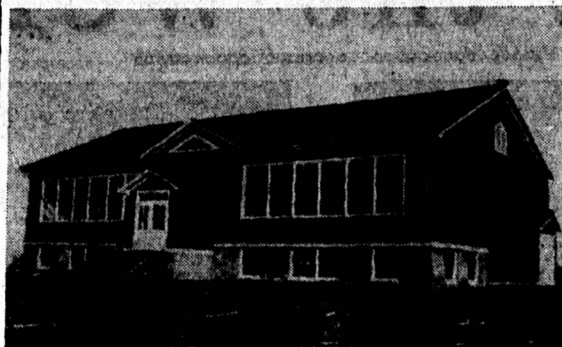

Abram's Village Proud Possessor Of New School



The rate payers of Abram's Village are to be highly commended on their new school building (shown above) which is nearing completion. This splendid edifice of modern design attests in a very striking manner, what self-sacrifice, coupled with harmony and co-operation, can accomplish. There is no monetary wealth in this thriving French Acadian district.

There are, however, ample resources of brawn and sinew, of good will and progressive spirit, which account for their achievement in erecting an educational structure second to none in our rural communities.

To begin with, the site is ideal. Well-nigh three acres of high ground was secured, affording large and commodious playroom, at the same time furnishing sufficient distance from the highway.

The main building, which measures approximately 76 x 46 feet, has two side entrances besides an outside entrance to the basement, and consists of four class-rooms, each of which contains a cloak-room, and a spacious corridor joining the two entrances.

The basement, with its cement wall, contains two bowling alleys, two chemical toilet rooms, a furnace room, and a manual training room. The building will be equipped with a "hot air" heating system. The fourth room has been built partly in view to accommodate students of Grade XI.

Apart from the free labor contributed by the district, the sum of twelve hundred and sixty dollars has been raised by voluntary subscription, and upward of 18000 feet of lumber was donated by various citizens of the village.

Much credit is due the building committee whose assignment was the supervision and direction of the building operations. No less

praise goes to the trustees and school secretary. The foreman in the construction, Mr. Arthur J. B. Arsenault, a local man, displayed unexcelled talent in directing the workmen under his care, and has shown great skill in his workmanship.

The wiring of the building was efficiently done by another local man, Mr. Louis M. Gallant.

On an occasion of this kind, when new material replaces the old, it is fitting that appropriate observations be made in connection with the transit from old to new. Plans are therefore underway to issue a story giving the school history of the district. Researches will have to be made and as considerable time will be required to collect data, etc., it is not expected that this pamphlet will appear before another year or so.

The new building does not look with disdain on the old school house across this road. Indeed this young and vigorous specimen of architecture yearns to show its feeling of gratitude to its old parent. It realizes that its birth and prosperous appearance is due mainly to the foresight and frugality of a people to whose material advancement and educational progress, the old school house paid no small contribution. It realizes also the great responsibility to continue the good work carried on by the old school house, and if comfort, facilities and equipment, etc., are incentive to greater efforts, the new school house should excel in her work, and show spectacular results from year to year.
