

## Favorites Run True To Form At Golf Tourney

CALGARY (CP) — Lyle Crawford of Vancouver, one of the Canadian amateur golf champions this week, was extended to the 18th hole Monday by Roy Bainbridge of Edmonton before win-

ning his first round match, 2 up. Bainbridge lost a chance to score the first major upset of the tournament when he missed a four-foot putt on the 17th green which would have tied the match. Crawford took the 18th with a par four. Most of the other favorites were running true to form in first round matches on the exacting Calgary Country Club course.

The only casualty was Bob Gardner of Calgary, low scorer for the second-place Alberta team in the Willingdon Cup matches Sunday. Gardner was ousted by Dave Moon of Halifax, 3 and 2.

Moon almost lost out by default when he arrived four minutes late at the first tee but was allowed to play.

Crawford was marked as one of the favorites when he scored a pair of blazing 67s in the inter-provincial matches for a low individual record.

Other Willingdon Cup players who rolled to quick wins included Don Lewis of Moncton, N.B., 6 and over Quebec junior champion Gordon Linn of Montreal.

Six inter-provincial team members drew byes into the second round today.

The were Peter Dolan of Halifax, M. J. Lawling, Moncton, Joe LeBlanc, Montreal, Gordie Leatie, Regina, Nick Westlock, Windsor, Ont., and Doug Bajus, Vancouver.

The others dropped out because of fatigue or illness and at one time Bobet was bothered by boils but was able to continue.

Seventy foreign riders started and 38 reached Paris, including two Britons, four Swiss, five Dutchmen, five Spaniards, seven Belgians, nine Italians, one Australian, one West German, one Austrian and two Luxembourgers.

Two Paris newspapers, L'Equipe, a sports daily, and Le Parisien Libere, sponsored the race which cost an estimated 170,000,000 francs (\$485,715) against advertising and other income of 160,000,000 francs.

## Marilyn Bell Enjoys Quick Dip At Dover To Relax

FOLKESTONE, England (CP) — You would think that anyone who had just spent more than 14 hours swimming the English channel would want a holiday from the water.

But not Marilyn Bell. The 17-year-old Toronto swimmer who took a busman's holiday while resting up from her feat and went for a dip Monday, less than 24 hours after scrambling ashore.

Unlike her channel crossing, Monday swim was without fanfare as she slipped quietly away from Folkestone hotel and went to Dover to bathe in the sea and have a talk with her channel pilot, (Pop) Burwell.

There was a reason for the 10-minute swim, however. Marilyn's mother explained: "It is the best way to prevent sickness and cramp after a long swim."

The young swimmer, who last year became the first person to swim Lake Ontario, was the toast of the south coast. Bank holiday seaside visitors talked of little else, marvelling at how fresh she looked Sunday night after swimming 14 hours and 36 minutes from Cape Gais Nez to Abbotscliff, between Dover and Folkestone.

Congratulatory messages by the hundreds flooded into Marilyn's hotel — including cables from Prime Minister St. Laurent, the mayors of Toronto and Montreal and British swimmer Brenda Fisher who holds the women's record of 12 hours, 42 minutes for the swim. Miss Fisher is now in Canada.

Marilyn appeared in high spirits as she splashed in the harbor at Dover.

"I had a wonderful night's sleep," she said.

The schoolgirl told reporters the people accompanying her in a fishing boat had "a far worse time than I did."

"The water was so rough," she said. "It was also boring for them just to have to go on watching me all the time. I had something to do, and that made all the difference."

Marilyn said she kept running into shoals of jellyfish during her swim. "They got me twice just before the end."

Newspaper men asked her whether she was disappointed at not breaking the record.

Coach Gus Ryder, who accompanied her along with her parents on the crossing, answered for her. "No," he said. "Of course, all athletes like to beat a record but conditions have to be perfect. Although she started with the sea like a mill pond it got very choppy later on."

Marilyn said her future swimming plans are uncertain.

After completing high school next spring, she plans to go on to the University of Toronto.

## Wins French Bicycle Race Third Straight

PARIS (AP)—Louis Bobet of France, dubbed by his admirers the "Napoleon of cycling," Saturday became the first man to win three straight Tour de France races, the world's major marathon cycling event.

The 30-year-old bicyclist pedalled into Parc de Princes stadium here to the cheers of thousands of spectators watching the end of the 2,704-mile race which covered 22 laps through Belgium, Luxembourg, Switzerland, Germany, Monaco and France after leaving Le Havre July 7.

But his margin over second-place Jean Brankart of Belgium was one of the smallest in the history of the race, first run in 1903. He covered the distance, about one-third of it through the mountains, in a total elapsed time of 130 hours, 29 minutes, 26 seconds, four minutes and 53 seconds faster than Brankart.

Although his over-all time was the fastest, Bobet did not win the last lap, 142 miles on flat road from Tours to Paris. Miguel Poblet of Spain won it in six hours, 38 minutes, 25 seconds.

One other cyclist, Belgium's Philippe Thys, had previously won three tours but only two of them were consecutive.

Bobet took the over-all lead from Antonin Rolland, also of France, after the first of three important legs through the high Pyrenees mountains and held it during the final dash.

Of the 130 riders who started from Le Havre, only 63 finished.

