ANOTHER WAR CLOUD.

Russia Wants Sovereign Rights
in China.

Opinion of The London Times.

LONDON, March 7.—The Pekin corre-
spondent of The Times says: "Russia has
demanded that China shall surrender to
her all sovereign rights over Port Arthur
and Ta Lien Wan on the same conditions
as in the case of Germany at Kiao Chou.
In the event of noncompliance Russia
threatens to move her troops into Manchu-
ria. China will perforce yield.

* Editorially The Times says: If China
yields these provinces they will practically
pass away from her forever to be incor-
porated in the Czar's Empire. England
cannot assent to the practical absorption of
two great and wealthy Chinese provinces."

UNITED STATES AND SPAIN.

Complications Increasing.

Requests of Spain Refused.

MADRID, March 7.—The Spanish Gov-
ernment has asked for the recall of the
U. S. Consul General Lee, from Havana
and requested that the United States
warships designated to convey supplies to
Cuba for the relief of the sufferers there
should be replaced by merchant vessels in
order to deprive assistance sent to Recon-
centrados of an official character.

Minister Woodford cabled these requests
to the Washington Government which
replied, refusing to recall General Lee in
the present circumstances or to counter-
mand the orders for the despatch of war
vessels,—making the representation that
the relief vessels are not fighting vessels.

ONTARIO ELECTIONS.

There Will be Twelve Recounts.

The Independent will Support the
Conservatives.

TORONTO, March 7.—It is believed that
there will be at least twelve recounts in
the Ontario election, eleven members hav-
ing been declared elected by majorities less
than fifty.

The Toronto Mail and Empire concedes
the disputed counties to liberals and gives
the present standing of the parties as 47
Liberals; 45 Conservatives; 1 Patron and
1 Independent.

In an open interview, the Independent
has announced his intention to support the
Conservatives.

Drummond Railway Deal.

OTTAWA, March 7.—The taking of
evidence by the committee appointed to
investigate the Drummond County Railway
deal begins to-day. Mr. Lisle is the
chairman.

CANADIAN MINES.

According to the report of the geologi-
cal survey, the production of our mines
last year totalled \$28,789,000, an increase
of some six millions over 1896, and some-
thing more than double the output of 1889.
These figures are, as the Montreal Gazette
says, very remarkable, and go to show that
after many years the country is awakened
to the possibilities of wealth stored up in
its rocks. British Columbia naturally
adds most to the growth noted. It leads
in silver and lead, and contributes largely
to the output of copper
in regard to which, how-
ever, it is stated that the greatest increase
has been from the Sudbury district in
Ontario, Quebec, also, which ranks third
among the producers of the metal, doing a
fair share. The value of the copper pro-
duct has grown from \$1,021,960 in 1896 to
\$1,561,660, or by close upon 50 per cent.
The value of the silver output increased in
the same time from \$2,149,563 to \$3,322,-
905, that of lead from \$721,159 to \$1,396,-
853, and that of nickel from \$1,188,990 to
\$1,399,176. This greatest increase, how-
ever, is in gold.

In 1896 the production of this metal passed
all records and reached \$2,780,086. Last
year the value was \$6,190,000. The in-
crease in the twelve months was 123 per
cent. Much of this is, of course due to the
discovery of the Yukon placer fields, from
the operations in which Canada reaped but
a comparatively small advantage. The
interest created by the Yukon discoveries,
and by the reports as to the richness of
the northern Ontario fields, has spurred
those concerned in gold properties every-
where to greater exertions, and wherever
there are signs of ariferous deposits
activity is being shown in prospecting or
operating them.

WASHINGTON, March 5.—It was develop-
ed yesterday afternoon through telegraphic
correspondence between Secretary Long
and Admiral Sicard that the court is unable
to fix even an approximate date for the
conclusion of its investigation into the
disaster to the Maine.

Sharing the general anxiety for some
information on this point, Secretary Long,
at the instance of the cabinet, sent a tele-
gram to Admiral Sicard asking him when
it was expected that the report of the court
would be made, and late last night the
following reply was received:

Key West, March 4.
Have talked with the president of the
court of inquiry, and agree with him that
it is not possible to fix a date for the find-
ing, as much depends upon the progress
of the divers and wreckers and the results
they obtain. Every effort is being made
to advance the inquiry. The court re-
turns to Havana by the Mangrove this
evening, having about finished the
examination at Key West.

(Signed) SICARD.
Admiral Sicard's message is regarded
officially as disposing of the reports that
the court has obtained positive or con-
clusive information bearing upon the
object of their investigation. It is taken
to mean that upon the testimony of
discoveries of the divers will depend the
finding, the examination of the officers and
crew of the ship having been insufficient
to enable the court to even form an idea
as to what lines may be opened up from
the investigation of the wreck itself.
