Earl Grattan 2:11 1/5 and Linda Belle 2:16 2/5. After selling her she produced three foals in three years and has a very good 2-year-old, Miss Prudy Lee by Mighty H. racing at Saratoga, N. Y. where she was close in 2:09 and her official time was 2:10. The free-for-all Sep Hanover looks like the best pacer in Maine at the present time."

Rennie MacDonald achieved one of his ambitions Saturday at Blue Bonnets Raceway when he drove Harry Hirsch's trotter Roll On 2:05 to a win in the second dash of the Free For All Trot. The distance was a mile and one-eighth and Roll On's time, 2:15, equalled the track record for the distance. The purse was \$2,000 and the fastest trotters in Quebec took part, also. Brewer's Gallon 2:09 4/5.
