## Next Stock Market Trend Considered Anyone's Guess

Recent activity on stock markets and analysts' differing views on the future course of stock prices seems to prove the accuracy of the words attributed to J. P. Morgan: "The market will continue to fluctuate."

One investment counsellor, Iain Fraser, says a Dow theory signal has been given—that means sell your stock—but the Fraser sell indicator remains bullish—that means buy. Both the Dow theory and the Fraser sell indicator are complicated methods by which experts decide whether stocks should be bought or sold.

The stock market has been in a down trend for about six weeks although last week the Toronto and New York markets scored impressive gains.

At the height of the decline, some so-called experts were saying a bear—downward—market was approaching.

Will last week's rally continue? The experts still aren't sure and it appears to be anyone's guess.

Elsewhere on the business scene:

Maclean-Hunter Research Bureau takes a look at Canada in 1975 and sees a population of 23,505,000, up from 19,516,000 at April 1 this year and a gross national product of \$59,600,000, up from 1964's \$48,016,000.

**CHANGES ITS NAME**  
The Canadian Metal Mining Association, representing more than 95 per cent of Canada's metal output, has changed its name to the Mining Association of Canada.

Premier Jean Lesage of Quebec says negotiations are continuing for the sale to Hydro-Quebec of electric power from the on-again, off-again Churchill Falls project in Labrador. The \$1,000,000,000 power development scheme has been held up by disagreements between British Newfoundland Corp., Newfoundland and Quebec.

Canadian Acceptance Corp. has offered to purchase all the outstanding shares of Holt, Renfrew and Co. Ltd. at \$20 a share. Holt, Renfrew operates retail clothes stores in Montreal, Toronto and Calgary.

The T. Eaton store in Brantford, Ont. has been sold to Wal-

ker Stores, a division of Gordon Mackay and Co. Ltd. Within the next few months Walker will take over five other Ontario stores owned by Eaton's. They are in Sault Ste. Marie, North Bay, Lindsay, Belleville and Brockville.

Mitsubishi International of Japan will buy \$23,000,000 worth of copper concentrates from Wedge Copper Mines of New Brunswick. Power Corporation of Canada Ltd. will raise \$30,000,000 through the sale of a preferred issue to "enable the corporation's continued growth and development."

In the first half of the year, new bond financing in Canada raised \$1,820,323,843 in the same period last year.

Canadian brewers had lower profits in the six months ended April 30 — \$4,333,880 or 13.34 cents a share, compared with \$6,015,322 or 22.07 cents in the same 1964 period.

## OBITUARY

**MISS DORA JANE SMITH**

It was with deep sorrow that her many friends and relatives learned of the death of Miss Dora Jane Smith which occurred on May 3rd in the Prince Edward Island Hospital in her 83rd year. She was the daughter of the late James Laird Smith and Lucy Ann Woolner Paynter of North Rustico, where she lived the greater part of her life. For a number of years, Miss Smith together with her brother Wesley operated a general store in North Rustico, and since her mother's death in 1947, she spent the winters with her niece Mary, (Mrs. J.S. Edwards) and Mr. Edwards in Ottawa, and the summers in New Glasgow. In 1954 Mr. and Mrs. Edwards took up permanent residence in New Glasgow, with whom she resided.

"Aunt Dot" as she was affectionately called, was much loved by everyone, and she also had a capacity for loving, and this was borne out by the fact that when in her early thirties her half sister Annie Laura died leaving three small children, two of whom died in infancy. The other, Mary, she raised to adulthood. Five years later her brother Harold's wife died in Vancouver, where she went, and brought back two infants, one of whom, Hazel, Mrs. Charles Stone, North Syracuse, N.Y. she kept to adulthood, the other Ralph Smith, Ottawa, Ont., returning with his family.

She leaves to mourn her passing two brothers Wesley Price, North Rustico, and Harold Laird, Charlottetown, also several nieces and one nephew. A brother, Chester Woolner and a half-sister Annie Laura Paynter predeceased her several years ago.

Her funeral took place from New Glasgow United Church and was conducted by her pastor, Rev. Frank Stiles, with burial in Cavendish Cemetery.

The floral tributes, cards and letters of sympathy were many attested to the esteem in which she was held by all that knew her.

## Bond Financing Figures Quoted

**TORONTO (CP)**—New bond financing in the first half of the year totalled \$2,154,288,300, compared with \$1,820,323,843 in the same period last year, wood, Gundy and Co., investment dealer, reports.

New bond financing in June was \$354,687,000 compared with \$286,326,013 in the same month in 1964.

Provincial issues dropped ¼. The Alberta Municipal Finance Corp. 5¼-per-cent issue of 1967 was at \$97.75 bid and \$98 asked. The Province of Ontario 5¼-per-cent, 1965, issue closed at \$98.25 bid and \$98.50 asked. Trading in municipal issues was quiet. The corporate market was generally unchanged.

## BOND MARKET

BY THE CANADIAN PRESS

Prices in most sections of the Canadian bond market were unchanged in quiet trading this week.

Treasury bill yields dipped fractionally; 91-day bills fell .01 per cent to 3.94 per cent while 182-day bills dropped .03 per cent to 4.04 per cent.

Day-to-day money fell ¼ per cent to 3 per cent, after hitting a low of 2¾ per cent Wednesday. Amount available rose to \$219,000,000 from \$152,000,000 last week.

On the short-term Canada market, the 3½-per-cent May 1, 1966, issue closed at \$99.35 bid

## NOTICE TO ALL DAIRY PRODUCERS

Claiming For Supplementary Payment from  
**Canada Department of Agriculture**

Claim forms are now being circulated to producers eligible for a supplementary payment based on cream or milk production in the period May 1, 1964 to April 30, 1965. The following points are brought to the attention of those involved:

1. Claim forms should be completed and returned before July 31st to the Data Processing Service, Department of Agriculture, Ottawa, Ontario.
2. A dairy producer who hasn't received a form should contact his dairy plant.
3. Producers who have problems in completing the claim form can receive assistance from officials of dairy plants.
4. Producers who have not kept their settlement slips for the period should contact the dairy plant for information on the quantity of milk or cream supplied.
5. If you are not registered as a dairy producer, it is important when completing the claim form to complete the application for registration on the bottom of the form.
6. Fluid milk shippers are not eligible for supplementary payments on surplus milk.
