THE AXE SWINGS AGAIN.—A Montreal despatch says: The Government axe has again been swinging among the employees of the Post Office here, and no fewer than six have been victims thereto, viz.: David Dauscher, an ex-member of the Shamrock Lacrosse Club, who is away on his wedding trip, having only entered upon matrimonial life on Monday morning; Gustave Labatt, one of the Nile voyagers; Mrs. Richardson, typewriter; James McLachlan, Timothy Corley and Captain Johnson. None of them are entitled to superannuation, all being too recent appointments.

THE HALIFAX IN THE GALE.—The Plant Line steamer Halifax, Captain Pye, which arrived here from Prince Edward Island and Halifax, encountered the full force of Sunday's terrific north-westerly gale, which delayed the vessel three hours in reaching port. At 5 a. m. Sunday the steamer was struck by a fearful N. W. gale, accompanied by mountainous seas, which swept over the steamer's bows, some of them making a complete breach over the funnel. The steamer's cabin was flooded with water, the forward scuttle hatch carried away, and the forward reel swept overboard. During the height of the gale two fishing schooners were sighted hove to under bear poles, making bad weather of it. The look-out of the steamer could plainly discern the smoke from the fire at Windsor, which was nearly 70 miles distant.—Boston paper.

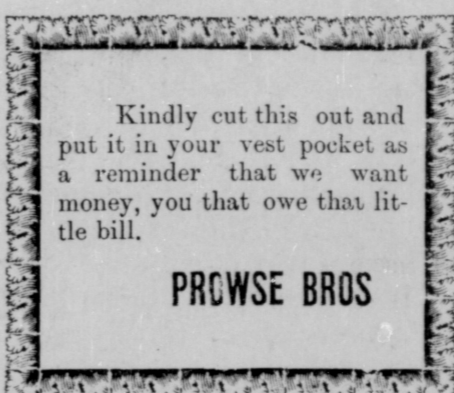
