A BRANCH FACTORY.—It is said that the Davies Pork Packing Co., of Toronto, contemplate establishing their branch factory at Amherst.

LAST TRIP.—The S S Halifax of the Plant Line will make her last Island trip of this season sailing from Boston Tuesday Nov 23rd and from Charlottetown Friday Nov 26th.

FOR THE ENGLISH MARKET.—The steamship Horizon arrived from Liverpool, G. B., on Saturday. She will be loaded with oats for the English market by Matheson & Toombs.

PRODUCE LADEN.—The schooner Lorne cleared from North River for Isaacs Harbor, N. S., on Saturday, with a cargo shipped by A. Horne & Co. The cargo consisted of 1900 bushels oats, 700 bushels potatoes and 175 bushels turnips.

POLICE COURT.—This forenoon William Welsh, better known as "Smiler" Welsh, was arraigned on a charge of assaulting females on the streets. He was remanded until this day week when Marshal Cameron expects to be able to prove several offences of this nature against Welsh.

NEW DOCKS IN LIVERPOOL.—Some years ago over two miles of docks were built for the use of sailing ships at Liverpool, Eng., but the sailing tonnage has now decreased to one-twentieth of the twenty-two millions of tons of shipping annually cleared at Liverpool, and to less than one-eighth of the number of vessels. Consequently a scheme has been started by the Mersey Docks Harbor Board to spend four millions sterling on the construction of new docks of the largest class for steamships, and the partial removal of the Pluckington sandbank, which is two miles in length.

VALUABLE CARGO.—The schooner Santa Marie cleared on Saturday for Bermuda with a cargo consisting of 70 tons free stone from the Wallace quarries, 674 sacks white oats, 350 bbls. garnet potatoes, 200 bbls. white potatoes, 214 sacks McIntyre potatoes, 220 bundles pressed hay, 101 bundles pressed straw, 101 bush. turnips, 2 bbls oysters, 40 drums codfish, 10 tubs factory butter, 3 carriages, 1 truck-wagon 10 sets harness, 27 horses, 40 sheep, 15 live pigs, 400 geese, turkeys, fowls and ducks, 50 boat spars, 25 ladders. The horses were a fine lot—all good stylish drivers and cart horses—youth, ranging from 4 to 7 years old. These horses were examined by good judges when they were being put on board the schooner, and pronounced as fine a lot, as has been shipped from Prince Edward Island for some time on one schooner. The shippers are H. C. Outerbridge, A. Horne & Co. and Dr. Bagnall.

RAILWAY WORK AT WILTSHIRE.

Shortening the Famous Loop Near that Place at a Cost of \$20,000.

By the courtesy of Superintendent Sharp representatives of THE EXAMINER, Patriot, and Guardian, and several other gentlemen were on Saturday afternoon afforded an opportunity of viewing the work that is being done in the way of shortening the line of railway near Wiltshire by reducing the famous loop in that vicinity. The party left the city about half-past two o'clock in the Superintendent's car, which was attached to the working train, and returned about half-past six in the evening. The party was accompanied by Superintendent Sharp, Track-Master Houle, and Mr. L. W. Macdonald, who is the engineer in charge of the work.

The new piece of track will be about a mile in length. It will cut off the loop in two places and thus shorten the line by about three-fifths of a mile. Work was begun on the 6th October, and about one hundred men are employed. These men are paid at the rate of ten cents an hour, and a man and team fifteen cents an hour. Already about one-third of the work has been performed, a very good showing for so short a time.

The new track runs through several farms, and its erection will cost about \$20,000. The amount voted for the work is \$10,000.

The deepest cutting on the new track will be about 17 feet. It is intended to make the cutting as wide as possible with a view to reducing the work of snow-fighting to a minimum. The embankment in one place—crossing a creek—will be about fifty feet. Considerable clay for the embankment is being obtained from a narrow cutting near the station, where snow has accumulated to a considerable extent in past years, and the cutting is thus being materially widened. Clay is also being taken from another cutting on the Charlottetown side of the station where the road curves considerably, and here it is also intended to make the line as straight as possible.

It is declared by the railway people that the change now being made will result in a saving of about \$1000 each year. This reduction will be in the way of lessening the expenditures for snow fencing and snow fighting, ties, rails, labor, wear and tear, etc. It is expected that by this time next year the new line will be in operation. The work, so far as it has progressed, has apparently been performed in a most capable manner.
