Steel Co., with commendable enterprise, have commenced the manufacture of railway fish plates, and will thereby retain many thousands of dollars, which would otherwise be sent out of the province. The company have recently tried the experiment of rolling light steel rails, producing an article fully equal to the best imported.
 THE S. S. Coban, on her outward trip this p. m., took as part cargo one of the finest lots of fat cattle and sheep ever shipped from this Island. Among the lot we were sorry to notice a fine Jersey Heifer, bred and reared by the Hon. T. H. Haviland and recently sold by him to Richard Gill, Esq. This heifer was too valuable for exportation and should have been kept here for breeding purposes.
 THE results of the recent strikes in Chicago promise to be far-reaching and terrible. Hundreds of workmen in the lumbering districts with their families are reduced to destitution, while in the city itself building operations, involving an outlay of ten million dollars, have been abandoned for the present, practically closing the building season and threatening an army of workmen with compulsory idleness for the rest of this year.
 VEZY COLCLOUGH, a grandson of Sir Vezy Colclough, came to this country with his father from Teintrim Abbey, County Wexford, Ireland, in 1818. He settled in Lynn, Mass., and has three sons, William, a shoemaker, Alexander, a carpenter, and George, a coal dealer. He has just ascertained that he is sole heir to the Teintrim Abbey, estate, which furnishes an income of £10,000 a year. He will start for Ireland on the 1st of June.
 In Lincoln County, West Virginia, on Monday night, Mrs. Margaret Dougan, a widow, became insane from religious fanaticism. She said she had been called upon by the Lord to sacrifice the lives of herself and her 3 children to satisfy the divine wrath. Arming herself with a sharp carving knife she made her way to the room occupied by her three daughters, aged 8, 10, and 12 years, and cut the throat of each child, and plunged the reeking blade deep into her own heart. The bodies were discovered by the neighbors.
 Now that the policemen are on their annual crusade against filthy yards, etc., we would suggest that they visit the neighborhood of the Railway Station, and report upon the filthy odour which emanates from the stagnant pools in that neighborhood. For many years past the people living in that vicinity have been petitioning the authorities to grant them some relief from this nuisance, but their complaints were, to use a common expression, "let in one ear and out the other." This is not as it should be. The residents of that vicinity have every cause to feel aggrieved at the way they have been treated in this particular, and we sincerely trust that the matter will be attended to at once before serious consequences ensue.
