It is made up of selections from the operas of Offenbach, a farce full of twenty characters, several readings, and choice selections of vocal and instrumental music. THE DRAMA.—The Charlottetown Dramatic Club under the management of Mr. W. C. Whitlock, have decided to give a performance in aid of the sufferers by the recent West Mount Stewart, have begun rehearsing Bouffault's five act drama "The Streets of New York" with that object in view. The performance will be given in the Opera House about the last of next month. The move is a commendable one, and we trust the performance will be well attended.

PERICE COURT.—This forenoon Angus Macdonald was convicted of a third infraction of the Canada Temperance Act, and was sentenced to two months imprisonment. Another case against Mr. Macdonald was dismissed. The case against H.C. Connolly was also dismissed. P. S. Brown's case was adjourned for further evidence. Wallace Rice, charged with refusing and neglecting to support his children and putting them out of doors at ten o'clock on Friday night, was remanded for eight days.

LADIES EXCHANGE.—The Ladies Exchange in the refreshment room of the Maritime Temple tomorrow afternoon promises to be a great success. The ladies in charge have been hard at work for some weeks past preparing for the affair, and have arranged for a display that cannot fail to please everyone. There will be fancy goods galore, also all kinds of refreshments. ANOTHER FIGHTER KILLED.—The Lavigne-Brown fight at New Orleans on Friday night had a fatal termination. Brown was knocked senseless in the eighteenth round, and never regained consciousness, drag to the hospital next morning. The coroner's jury reported that death resulted from concussion of the brain, which, the coroner stated, was probably caused by the head striking the floor when the knockout blow was administered to the defeated man. Lavigne was arrested on a charge of murder, and his seconds and associates were also placed under arrest as accessories. It is but a short time since Ed Fitzsimmons caused the death of Con Bradley in a similar way. It is said that Fitzsimmons has telegraphed his sympathy to Lavigne and has offered financial assistance.

MARRIAGE BELLS.—Another interesting event took place this afternoon at 3 o'clock, the happy man being Mr. John McMillan, of the Pioneer staff, and the lady Mrs. Mary Cairns, daughter of Mr. Robert Cairns, elder of the Presbyterian congregation of Bellevue and Freetown. The first bridesmaid was Miss Matilda (Filly) McMillan, of Brackley Point, cousin of the bride, and the second was Miss Jane McMillan, a sister of the first bridesmaid. The groom was supported by Mr. Alexander Cairns, brother of the bride. The ceremony was performed by Rev. E. M. Dell, B. D., Presbyterian Minister of Summerside, at three o'clock at the home of the bride's father, in the presence of a number of immediate relatives. A very elaborate tea, Mr. and Mrs. McMillan will drive to their home in Summerside in the evening. THE EXAMINER joins in the congratulations.

THE MAN IN THE MOON.

The Rev. D. B. McLeod, of Orwell, delivered in St. James' Hall, last evening, to a select and appreciative audience, a scholarly discourse on "The Man in the Moon." Besides telling all that he knows about this exalted individual, with evident reference to the important physiological fact that "a little nonsense now and then is relished by the best of men," the learned lecturer contrived to introduce in a quiet way, a great many very decided bits in respect to mankind and other things in this mundane sphere, with some good, wholesome advice to young and old. The rippling wit and quaint wisdom with which the lecture abounded made it very enjoyable. A hearty invitation to "come again" was extended by the Rev. Donald McNeill and John McPherson moved and seconded the vote of thanks. Rev. T. F. Fullerton, who occupied the chair, conveyed to the lecturer the thanks of the audience and also expressed the opinion that Rev. D. B. CONCERT AT CLIFTON.

The New London concert held in the Court House there last Monday evening was in every way a grand success. Notwithstanding the unfavorable condition of the travelling, the spacious Court room was filled with a very large audience, numbering upwards of three hundred people, and the greatest possible degree of interest and appreciation of the performance was manifested by all present.

The programme consisted of an excellent selection of vocal and instrumental music, and of readings and recitations of a varied and interesting character. The pieces were all rendered in a manner which would do credit to the different performers. Special mention should be made of Miss Jost, who, as accompanist, played her part in a manner which would do no discredit to a performer of more pretensions and experience. Mr. H. Lewis, as violinist, and Mr. Sutherland with the banjo, accompanied by Miss Jost on the organ, rendered two very fine selections which were highly appreciated.

The vocal solos by Mr. Blanchard, of this city, and Messrs. Sutherland, Lamoit, Tappin and Gordon McKay were well received and were each encores.

The readings and recitations were varied and interesting, "from grave to gay, from lively to severe." Mr. Duncan McKay's recitation, "The Sergeant's Story," was particularly excellent. In her recitation of "The Soldier's Story," Miss Jost showed a very high order. We have seldom heard anything superior on a Charlottetown platform. The other readings and recitations by Judge Allen, A. B. Macdonald, George McKenzie, Harry Smith, Dan McKay and John Jardine were all worthy of praise, and upon the whole, the good people of New London have never enjoyed an entertainment more pleasantly and agreeably given. The proceedings were closed amid great enthusiasm with Auld Lang Syne, followed by God save the Queen.
