

Orioles Grab Second Spot; Yankees, Indians Split Bill

Roy Wilhelm pitched Baltimore into second place in the American League standings Sunday with his ninth straight victory while Milwaukee opened up a two-game lead in the national league.

The unbeaten knuckle ball pitcher shut out Kansas City 3-0 on seven hits, moving the Orioles within one game of the league-leading Chicago White Sox who divided a doubleheader with Boston. Chicago scored six runs in the second inning enroute to a 9-4 opening victory but the Red Sox turned back a ninth-inning white Sox rally and won the second game 4-2.

The season's largest crowd, 59,023, turned out at Cleveland to see the Indians split two with the New York Yankees. Herb Score went all the way to take the first, 7-5, with the help of a three-run homer by Tito Francona. The Yanks jumped on Cal McLish for four runs in the second inning and held on to win the second 4-3.

Detroit climbed up to the .500

mark and a fourth-place tie, three games behind Chicago, by hammering Washington 6-4. Eddie Yost hit two homers against his former mates and Charlie Maxwell slammed No. 11 for the winners. Roy Sievers and Jim Lemon homered for Washington.

Milwaukee scored eight runs in the seventh inning, knocking out Don Drysdale on the way to an 8-2 decision over Los Angeles. Bob Buhl pitched a four-hitter for his fifth victory. The largest Milwaukee crowd since opening day, 32,399, saw the defending National League champions break out of their slump with a 12-hit attack.

SETTLED FOR SPLIT
San Francisco had to settle for a split at Cincinnati after winning the first game 5-3 behind Jack Sanford. Orlando Pena escaped a mild eighth-inning threat to go all the way with a four-hitter as Cincinnati took the second, 7-1.

Chicago climbed to third place by knocking out Pittsburgh twice 4-2 and 1-0. Relief pitching by Bill Henry in the first game and by both Henry and Don Elston in the

second helped John Buzhardt and Elmer Singleton win.

Don Cardwell, Philadelphia pitcher, and Gino Cimoli, St. Louis outfielder, swapped punches in a fifth inning dispute during the second game of a doubleheader at Philadelphia. The Phils out-slugged the last-place Cardinals in the opener 11-9 as a total of nine pitchers saw action. Vinegar Bend Mizell shut out the Phils in the second, 2-0, with five hits.

The fight started when Cimoli brushed back on a 0-3 pitch, had some words with Cardwell and started toward the mound. Cardwell met him halfway and they exchanged punches before the plate umpire intervened. Cimoli was pushed down as players from both teams raced into the action. Even mild-mannered Robin Roberts got mixed up in the fuss and argued with Cimoli and manager Solly Hemus of St. Louis, a former teammate.

THE SURGE of the New York Yankees in these last two weeks has baseball folks everywhere in a high state of excitement.

The Bombers, mired in the American League cellar not too long ago, finally hit their stride and have moved right up there with the top brass. There are some who still insist that the New Yorkers wasted too much time in the first six weeks of the campaign. Those baseball followers loudly proclaim that the world champions won't repeat as winners of the Junior circuit.

HOWEVER, the great percentage of the experts is still calling the Yankees to do a repeat performance. They see no reason why 1958 happenings shouldn't occur in 1959. But that line of reasoning can be attacked by arguing that the rest of the American League is much stronger than it was a year ago. It makes fine material for a baseball debate and you could choose either side and put forth some pretty fair arguments.

We are still of the opinion that the Stengelites won't quite make it this year and as a result a new outfit will oppose the National League champions in the world series.

STILL ON THE YANKEES

Have you ever given much thought to how versatile a player is this fellow Elston Howard?

It's still far too early to start talking about candidate for the most valuable player award but it's never too early to try to evaluate Howard's worth to the Yankees.

Yes, sir, Mr. Howard is Casey Stengel's real handy man. Old Case cited Elston as his No. 1 catcher at the start of the season. However, it wasn't very long before Stengel had Howard replacing Siebert in left when Norm's defence lapses started to prove costly. After that it was right field when Hank Bauer's aging legs began to ache. Elston soon found himself at the initial sock when injuries sidelined the only two regular firstbasemen, Bill Skowron and Marv Thorneberry.

IN THE FIRST 25 games the Yankees played in 1959, Elston caught ten, handled first base on nine occasions, was in right field three times and left field the same number.

