WHEELING, W. Va. (AP) — Tommy Williams, Jr., 14 was sentenced to life imprisonment Wednesday for killing a younger playmate in what the state contended was an attempted robbery which netted nothing.

Tommy was convicted April 5 of the murder of David Powell, nine-year-old cub scout.

The prosecution said Tommy lured the Powell boy into a coal building under the front porch of the Williams home Feb. 9 while the boy was selling tickets to a benefit movie. The body was found the next day with the skull shattered.
