Diplomats Doubt Red China Will Be Voted UN Member

UNITED NATIONS (AP)—Diplomats predicted Sunday that more countries than ever before will vote this week to admit Communist China to the United Nations. But they doubt Peking can get the two-thirds majority needed.

An independent survey of the 117-country UN General Assembly showed a vote split of 54 to 50 with the majority in favor of seating the Chinese Communists, but one of the delegations opposed thought this was too high. A spokesman said his figures gave Peking fewer than 50 votes.

This is the 15th time the assembly has debated the admission of Communist China, always with steadily eroding support for the United States' adamant determination to prevent it. Even though the Soviet Union and its allies are in the midst of a bitter dispute with main-

land China, they are sure to vote in favor of bringing Peking into the world organization.

So is India, despite intermittent armed conflict with Peking's forces on its Himalayan borders. Nevertheless, neither the Soviet Union nor India was willing to renew earlier direct sponsorship of the admission resolution which has been signed only by a collection of small states—Albania, Algeria, Burundi, Cambodia, the Congo Republic (Brazzaville), Cuba, Ghana, Guinea, Mali, Romania and Syria.

Romania, which likes to demonstrate an independent policy, was the only member of the Soviet bloc to go along.

The resolution itself had not been completed Sunday and there was considerable dispute among the sponsors as to just what it should say.

Some want it to call for the expulsion of Nationalist China as well as the admission of Communist China. This is what it has done in the past. Others want to leave out the section about expelling the Chinese Nationalists.

Remembrance Day Observance To Follow Traditional Fashion

By THE CANADIAN PRESS Canada pays tribute to her war dead Thursday, Nov. 11—remembrance day.

Across the country the day will be observed with the traditional two-minute silence, church services, wreath-placing ceremonies and parades.

Since 1914, more than 100,000 Canadians have died in battle. Thousands are expected to gather around the National War Memorial at Ottawa where five official wreaths will be placed. About 900 veterans and servicemen will participate.

REPRESENTS MOTHERS
Mrs. Nora Wagner, a 75-year-old Teeterville, Ont., widow, will place the wreath for Canadian motherhood. She lost three sons in the Second World War.

The other wreaths will be placed by Governor-General Vanier, Prime Minister Pearson, Air Chief Marshal F. R. Miller, chief of the defence staff and Fred T. O'Brecht, dominion president of the Royal Canadian Legion.

Mrs. Wagner's sons Ivan and Bruce were killed in 1944, and a third son, Harry, was killed

in 1945. Her husband died four years ago.

SIGNAL FROM HOWITZERS
Shots from two 105-millimetre howitzers at 11 a.m. EST will signal the beginning of the two minutes of silence.

Similar solemn ceremonies will be held at memorials in villages, towns and cities from Newfoundland to British Columbia.

Federal government offices and banks will be closed in all provinces but commercial establishments will remain open in many. In Montreal provincial government and municipal offices will be open.

A special service will be held at the Andrew Mynarski junior high school in Winnipeg in memory of RCAF Pilot Officer Andrew Mynarski, posthumously awarded the Victoria Cross. He attempted to save a fellow crew member when their Lancaster bomber was shot down during a 1944 raid over France in 1944.

COMRADES ATTEND
Present for the ceremony will be students, representatives

of the RCAF and six of Mynarski's wartime comrades.

Members of the Student Union for Peace Action at the University of Toronto plan to keep a 12-hour vigil at the Soldier's Tower in discussion and silent contemplation on the failure of earlier peace movements.

Ceremonies were held at Saint John N.B., Friday in memory of 190 men who died 25 years ago in the sinking of the armed merchant cruiser Jervis Bay. The ship, defending an allied convoy, was sunk by the German super-cruiser Admiral Scheer. The Jervis Bay was outfitted at Saint John before her last voyage.

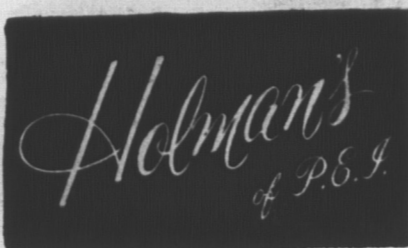
SOVIETS LIVE LONGER

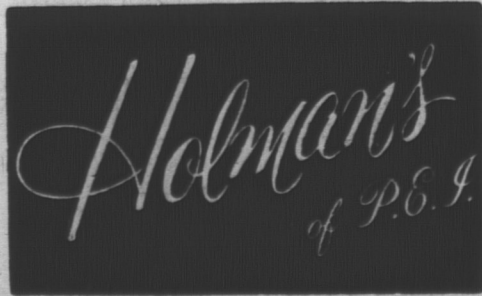

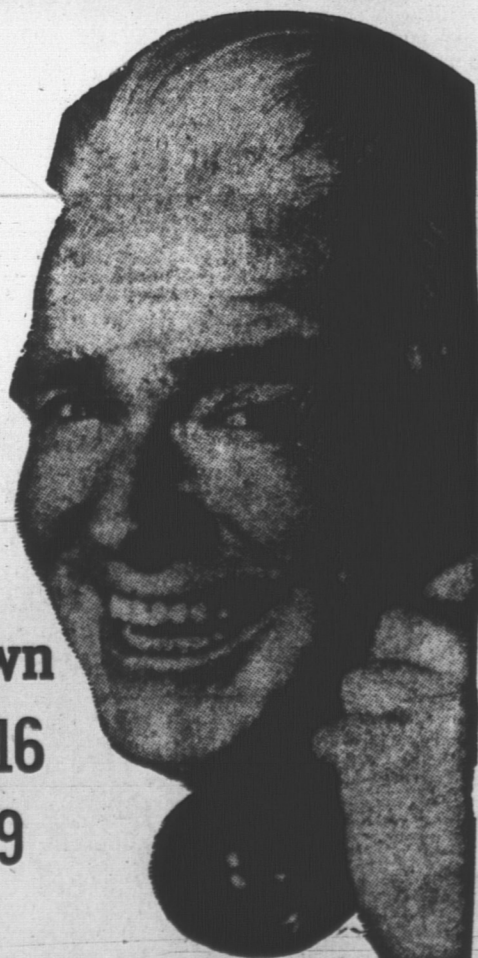
