The New Cabinet.

OPINIONS OF THE PRESS.

(Halifax Reporter.)

Taken collectively as well as individually, the ministry is a good one. With the single exception of Mr. Baby—an old and honored Quebec name—the ministry is the one that the public sentiment of the country has pointed out, with more or less of difference as to the departments to be filled by them. Compared, then, with the resigned Cabinet the new Administration is superior in everything that makes a Cabinet representative of the country. It is a Cabinet possessed of greater experience, greater skill, greater statesmanship, greater practical ability. We predict for such a Cabinet success in their grapple with the knotty questions of the times. If there is any team in all Canada that can pull this country out of the mire in which it has been left by the last Government, that team is the present Government, with Sir John as leader.

The Government, although some of its members are far above mediocrity, and none below that level is not a strong Government. It has too many members who belonged to the old Government which fell in 1873, and too many of its members are not superior in any respect to those who have sought seats in the Cabinet and been disappointed, and those disappointments will in time produce some effect, even though the present majority on the Tory side is large. The difficulties which Sir John A. McDonald encountered in forming his Government have not been either altogether obviated or quite overcome. The appointment of Senator Wilnot as a Cabinet Minister, without a portfolio is a sign of weakness which Sir John A. McDonald would not have exhibited if he could have avoided doing so. Still, Sir John and those he has selected as his associates will, no doubt, receive fair play and a fair trial from all parties in the House of Commons. He and they have promised much, and much is expected of them by those who gave them their great majority. If they do even one-half of what their supporters in the country expect of them, Canada will have reason to rejoice at the great political revolution which surprised all parties on the 17th of September.

We congratulate the country on the formation of a Cabinet which will challenge public confidence alike by its ability, experience and representative character. Of the thirteen Ministers only three are without previous Ministerial experience, and the three who have not this advantage have had a long Parliamentary training. The offices have been apportioned with a nice perception of capacity; and altogether the Government is, in its collective character, the strongest which has been formed in Canada for many years.

Sir John has come, Mr. McKenzie has departed. The latter from being a powerful minister with a great majority at his back, becomes the leader of a feeble Opposition, weak in numbers, and weaker still in ability. The former is now the leader of an Administration, with two thirds of the House of Commons and more than two thirds of the country behind it. It is thus in every sense of the term a representative body, possessing the entire confidence of the great mass of the people. In addition to this, it stands out in striking contrast to its predecessors in political character and consistency, in parliamentary experience, in debating power, in a word, in everything which goes to constitute statesmanship.

We have very good reason for believing that the rumors which the Ronges have been circulating of difficulties and differences in the party in relation to the personnel of the Cabinet are without the slightest foundation in fact. The delay in announcing the Government has been due, as stated by us, to the absence of Mr. Masson, and the desire of the Premier, in deference to the position occupied by that gentleman, to consult him before the final arrangements were made. Mr. Masson, whose name has been so frequently mentioned during the last fortnight in connection with the new Government, and whose arrival from Europe has been so anxiously looked for, reached New York on Friday and proceeded immediately to Quebec, where, after consultation with Sir John McDonald, he was sworn in as Minister of Militia. In accepting this position he accepts that held by the late Sir George Cartier, whose mantle, as leader in the Province of Quebec, has fallen upon the member for Terrebonne. There is a fitness in this arrangement which will be very generally recognized—a fitness all the more acceptable that Mr. Masson has already taken a great interest in militia affairs.

The wisdom of the Dominion considers Mr. Pope something else than a failure. They know him as one of the first statesmen in the Dominion, and they recognize him and appoint him as such, and P. E. Island should feel proud; for she has a true friend at headquarters. In choosing his Department, Mr. Pope has shown his usual sagacity. In no respect can he do more for his native Province than as Minister of Marine and Fisheries. There are the \$5,500,000 Fishery Award money to be dispensed and Mr. Pope will contend for P. E. Island to get her share which would be at least one third. Our Light-houses, Harbors, and Breakwaters require to be looked after. Our Fishermen require a friend, and our Fisheries, external and internal, are a great industry, and one of our principal resources, needing fostering, care and encouragement, and Mr. Pope the friend of P. E. Island is the man. If anything can be done for us, Mr. Pope will do it.
