Reciprocity.

The Opposition are continually harping upon the disadvantages to which the people of Canada are subjected through the want of a Reciprocity Treaty with the United States.

A privilege, on which so high a value has been placed by competent and disinterested commissioners, must not be given up without good and substantial remuneration.

As a matter of business, there ought to be no great difficulties in the way. The chief difficulty rests with the Gloucester and Maine fishermen, led by such men as Senator Frye, who appear to disregard other people's rights altogether when it suits their own selfish aims.

Sir John Macdonald is the man to do it. He took the leading part in negotiating the Washington Treaty, a Treaty that was opposed, tooth and nail, by the Grit Party in Parliament.

The accumulation of a surplus in the lapsed months of the current fiscal year seems to have given the Opposition unnecessary distress.

The London Times contains an advertisement by which notice is given the Metropolitan Board of Works intend to apply to Parliament in the ensuing session for leave to bring in a Bill to enable the Board to "provide means of communication across the river Thames, at Blackwall, consisting of a tunnel under the river (for use of carriages, carts and other vehicles as well as foot-passengers), with approaches thereto on either side."

The Marquis of Salisbury announces that the Ministerial programme for next year will be local government for England, Ireland and Scotland, and after the Land Transfer bill has been introduced and dealt with, the House will be asked to consider the rules of Parliamentary procedure; but it is possible the condition of Ireland might be first considered.

The Ontario Government Party are evidently in a pretty hard strait when they call the amount to the credit of the Province at Ottawa "our surplus."

Advices from Winnipeg report that the Conservatives there are victorious.

Meeting of Presbytery.

The Presbytery of P. E. Island met at Lot 16, on the 7th inst., and inducted Rev. Archibald Brown into the pastoral charge of Richmond Bay East.

At this meeting the Presbytery also sustained a call to Rev. A. S. Stewart from the congregation of West and Clyde Rivers.
