

**Local and Other Items.**

CITY SMALL DEBT COURT meets to-morrow. The river Nile is reported to be unusually high.

A PARTY of fifty-seven Icelanders have arrived at Winnipeg.

THE *Keweenaw* leaves this port for Shediac to-morrow.

COL. J. HUNTER DUVAL's letter on the fisheries received—will appear to-morrow.

BESKRI is proposed as the starting point of the Trans-Sahara Railway.

EIGHT new cases and five deaths from yellow fever in Memphis yesterday.

The general election of the Prussian Diet will be held on the 5th of October.

The German Government propose to tax dividend coupons on the public debt.

ANOTHER reduction of wages is proposed in the Cleveland iron district in the north of England.

SIR STAFFORD NORTHCOLE has asked for a vote of credit for £3,000,000 for the expenses of the Zulu war.

THE stipends of the French bishops and archbishops are to be reduced, and those of the working clergy increased.

A FORMIDABLE revolutionary conspiracy has been discovered in Russia, and a number of those implicated are now imprisoned in St. Petersburg.

DEATHS from cholera among the British troops on the return from Afghanistan numbered over 400, while only about 100 men were lost in the campaign.

WE learn that a silver medal for foot races, in New York, was awarded to Mr. John Bateman, formerly a printer in the Moncton Times office but now of Boston.—*Times*.

AN old pensioner named Simpson, living on York street, Toronto, committed suicide on Sunday by taking a dose of Paris green. He was of intemperate habits and left a letter saying he was tired of life.

HON JOHN O'CONNOR, President of the Privy Council of the Dominion—accompanied by his wife and two daughters—is on a visit to the city. They are staying at the "Rankin House."

SAM. AB. BEAH, the Karen convert from idolatry, wishes to inform the public that he will be unable to address the meeting announced for him at the Y. M. C. A. Hall, on Wednesday evening. The lecture will, therefore, be postponed until further notice.

CROPS IN NEW BRUNSWICK.—The crops throughout the county have made astonishing progress during the past week or ten days. The crops everywhere promise an extraordinary yield. Hay, which is rapidly being housed, is a good crop.

AMONG the changes made in the Game Laws by the Legislature of Nova Scotia are:—Woodcock shooting commences on the 1st inst., instead of 1st September; partridge 1st of October, but hares and rabbits cannot be shot before the 1st October instead of 1st September; the season for shooting moose and caribou will commence on the 15th September instead of 1st of October, closing on the 1st of January; the price of game licenses for non-residents has been increased to \$50.

THE first arrangements for Mr. Beecher's Lecture was to have had the price of admission at the lowest concert rates, viz., 25 and 50 cents, without unreserved seats. But in order to meet the wishes of some of the friends who wanted the chance of securing certain seats, that they might be sure of whatever time they went, a new set of tickets had to be prepared, the seats numbered, and extra help employed to make the new arrangement reliable for which only ten cents a ticket extra has been charged—aug 5, 3i

THE Local Government are putting all their buildings in first-class order prior to the reception of the Vice-Regal party. We beg to direct the attention of Col. Gray, our Deputy Adjutant General, to the very disgraceful state of the fence adjoining the Drill Shed and Armory—hardly a paling is left standing. As the Minister of Militia and Adjutant General Sir Selby Smythe, are expected to accompany the distinguished visitors, we are anxious, for the credit of our Militia Department, that it should present a respectable appearance.

At the Stipendiary Magistrate's Court yesterday morning, the name of Harriet McDonald was first called. She, at eleven o'clock on Saturday night, was dancing a jig on Queen Street, and was disturbed in that pleasant avocation by an officer, who conducted her to the Police Station. In the station, Harriet rendered a choice programme, consisting of sentimental and comic, Gaelic and English songs, interspersed by jigs and waltzes, to the amusement of a large crowd of spectators. She was fined \$1 and costs, or 3 days. Joseph Valley appeared for fighting on the street. The evidence against him was very weak, and he was discharged on his own recognizance to appear this morning. Peter McGuigan is the ballot singer of this city. On Saturday night, while rendering one of his favorite songs, Peter was captured by the police. His disappearance from the station, yesterday, was mysterious; but this may not account for his being discharged yesterday. M. McDonald was arrested on a very frivolous complaint on Saturday night. He was discharged.

At the Stipendiary Magistrate's Court this morning, John Walsh, sailor, drunk and incapable, was fined \$2 and costs, or 18 days. Thomas Hogan, for the same offense, was fined \$1 and costs, or 4 days. M. McCarthy, for fighting on the street, was fined \$2 and costs or 8 days, and Joseph Valley, for the same offense, was fined \$3 and costs, or 10 days.
