**NOTE TO STUDENTS**  
 Intending students should note carefully the following candidates whose names are marked with a star have not completed Grade X but will be allowed to attend Grade XI. They will be required to write supplementary examinations in the subjects in which they have failed before they receive a licence to teach in the public schools.  
 Students who have passed the Atlantic Provinces Examinations, and intend to enroll in Prince of Wales College should notify the office early. All applications for admission to Third and Fourth Year classes should be accompanied by a transcript of the marks made in these examinations, and a list of the subjects the applicant intends to take. Normal Training students should also send applications with list of marks.  
 Prince of Wales College will open on Tuesday, September 4. At 2 p.m. students of the Second Year, including those in Second Year Commerce and Teacher Training will enroll, and at 4 p.m. students of the Third and Fourth years. On Wednesday, September 5 at 2 p.m., all students of the First Year will be enrolled.  
 Students taking Teacher Training, provided they undertake to teach in the Province for at least two years may receive a grant of \$200. Those needing further assistance may receive the same in the form of a loan not exceeding \$300 and repayable within three years from the time of graduation.  
 Students' fees must be paid at the College on the day of registration. Fees of the students of the Third and Fourth year and of the Commerce Department may be paid half-yearly. For students of the First and Second years and Teacher Training classes the fees are \$5 for country students and \$10 for students from Charlottetown. For Commerce students the fees are \$35 for those from the country and \$50 for those from Charlottetown. For Third Year the fees are \$25 and \$75 respectively for country and Charlottetown students. When enrolling, all male students are required to pay in addition to the regular tuition

**Canada Now Consumes All Her Own Beef Production**

OTTAWA (CP) — Canada's rapidly rising population and increasing living standards have virtually ended her dependence on foreign markets for her surplus beef. In fact, this country now has become a net importer.  
 In the first half of 1956, Canada imported about 6,000 head from the United States, federal officials report.  
 This small but unusual flow of imports has developed at a time when marketings in Canada of Canadian beef and pork have increased by about 10 per cent.

Usually when beef is scarce and prices are high, Canadian housewives turn to lower priced pork; but this year the market for both meats is fairly strong.  
 Perhaps a contributing factor is that the anticipated great increase in Prairie hog production has not materialized. The experts had been talking in the early 1950s, increased to an average of 58 pounds last year from 53.7 in 1954. Beef touched a peak of 72 pounds, about the same as in 1954. It may go even higher this year.

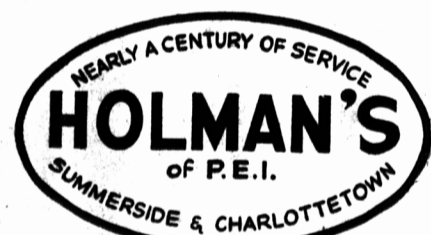
**Suez Canal Action Jolts Oil Industry Around The World**

 NEW YORK (AP)—Egypt's nationalization of the Suez Canal jolted the oil industry around the world Friday and lopped millions of dollars off the prices of shares of companies dependent on the waterway.  
 Oil executives and others close to the situation believe the long-range result of President Nasser's decision may be a radical change in the political and economic picture in the Middle East. Some interpreted Nasser's action as a gamble born of desperation and frustration.  
 There was widespread concern that the Egyptians will not be equal to the task of maintaining the canal efficiently. Any inability to carry out already developed plans to expand and deepen the canal could worsen the situation in years to come.  
 The political picture could be altered if interference or breakdown in the flow of oil should affect the incomes of the oil producing nations of the area. Resentment against Nasser might harm his bid to be regarded as the leader of the Arab world.  
**NASSER HOLDS TRUMP**  
 With Nasser assuming complete control over the canal, Egypt holds a threat over the Western world if it should attempt to interfere with any move against Israel.  
 Almost 16,000,000 tons of ships went through the canal in 1955, an 11-per-cent increase over 1954. The trend to larger tankers has been pronounced, prompting plans to widen and deepen the canal.

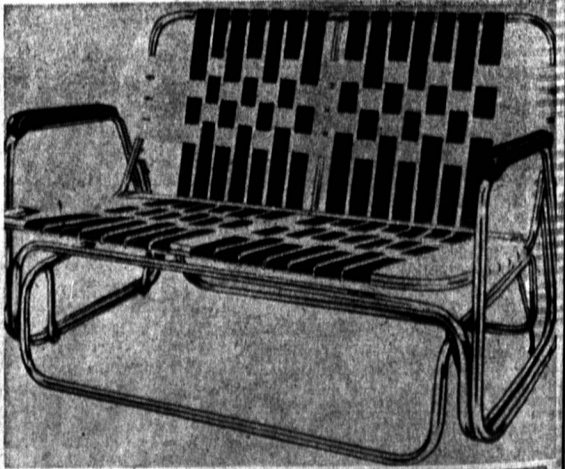