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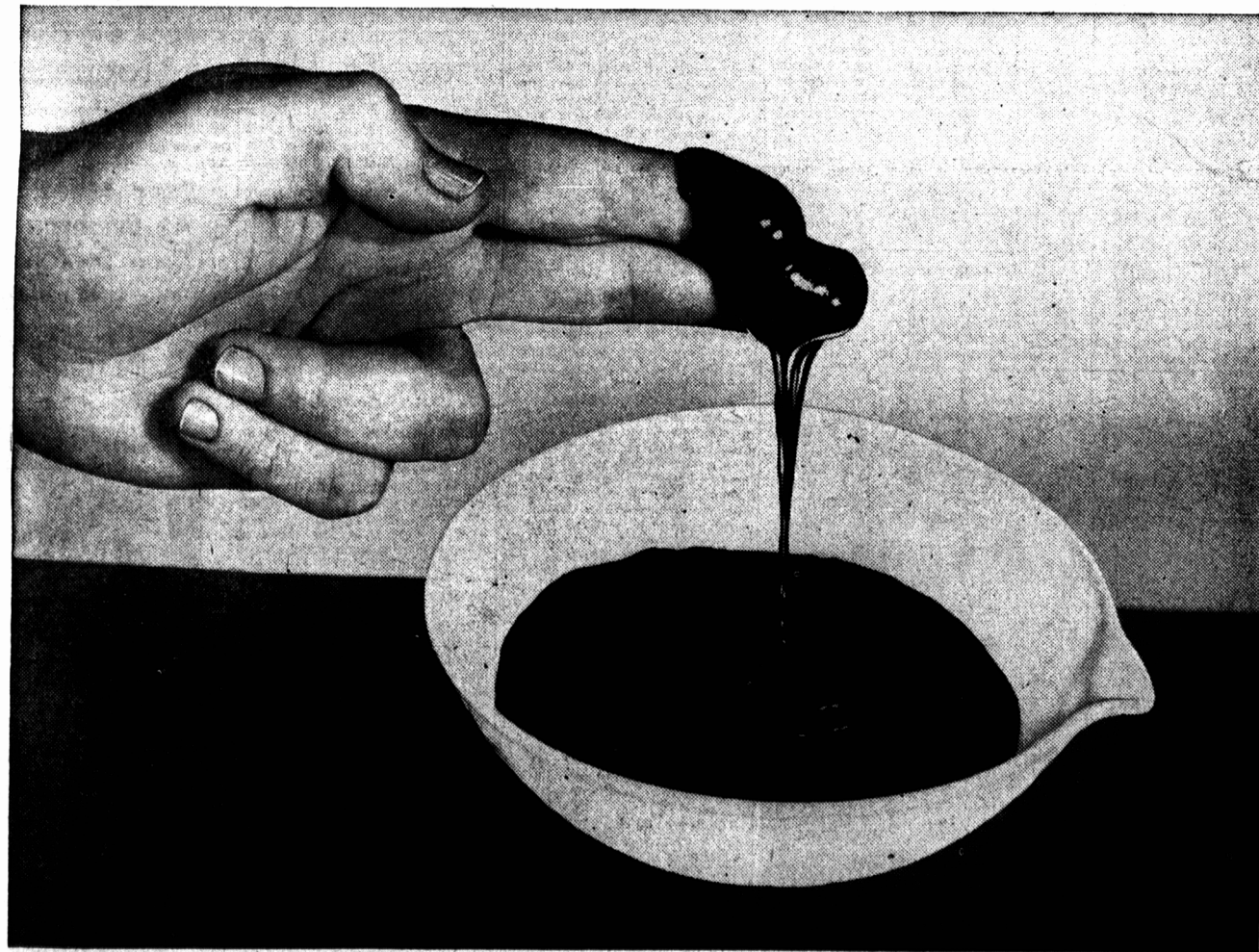
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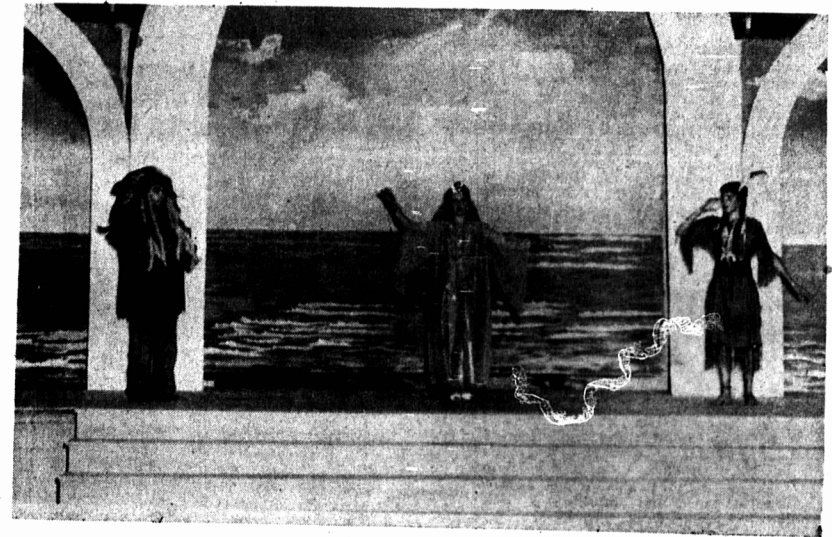
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