The first Negro to crash the Yankees, Howard prefers catching to any other job. He feels that when he's behind the bat, he's in the game all the time. In the outfield, Elston says he does a lot of day-dreaming.

He's 30 years of age and should have several good years before him. In 1958, he led the Bombers' hitters with a .314 mark. He was one of those fellows who went into long slumps. He stuck around .300 the most of the year.

ELSTON WAS CONSIDERED by many as the man who started the Yankees on the comeback in last fall's world series. The Bombers were all but figured out of the fight when Howard replaced Siebert and the transformation came about. He played terrific ball the rest of the way and Stengel and his men finally won the marbles.

If Yankees do any more trading, you can be almost certain that Elston Howard will not be a part of anything the Bombers have to offer.

And speaking of trades, it has been no secret the Boston Red Sox have been casting envious eyes in the direction of Gil MacDougall for the past couple of years. The New Yorkers have said "NO" on all occasions but rumors are making the rounds again. Hank Bauer's name is linked with MacDougall and Jackie Jensen and Frank Sullivan are the Red Sox players mentioned.

So far it's nothing but rumors.

LOS ANGELES DODGERS were able to do something in Milwaukee that their west coast neighbors, San Francisco Giants couldn't do.

The Dodgers found the going tough earlier this year with the Braves, but in this past series, they proved last year's 14 wins out of 22 contests were no fluke.

The Haneymen are a formidable outfit and there are times when it appears they are going to ruin the league race. However just when this seems about to happen, the Braves go into a slump and the race gains new interest.

Let's hope a few other teams can follow the example of the Dodgers and start winning games from the Milwaukee gang.

If this would happen, we'd see some fun in the National league where a champion is now overdue.

BRIAN LEWIS was delighted with the way his Junior Legionaires hit that ball at Summerside Saturday.

Valuable Stepfather Insists Ronnie Knox Is Missing

ST. CATHARINES, Ont. (CP) — Harvey Knox, valuable stepfather of quarterback Ronnie Knox, took off for Los Angeles Sunday, insisting the football player is missing and saying he intends to place the matter in the hands of the FBI.

He and his stepdaughter Patricia were here to arrange a stage appearance for the girl.

Harvey said Friday no word had been heard from Ronnie since he left for a brief vacation in Mexico six weeks ago.

Toronto Argonauts of the Big Foot Football League reported they had reached Ronnie's agent in Los Angeles who insisted that the backfielder had returned,

but that they were unable to reach him.

Fat, who left Harvey, said he believes they took off:

"We are still positive that Ronnie has not been found."

Said Harvey:
FBI TO INVESTIGATE
"Although we've had our differences lately, I'm sure that if Ronnie had been in Los Angeles he would have telephoned his mother. As soon as we are back in California we intend to place the matter in the hands of the FBI."

The stepfather said he called Ronnie's mother Saturday and she had not heard from him. Harvey also took the opportu-

ity to deliver a blast at professional football in the United States as "a rotten, scheming business exploiting the youth and making the few rich."

He said Chicago Bears' George Halas did not live up to his contract with his stepson and that Halas and football commissioner Bert Bell "concocted in the detriment of Ron's future in the National League as well as black-balling him."

Ronnie has been signed for a second term with Argonauts under an arrangement with Halas, who holds his contract.

NEW YORK (CP) — Hillsdale captured the \$54,700 Argonaut Handicap at Hollywood Park Saturday with a thrilling stretch drive from far behind. It was his sixth stakes victory of the year. The four-year-old, packing 128 pounds for the heaviest weight of his career, burst under the wire 2 1/2 lengths ahead of the pace-setting Fleet Nasrullah. How Now was third.

The time for the mile was 1:34.3-5. Hillsdale, ridden by Tommy Barrow for C.W. Smith of Detroit, paid \$5.30, \$3.30 and \$2.60. Mrs. John D. Hertz's Fleet Nasrullah

returned \$6.50 and \$4.90 and How Now paid \$5.70.

Hillsdale's triumph netted the stable \$31,650 and increased the big bay colt's earnings this year to \$301,900, highest in the U.S.

At one stage, jockey Ismael Valenzuela had Fleet Nasrullah five lengths ahead of How Now. Hillsdale was far behind the leaders. Barrow began his move at the far turn. Passing horses on the outside, Hillsdale roared down the middle of the stretch to catch Fleet Nasrullah.
