

Defelice Racks Up 5th Shutout As Millionaires Defeat Glace Bay 4-0

SYDNEY, (CP)—Goalie Norm Defelice racked up his fifth shutout of the season here Tuesday night as Sydney Millionaires blanked Glace Bay Miners 4-0 in a Maritime Major Hockey League game.

Vic Raschi Is Sold To Cardinals For \$75,000 And Two Minor Leaguers

The 34-year-old righthander had incurred the wrath of George Weiss, Yankee general manager, by holding out against a 25-percent cut in his \$40,000 1953 salary and failing to acknowledge a letter from the front office on contract negotiations.

Bannister To Compete In Empire Games

LONDON, (AP)—Roger Bannister, Britain's brightest hope for the four-minute mile, announced Tuesday he will set aside his medical books to compete in the British Empire Games at Vancouver this summer.

Bannister's entry means a race of three of the world's top milers at the games next July 31 to Aug. 6.

The other two are Australia's John Landy and New Zealand's Murray Halberg.

Bannister and Landy boast 4:02 miles but the British Amateur Athletic Association did not officially recognize Bannister's effort because the 24-year-old medical student ran it in an unscheduled school meet.

Twenty-year-old Halberg flashed into prominence with a 4:04 mile Feb. 13 in Auckland. His time was considered spectacular because he ran on grass. Bannister's best official time is 4:03.6.

Genuine Threat
Landy showed again Tuesday that he is a genuine threat for the four-minute clocking. He ran the mile in 4:02.6 at Olympic park in Melbourne bucking a strong head wind on a track made heavy by drizzling rain.

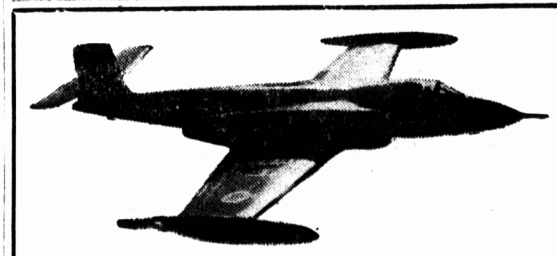
