

More And Better Teaching Of French Is Recommended

TORONTO (CP)—More and better teaching of French across Canada is recommended in most briefs submitted here to the royal commission on bilingualism and biculturalism here.

Organizations representing French-Canadians, Ukrainian and Japanese groups agree in general that French and English should get more attention in the schools.

The National Japanese Canadian Citizens Association says the constitution should be amended to facilitate the teaching of the two official languages in all provinces and help preserve Canadian unity.

It adds that all cultures present in the Canadian mosaic should be recognized and safeguarded. All Canadians, whatever their ethnic origin, should have equal opportunities to participate in the country's prosperity.

The Ukrainian Self-Reliance League of Canada also stressed the multi-cultural nature of the Canadian society and said it was inaccurate to describe Canada as a bicultural country.

The French-Canadian Cultural Association of Timmins complained that French-Canadians have been the victims of official injustice and said the spirit of the constitution of 1867 has not been observed.

The group called for bilingualism in the federal civil service, schools, municipal governments and public utilities. The purpose was not to force people to become bilingual but to ensure that both language groups receive equal treatment from public institutions, each in its language.

The Canadian Institute of Cultural Research asked the federal government to set up a cultural centre that would study the contributions of all cultures and sponsor concerts, plays and exhibitions.

House Starts Show Decline For October

OTTAWA (CP)—Construction started on 11,640 dwelling units during October, a decline of more than 15 per cent from a year earlier mainly in the apartment construction field, Central Mortgage and Housing Corp. has reported.

The number of new housing starts in urban centres was at an annual rate of 132,900 in October, compared with 145,300 in September.

The decline of 15.6 per cent followed a 2.9-per-cent decline in September. CMHC said starts on new apartment units were 23.8 per cent below October figures for last year.

But the cumulative total for the first 10 months of the year was ahead of 1964 housing starts in the same period by 6.1 per cent.

The Crown-owned housing agency said applications for loans under the National Housing Act in October were down more than 20 per cent. They covered 8,177 dwelling units.

The decline was sharply felt in actively approved lenders under the act—insurance and trust companies, down by nearly 60 per cent. Direct lending by CMHC in support of the winter works program was up by 10 per cent.

Two Soldiers Still AWOL

OTTAWA (CP)—Two of 10 British soldiers who sent absent without leave in Canada last summer are still at large, a defence department spokesman said here.

One is from the Sherwood Foresters, the other from the Queen's Own Surrey Regiment. Some 1,500 British soldiers participated in summer manoeuvres at Camp Gagetown, N.B., and Camp Watwright, Alta.

Four went "over the hill" from Gagetown, six from Watwright.

By mid-November, eight had given themselves up or had been picked up by the RCMP or the Canadian Army Provost Corps. They were returned to Britain by RCAF transport planes as seats became available.

One informant said the British troops had been promised leave in Canada so that they could see something of the country but that some of them hadn't received any.

Quebec Gov't Has No Plans For Takeover

MONTREAL (CP)—Quebec has no plans to take over the Bell Telephone Co. or any other utility, Gerard Levesque, industry and commerce minister, said.

He told students at St. George Williams University here Monday that the line was solidly drawn by the government after the 1963 takeover of electricity companies in the province. No other nationalization is planned, he said.

Mr. Levesque discounted a resolution adopted last week by the Quebec Liberal Federation which urged the government to study the possibility of nationalizing provincial telephone companies.

He said the resolution was merely the democratic expression of the party's rank and file. "As far as the government is concerned, we will not nationalize. But as far as the party is concerned, we are known as very democratic—and anyone can propose any resolution he wants."

Chemical Firms Plan Expo Show

TORONTO (CP)—Six Canadian chemical companies have announced plans to participate jointly in a pavilion at Expo 67. The theme of the \$750,000 project will be Color in Man's Life.

The circular pavilion, 100 feet in diameter, will contain three amphitheatres to project the theme. It will handle about 750 persons an hour, officials said.

The companies taking part are Canadian Industries Ltd., Chemell (1963) Ltd., Cyanamid of Canada Ltd., Dow Chemical of Canada Ltd., Shawinigan Chemicals Ltd. and Union Carbide Canada Ltd.

Pipe, Fittings Shipments Up

OTTAWA (CP)—Shipments of iron castings, pipe and fittings rose to 63,865 tons in September from 55,421 in September last year, the Dominion Bureau of Statistics reports.

Shipments for the first nine months of 1965 amounted to 512,027 tons, compared with 477,814 tons in the same period of last year.
