

# Islanders In 3-0 Shutout Over Mills In Game At Sydney

SYDNEY, Dec. 16 — (CP)—Goalie Al Millar of Charlottetown Islanders chalked up his fourth shutout of the Maritime Major Hockey League before more than 1,300 fans here tonight, blanking Sydney Millionaires 3-0 in a fast-moving contest.

Millar kicked out 29 drives during the game. Millionaires again fielded only 11 players, with four of their men sidelined by injuries and sickness.

Marcel Clements fired the winner for the Islanders in the first period, and the goal stood up all the way. The win moved Islanders into a second place tie with Sydney, and the Murph Chamberlain club also has a game in hand, a postponed affair with Halifax Atlantics.

Chuck Holdaway got the only goal of the second period and the final went to Gary Gordon on a breakaway in the third, when Sydney was driving in to wipe out the 2-0 lead.

The league sharpshooter, Buck Whitlock, kept up the pace by assisting two goals.

Millionaires just had enough players dressed for a complete shift. They played hard all the way, but ran out of steam in the third period.

In the first two periods, Charlottetown outshot Sydney 21-20, but in the last they enjoyed a 13-9 edge.

Millar was called upon to make some big saves, especially from winger Bill McDonagh.

Islanders had 13 players dressed, winger Don Bellringer and defenseman Larry Travis were not along.

The game was nearly two hours late starting, due to Mills' having bus trouble on the mainland.

Other officers include vice-presidents William Pierce, Souris; Raymond Lavender, Georgetown; William Harris, Murray Harbor; Secretary, Harold Landry, Montague.

Following considerable discussion, it was decided that a shorter schedule and longer playoffs would be in order taking in view the inclusion of the intermediate playoffs. Consequently a tentative schedule was drawn up subject to the affirmation of Murray Harbor and Souris, and also subject to the inclusion of any team other than those named therein. The schedule appears below.

It was also decided that four teams would play in the semi-finals in the best three out of five contest; the finals also to be three out of five.

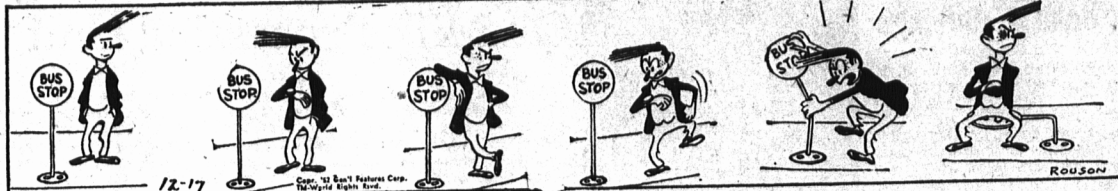
He was succeeded by Ross Morrow of Montreal.

The Islanders and Buck Whitlock continued to roll along last night as the locals moved into the second place tie in the M.M.H.L. with the Sydney Millionaires.

Buck picked up two assists during the contest and has now run his point total to 57. However, according to word from Murph Chamberlain in Sydney the big star for the Islanders was defenceman Orval Lavell. The latest addition to the Islanders' defense reportedly played a bang-up, rough-tough game as he took care of everything that came his way.

Getting back to Whitlock, Buck has scored one or more points in his last seven games. Out of his last eleven games Whitlock has been held off the score sheet on just one occasion and that was the game which the Islanders lost to Glace Bay Miners by a 1-0 score. Another fellow who is picking up a lot of points is rookie Chuck Holdaway whom Steve Brklacich calls "Goal-A-Go-Home." Chuck has scored six goals and picked up four assists in the seven games he played with the Islanders.

Left winger Don Bellringer of the Islanders appears to be headed for Rimouski in Quebec. "The Dinger" was not taken on yesterday's trip to Sydney although the Islanders were short-handed and it was learned last night that he had been contacted by Rimouski officials. Bellringer, himself is not certain of his status but believes he will be leaving for Rimouski on Thursday or Friday of this week.

The departure of Bellringer and Connie Bonhomme removes from the Islanders the last traces of the Maritimes 1951-52 Kid Line. Bonhomme, along with Jim MacKenzie, was traded to the Glace Bay Miners Monday night and both were supposed to join the Miners last night in Halifax. However the two players stated yesterday they had some matters to clear up with the Islanders before they made a move. Neither wish to go to Glace Bay. Stated MacKenzie last night, "We haven't decided on anything." Said Bonhomme, "If I go to Glace Bay I'm going to show Chamberlain he made a bad deal." Of the two Bonhomme is more reconciled to join the Miners. His wife, the former Lorraine Roberts, comes from the Bay. For Bonhomme this is his last year in hockey.

The Halifax Atlantics have obtained the services of Leon Bouchard, a forward with the Quebec Aces. Bouchard was released from the Aces the same time as Walter Pawlshyn. The Aces also released another forward in the person of Pierre Brilliant along with defenseman Conner Leyte. Brilliant at the first of the season was every bit as good as his name but he slumped in recent weeks. He will join Bob Arnell in Mont-Joli, a farm team of the Aces while Leyte will play with Matane in the same loop.

Herb Phillips of Summerside, who is now living in Sudbury, Ontario, wrote a few lines the other day to tell about a number of players playing in the N.O.H.A. League. These players are well known to Maritime fans, having played in the Maritimes during the past few years. Leo Lamoureux is coaching the North Bay Trappers and Leo played three or four games recently when his team was short-handed due to injuries. His team was leading the League when Herb wrote.

