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# Booker Group Is Described Similar To Hudson's Bay Co.

**MONTREAL** (CP)—Sir Jock Campbell describes the United Kingdom-based Booker group of companies as similar to the Hudson's Bay Company, "but they originally struck a more vigorous part of the world."

The Booker group, originally in the raw sugar business in British Guiana, now has five distinct fields of operations—tropical agriculture (mainly sugar production), shops and wholesale distribution, rum and produce, shipping, and engineering and light industries.

Since Sir Jock became chairman of the Booker group in 1950, the organization has been re-organized and has become more diversified. It now includes a group of nine companies in western Canada stretching from the head of the lakes to Vancouver.

Canadian operations come under Prairie Pacific Distributors Limited in Edmonton and specialize in automobile accessory equipment, garage equipment, household appliances and engine rebuilding.

Volume of Canadian operations now is about \$43,000,000 annually, Sir Jock said in an interview.

## Fluoride Kids Showing Less Tooth Decay

**KELOWNA, B.C. (CP)** — The first generation of fluoride-drinking children in this Okanagan city are showing less tooth decay than counterparts in Vernon to the north and Penticton in the south.

Figures released by Dr. Alan S. Gray, regional dental consultant to the South Okanagan Health Unit, show that 30 per cent of Kelowna's six-year-olds have no cavities.

The figures showed that in Vernon and Penticton only one in 10 of first-grade pupils can make that claim.

Vernon and Penticton have only a small amount of natural fluorides in their water.

A survey this year, eight years after Kelowna began fluoridating its water supply, covered 100 children here, 50 in Vernon and 50 in Penticton.

Only 10 other British Columbia centres have fluoridated water, covering 4.2 per cent of the province's population.

accused Pleads Not Guilty To Illegal Sale Of Liquor

**SOURIS** — Magistrate James B. Johnston, QC, accepted a plea of not guilty from John William MacDonald of St. Peter's when the man appeared in magistrate's court here Wednesday on a charge of selling liquor. His case was adjourned to Oct. 15.

The Crown, represented by Deputy Attorney General J. Arthur McGulgan, withdrew a charge against William Joseph Ford of Souris, who had previously pleaded not guilty to a charge of selling liquor.

Merlin Joseph Chapman, Souris, was fined \$15 and cost or 5 days on a charge of possession of small lobsters, prosecuted under the Fisheries Act.

Edgar Roy Johnston of Anson pleaded not guilty to impaired driving and was remanded to Oct. 21.

Joseph Blaz Carter of Souris was further remanded for plea to Sept. 30 on a motor vehicle theft charge.

Joseph Aeneas Lawless, Little River, was fined \$25 and costs or 30 days for possession of liquor not purchased from a vendor.

One man was fined \$30 and costs or 30 days for illegal possession of liquor.

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
