Appointed Postmaster At City Post Office

SUMMERSIDE — W. F. (Bill) Griffith, postmaster here at Summerside, yesterday afternoon was notified by postal headquarters that he had been selected over a number of applicants to succeed Captain J.J. Connolly as postmaster in Charlottetown.

Only 41, Mr. Griffith has been with the postal department for 26 years and prior to moving to Summerside, spent 20 years in the Saint John division.

During World War Two he spent four and one-half years in the Royal Canadian Navy as a member of the postal section and by 1945 when he left the service and attained the rank of Chief Petty Officer.

Married to the former Catherine Vickers of Saint John, N.B., he has a family of three, Jim a sophomore student at Saint Dunstan's University, Patsy and Peter, attending Summerside High School.

Mr. Griffith is on the executive of the George Peckford V.C. branch of the Royal Canadian Legion here and a director of the Prince County Welfare committee.

Charter Banks Agree To Dairy Cattle Plan

Farmers throughout the province will be able, effective immediately, to buy quality breeders of the major brands at better prices.

This was revealed yesterday by Agriculture Minister Andrew B. MacLure.

Payments will be made, by the creamery deduction a payment from the farmers milk cheque, this way, the buyers will pay for themselves as it were.

According to Mr. MacLure the scheme will mean that breeders from Island producers could be successfully marketed.

Specific details of the plan provide for the department to offer sale at cost, breed buyers. Each animal will be priced out on the total of the purchase price plus freight.

Resolutions To Be Studied

The Joint Council, a committee composed of representatives of government and the civil service will study the resolutions passed at the annual meeting of the P.E.I. Public Servants Association, held Tuesday night, Premier Walter R. Shaw said yesterday.

The resolution said the Premier "will be given careful consideration by the government."

The main resolution passed by the Public Servants Association was one which called for a 40 hour work week, with consideration for work in excess of the 40 hours.

Mr. Premier said that there may be some difficulty in setting up a 40 hour week in some departments. He mentioned in particular some staff members of the Agriculture Department who, as a condition of employment are required to do a certain amount of evening work.

Controversy Grows Over IBJ Holdings

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Federal Communications Commission is sticking to its guns in a controversy involving the television holdings of President Johnson's family.

It has struck down again a bid by a Texas firm, TV Cable of Austin—to free itself of FCC restriction and complete all-out ownership of the station owned by the Johnson interests in Austin.

In doing so, it increased the prospects that a competing firm will win the race with TV Cable for subscribers—and profits—in Austin. And the Johnson interests have an option to purchase half the stock of that competing firm at low cost.

The 6 to 10 vote Wednesday was another chapter in the lengthening wrangle between two Texas pay television operations seeking to give Austin residents more programs than KATC, the city's only station, can provide.

KATC is owned by the Texas Broadcasting Corp., formerly the LBJ company. Mrs. Johnson—to avoid conflict of interest questions—plans to control the company in the hands of trustees shortly after Johnson becomes president. But control of the station reverts to the Johnson family when Johnson leaves federal office.

FIRST NEGRO ELECTED OSHAWA, Ont. (CP) — Frederick Ughwue, 29, of Oshawa, Sunday became the first Negro to be elected a district president of the Junior Chamber of Commerce in Canada when he was named to head the 1,200-member district 5, the largest in Ontario. 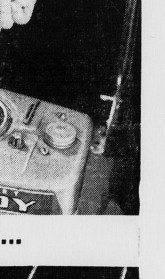

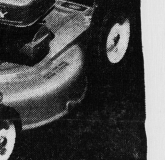
