WHAT IS THE MATTER WITH THE LIBERAL PARTY?

WHEN Sir Louis returned from his starring trip through Belfast and Murray Harbor, it is said that he asked a friend to tell him what was the matter with the Liberal party in Prince Edward Island. Before going to England he had attempted to get up a party organization in King's and East Queen's but he could not get his old friends to come round him in any considerable numbers, even although free excursions were tendered them on Government steamers and railways. On his return from England he still felt lonesome notwithstanding he had put a notice in the party organ that he would be glad to have his friends call on him. Then came his southern trip which was, on the whole, a dismal failure; and he left the Province conscious that there was something very serious the matter with the Liberal party in this Province.

We do not know what answer Sir Louis received to the anxious inquiry above referred to, but we know that a little frankness on the part of his friend would have enabled our knight to better understand the lack of enthusiasm with which he has been received by his former friends. In the front of any candid explanation would stand the disappointments felt at his utter disregard of his pre-election promises. He promised the people to remove every vestige of protection from the tariff, but instead of this the Government of which he is a member have adopted the policy of protection. He promised that he would reduce the expenditure, instead of which it has been enormously increased. He promised access to the market of sixty millions, by which prices would be enhanced and every-body made rich; but no sixty million market has materialized and potatoes are selling at 16s and oats at 27c per bushel. He promised honest administration instead of which we have had Drummond and Yukon deals. One of the troubles with the Liberal party is that many of their members are shocked at the appalling difference which they observe between Sir Louis' promises and performances.

Another trouble in the Liberal party arises from the fact that many of them are heartily tired of the recklessness of assertion which marks all Sir Louis' public utterances. Where is the business man, whether Liberal or Conservative, who is not disgusted with such statements as Sir Louis is reported by The Patriot to have made at Pownal and Kingston, that he was the means of reducing the rates on the winter steamers to those in force during the summer months. This reduction was made when Senator Ferguson represented the Province in the Government of Sir McKenzie Bowell.

Equally offensive to all right thinking men, was the statement he made at Pownal that no man on the other side has dared to formulate in a proper manner, any charge against a Minister of the Laurier Cabinet. Everybody knows that this statement lacks the "essential element." Sir Hibbert Tupper, in his place in Parliament deliberately charged Mr. Sifton with the grossest mismanagement and offered, on the peril of the loss of his seat in Parliament, to substantiate, before a proper tribunal charges of corruption in the affairs of the department of the Interior; but the Government called in their majority and voted down an investigation.

The trouble with the Liberal party is that many of them are finding out that Sir Louis' statements cannot be relied on. The wonder is that they did not find it out long ago.