In nets for the Trappers is Les Colvin, who played with Moncton Hawks two years ago. A team from Sioux, Michigan is in the same league and is coached by Johnny Horek. With Johnny is "Me Brother Danny," and also Jackie Heon, who played with Saint John Beavers. Johnny received a five game suspension several weeks ago for stalling a game. Sudbury Wolves and Sault Ste. Marie are the other teams in the four team league. Herb reports that it is a good league with crowds in Sudbury running from 4,500 to 5,000. Sudbury recently built a new arena that cost one and a half million dollars.

## Moore Favoured To Take Title From Joey Maxim

ST. LOUIS, Dec. 16 — (AP)—At the ripe old age of 36, able Archie Moore finally gets his long sought crack at the light-heavyweight title tomorrow night when he clashes with champion Joey Maxim in a 15-rounder at the Arena here.

An 8 to 5 favorite to cash in on his first championship chance, Moore, if he wins, will become the oldest 175-pound king since Bob Fitzsimmons grabbed the crown at the age of 41.

A crowd of some 14,000 was expected by the promoting International Boxing Club to pay about \$85,000. The 10 P.M. EST bout will be broadcast and telecast by CBS. With more than \$60,000 in the till, a gate receipts record for a St. Louis fight already has been set. The old record was the \$66,905 paid by 11,115 fans for the Jan. 16, 1950 Willie Pep-Charley Riley featherweight title scrap.

In addition, the radio-TV sponsor was reported chipping in a minimum of \$50,000 to the purse for the air rights. Maxim has been guaranteed about \$75,000 for his third defence of the crown he won nearly three years ago from England's Freddie Mills. Moore is getting his chance at the title and nothing much else.

"That's not important," said the Toledo Negro contender who has been hammering at the doors of champions for more than five years. "The main thing is that I'm finally getting my shot. I know I can beat Maxim. I'm going to knock him out."

If he does, he will be the second man ever to turn the trick against the steel-chinned Cleveland cutie, Curtis (Hatchetman) Sheppard bombed out Maxim in the first round on March, 1942. Maxim whipped the Hatchetman a month later. Former heavy-weight champions Ezzard Charles and Jersey Joe Walcott never felled Maxim.

The 30-year-old champion, netted by Moore's prediction of a knock-out victory, said "There's an old saying 'string along with the champion'. Well, I'm the champ and I'll still be the champion when the fight is over."

## 350,000 Fans Expected To See Top Bowl Games

NEW YORK, Dec. 16 — (CP)—A month ago football fans on the Pacific Coast were all but sure their team would win the New Year's Day Rose Bowl game and break the domination of mid-western representatives of the big ten. Now, however, time has turned their optimism to apprehension.

They're not at all sure University of Southern California will beat University of Wisconsin and bring the Bowl to the coast after six unsuccessful seasons.

Original optimism was based on the fact that U. C. L. A. of the Pacific Conference beat Wisconsin 20-7 in October and then U. S. C. beat U. C. L. A. 14-12. But then the high spirits were damped when U. S. C. bowed to Notre Dame 9-0 Nov. 29.

The set the fans to thinking that if Notre Dame could do it, then Wisconsin with a good offense and an adequate defence might turn the trick as well.

An expected 103,000 fans will jam the Rose Bowl at Pasadena, Calif., Jan. 1. They'll be hoping hard that U. S. C. can pull it out this year because come 1953 powerful Michigan State will be admitted to the Big Ten and the west coast will have to produce something pretty terrific to win against that kind of opposition.

In all something like 325,000 fans will turn out for the major Bowl games New Year's Day.

## North Shore Hockey League Meeting

The annual meeting of the North Shore Hockey League was held in the Town Hall, Kensington, last night with the president, Harold Champion, in the chair. It was decided that the league will operate with four teams this year, viz. Kensington, Spring Valley, Summerside Mercurs and R. C. A. F.

Harold Champion represented Spring Valley; Eldon Champion, Kensington; Eric Johnston, Summerside; and F/L Frank Dunster, R. C. A. F.

The constitution was reviewed and amendments suggested, but the final draft will not be drawn until the annual meeting, which was adjourned, meets again. New officers for the ensuing year will be elected at that time.

## Fordham Surveys Football Program

NEW YORK, Dec. 16 — (AP)—Fordham University is surveying its football program to decide whether to (1) Continue its present setup, (2) Drop football or (3) Adopt a middle course of emphasis on a "back to the campus" basis.

Rev. Vincent Hart, director of university development, disclosed today that the football situation was up for review. He said no decision could be expected "for months."

Fordham lost approximately \$50,000 this season and about \$200,000 during a seven-year period. In the season just completed, Fordham won two games, tied one and lost five. A nine-game schedule for 1953 recently was announced by Athletic Director Jack Coffey. Fordham has an undergraduate student body of about 6,000 with a total registration of about 9,600, including graduate school students.

## Portland Fishing Schooner Lost

ROCKLAND, Me., Dec. 16 — (AP)—Ravaged by fire and explosion, the 82-foot Portland fishing schooner Evzone capsized and sank today despite a daring fight by Coast Guardsmen to save her.

After the vessel was abandoned by her crew of five, a Coast Guard fire fighting party boarded the Evzone with hose lines and attempted to extinguish the flames, which glowed fiercely through billowing black smoke.

The Coast Guards left the doomed fisherman just before she rolled over and sank, about 40 miles off this port.

The Coast Guard cutter Acushnet was returning to Portland with the Evzone's crew. They had been picked up from dories by another fishing craft, the Flo.
