Oyster Shells for Cancer.

ATTENTION has again been called to the great value of burnt oyster shells (reduced to powder) in cases of cancer.

Your paper of June 4, 1887, contained an extract from the London Lancet relative to treatment of cancer with calcium carbonate.

The following is the paragraph to which Mr. Woodcock refers:

"In a recent number of the Lancet, Dr. Peter Hood, of London, refers to a communication of his published in the same journal nearly twenty years ago, on the value of calcium carbonate in the form of calcined oyster shells as a means of arresting the growth of cancerous tumors.

This simple remedy might certainly be tried without harm, and perhaps with good effect, by those who have the misfortune to be affected by cancerous disease.
