P.E.I. Ayrshires Again Among Top Producers

Andrew B. and Fred T. MacRae, of Union Road, had four cows listed among those producing over 120 per cent of the Ayrshire Breed Class Average in the May issue of "The Canadian Ayrshire Review." Among these was "Fairvue Norden 2nd" a Junior three year old daughter of "Dunduff Gilt Edge" (Imp), which stood third in the 365 day division and fourth in the 365 day division.

"Fairvue Bonita" by "Fairvue Fashion Lofty" was second in the Senior 4 year old 365 day division with 12,994 lb. milk, 558 lb. fat. "Fairvue Elsie" by "Fairvue Sovereign" was fourth in the Junior 4 year old, 365 day class. "Fairvue Ballerina" by "Fairvue Bondsman" was second in the Junior 2 year old 365 day class. Another daughter of "Bondsman," Fairvue Bridesman, bred by Andrew B. and Fred T. MacRae, and now owned by D. Fred MacRae and

Sons of Wheatley River, was fourth in the Senior 2 year old, 365 day class.

It is an outstanding achievement for one herd to have owned or bred so many cows completing high records in one month. The fact that the cows were sired by four different bulls indicates the overall producing ability of the herd owned by Andrew and Fred MacRae.

Other Island breeders had cows which qualified with good records. These include Almon Wood and Sons, of Marshfield, with the fourth place for 2 year old, in the 365 day class, and Brenon Stead, of Souris, and D. Fred MacRae and Sons, of Wheatley River, with cows in the mature 305 day class.

Mrs. Lois McDonald, matron of the Hospital announced that the Prince Edward Island Hospital had been chosen as one of the twenty schools of nursing across Canada to participate in the Pilot Project for the evaluation of schools of nursing.

Revolvers Must Be Registered

"The laws of Canada require that every person, with exception of wholesale and retail dealers, must register all revolvers and pistols in his or her possession," states Inspector E.L. Martin, R.C.M.P., Charlottetown, drawing attention to a memorandum from the Commissioner, Royal Canadian Mounted Police, Ottawa.

It is also required that any person, with the above exception, wishing to purchase a revolver or pistol, or to receive it into his possession by gift, loan or any other means, must first obtain the necessary authority to do so from his local Police department before receiving the firearm.

In accordance with amendments to the Criminal Code of Canada a new type of Firearm Registration Certificate came into effect on January 1, 1952 and all revolvers and pistols registered prior to that date are required to be re-registered. To avoid embarrassment and inconvenience registered owners, who have not already done so since those regulations were changed, are requested to forward, for the purpose of re-registration, all copies of certificates in their possession bearing date of issue during the years 1945-51.

It will be noted that only certificates dated prior to January 1, 1952 are required to be renewed. In the event that copies of certificates have become lost or mislaid, it is requested that the registered owner must submit the description of the firearm in his possession by letter, quoting the make of firearm, calibre, and serial number.
