VANCOUVER (CP)—Two ships chartered by the fisheries research board are sailing from Departure Bay this month to conduct Canada's share of a big oceanographical survey of the north Pacific Ocean. The undertaking is sponsored by the International North Pacific Fisheries Commission.

The 114-foot motorship Fort Ross, owned by Jack Cooney of Vancouver, and the 78-foot motorship Kay West II are taking part. The latter vessel did similar work last year.

**Pond Leasing, Stream Plans Are Discussed By Sportsmen**

Mr. Ralph Jenkins, president of the P.E.I. Fish and Game Association made an official visit to the Southern Kings Association at their regular meeting held at the Bison Restaurant, Montague.

Mr. Jenkins discussed several matters pertaining to the Provincial Association and clarified the Valleyfield stream situation, stating that screening equipment had been installed and that the construction company were endeavoring to do the best to prevent pollution of the stream with silt.

However many of the members were quite sceptical and will be awaiting the reports of the game warden which has been requested by the Department of Industries and Natural Resources.

Following the routine business, one of the topics discussed at length was the leasing of dams to which sea trout have access. It was moved and seconded that further leasing of such dams should be prohibited. Three streams were selected in this area for improvement this year. It was

also thought that streams that had been stocked by the hatcheries should not at a later date be leased to private individuals as in the past.
